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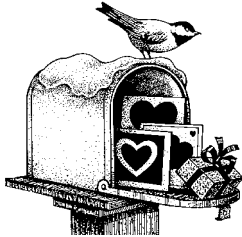

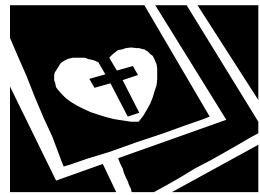
Support/Stewardship: The Financial giving statements will be ready for Sunday distribution.

FROM THE PASTOR

What are the unique marks of being a Lutheran Christian? What are the basic beliefs? Long ago people invented the idea of a catechism – a guide for people in need of instruction – novices and veterans, the young and old alike – in the fundamentals of Christian faith. In the earliest centuries, Christians used these study books to prepare new believers for Baptism. As time passed, books of this kind were also prepared for the instruction of baptized believers, too.

For Lutherans, the best known of these study books is the Small Catechism by Martin Luther. It teaches the breadth and depth of the faith held by Christians in a variety of churches around the world. The Small Catechism is also interested in spreading the gospel. Learning his faith from the Bible and in personal experience, Luther came to believe that God created and claimed the whole human race and the planet Earth for the sake of pure love. This trust in God and God's good work with us is at the core of the Christian faith for Christians who claim the title, Lutheran.

Our midweek Lenten worship services will explore five parts of the Small Catechism. Each week, in the midst of the devotional prayer service, Holden Evening Prayer, a local Lutheran pastor will share their thoughts and understanding of one piece of this amazing love of God's good work with us.

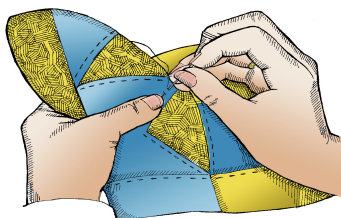

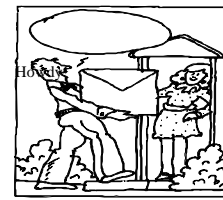


Do you have a heart for World Hunger?

“In working on finding financial ways to help sustain Interfaith programs, one of my tasks is interviewing our participants on why they take part in the Latinas in Action Program. I find it so life-giving to sit down and talk to our participants and document their ideas, hopes and thoughts about programming. Below is a letter from Martha, a long term participant, outlining her experience with the program. I'm proud of our programs and our participants and honored that they share their stories with me. “

Virginia McGill, Interfaith

December 22, 2007

My name is Martha and I am happy to assist Interfaith in writing this letter of recommendation on behalf of the Latinas in Action project. I am 25 years old and my husband and I live in Omaha. I am home full-time with our son who is three and a half years old. I hope to begin working as an interpreter once my son begins school.

I first heard about Latinas in Action from a friend and I decided that in good conscience I should go, too. I had gained weight, and my cholesterol level was very high and I wanted to control it. I began losing weight, so I continued to go to classes. The classes were also something to look forward to doing. They helped me reduce stress and socialize with other women. I made friends in the

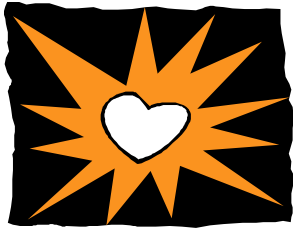
I have received many benefits from the Latinas in Action project. Since joining, I am much more relaxed and I have more energy. When I get home from classes I am in a good mood and I can see things and resolve problems with more calmness. I am glad that my son can go to Latinas in Action with me. He plays with the other children and makes art projects and drawings while I am in class.

I am responsible for all the cooking in my house and the classes help me learn more about healthy eating. The Latinas in Action leaders have shown me how to look at labels, how to look for different calorie content, and how to compare the different nutritional values in food. I have also learned about the quantities of food that are better for me and my family.

Since joining Latinas in Action, I also feel and look better and I like my body more. My self esteem is also better. I feel more positive, more enthusiastic and I have more confidence in myself. I have also learned about domestic violence, breast self exams, children's safety, and the different topics

What I like best about the project is that the people in charge treat all of us very well. I am glad that Latinas in Action is free because I think the majority of the women who attend do not have the ability to pay for classes. The project has helped so many women in the community and I am very grateful because it has helped me and my family.

We have many people who need help and all sorts of opportunities available to fit any individual or group schedule. Below are some individuals that can use some assistance;

Mary* is 85 years old and has been an independent woman her entire life. She has lived in the same south Omaha apartment for over 37 years. In February she fell and broke her hip. After being in a nursing home and completing rehab, Mary is back at home. She needs help with rides to the doctor, the grocery store or even just a home cooked meal once in while.

Lisa* recently had surgery and needs some help for the next couple of months with some meal preparation and possible grocery shopping while she recovers.

Stacey* is a 25 years old and legally blind. After graduating college last year, she moved to Omaha and began working full-time. She needs help with someone to read her mail once a week and help go through other paperwork. Someone who likes cats would be appreciated!

Joan* works full-time but due to several medical conditions, is unable to drive. She can use occasional rides to the doctor and grocery store.

Susan* lives in her own home with her two dogs. She could use someone to help her go grocery shopping. She makes a list and a volunteer needs just buy what is on the list!

There are more stories to be shared! These are just a few of the many people who are part of the *Faith in Action* program. Most of these individuals have no family to help them. From the Editor

For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.

As I write this, I am just a few days past finishing the church's annual report. When I was in high school and college, I really hated to write papers for my various classes, believing I would NEVER need the skill of writing big presentations like the ones my teachers were asking for. Well, I was wrong! The annual report is just as hard as writing a term paper. Thirty-eight pages full of details about what happened here at Grace over the last year. I could never have imagined this sort of project back in college. So those of you who are young readers, seize the day! Learn it all even if it seems useless because you never know what you'll need for the future.

I wasn't planning to be a church secretary. I thought maybe a medical researcher (but I didn't like the dissection part. Ewww!) or later in my twenties, a music business owner. I was a waitress in a café, a salad and dessert "chef" at a nursing home, a piano teacher for a while, a sales and marketing person at three different sheet music stores in the metro, an 800 operator for several catalogue companies and very lately (since 1999) your church secretary. While these were not careers I chose in my youth, I have learned valuable lessons from each opportunity.

I like to plan and make deadlines. Ask my husband. He hates it when I needle him about his plan. He would rather have a nebulous list of things to do and tackle them one by one with no deadline instead of talking to me "about" his plan. So when I turned 50 in September of 2007, I thought I needed a new plan for myself. A plan for the last part of my life. I guess some of my friends would call it a "mid-life crisis." I thought about all the things I wanted to do but hadn't done. I looked at my situations and wondered, "Is this what I wanted?" Do you know what came of that question? Discontentment! I started to agonize over what new plan I needed. I thought and thought.
