



As Interfaith continues to raise awareness and seek funding for our outreach ministry in the community, I find that participants express beautifully what Interfaith's ministry provides. I am including another letter from a participant in this month's newsletter because Irma's words tell the story of Interfaith's impact on her and her family in a way that is both personal and profound.

Virginia McGill, Interfaith

Dear Foundation Board Members,

My name is Irma and I am part of the Latinas in Action program. I heard about Interfaith and Latinas in Action at a health fair that I was attending. I have been taking part in the program for a year and a half.

I decided to join Latinas in Action because I did not have much opportunity to exercise. I continue coming to the group because I really like the way the program is set up. I enjoy the aerobics classes and find that I have received many benefits from continuing to participate. I feel much more active and my cholesterol level and my stress level have both gone down.

I have made changes in my diet, too, I eat more fruit and vegetables and cook with less fat and salt. Physically, my feet do not hurt me like they used to before I joined and I have more flexibility. Mentally, I feel less nervous, I am more relaxed and have more energy to do things.

Latinas in Action shows me how to eat healthy and gives me information about how to feed my family a healthy diet. I have also learned from the classes that are offered with the program about family and caring for children. I am happy that the information from the classes is offered free to the entire community. In Latinas in Action we are always given important information about staying healthy. I am very grateful for this program.

Think R.I.C.E For Injuries

If you suffer from a sports related injury, use R.I.C.E.

The term stands for Rest, Ice, Compression, and Elevation.

<u>Rest</u> - Take a break from exercise or any type of movement that may stress the injured area. A minor injury should be rested for one or two days, while more severe injuries may need longer.

<u>Ice</u> - Ice the affected area. Icing reduces pain, limits swelling and bleeding, and encourages rapid healing. Wrap ice in a towel to avoid direct contact with the skin.

<u>Compress</u> - Compress the injury with a stretch bandage. Make sure not to wrap it too tight, just enough to support the injured area comfortably.

<u>Elevate</u> - Elevate the limb. If possible, try to keep the injured part above the level of the heart. At the very least, try to keep it higher than the hips. This helps limit swelling and also prevents movement of the area that is injured.

"A man of sorrows. Acquainted with grief." As I head into the final weeks leading up to the celebration of Easter, these two phrases keep repeating in my head. On February 10th, my family received word a family related to us by marriage had suffered a great loss. The Schoenwald family from Wichita had been on their way for a weekend of skiing in Colorado. Ken lost control, rear-ended a vehicle and was catapulted across the median into the path of a semi truck. In an instant, Ken, age 46, Jenna, age 18, and Jace, age 13 were killed. My cousin, Janelle, was ejected from the vehicle and her twin daugh-

ters, Avery and Alyssa, age 15 were critically hurt. The survivors were air lifted to a hospital in Denver.

As my family, churches from Wichita, and people around the country connected to the Schoenwald family prayed, the girls slowly healed. As I write this, Janelle, who suffered a very serious concussion, is close to being released. The twins suffered severe injuries to their pelvises and face several surgeries. Now begins the process of emotional healing.

Everyone felt at a disadvantage as to how to minister to the family when they were so far away. Isn't is interesting how we want to DO something to relieve the suffering. We feel helpless. Just look at the out-pouring of money and mementos after the Von Maur shooting. Flowers, teddy bears, snowflakes, money... but very often the only thing to do is pray. I prayed for my aunt and uncle. I prayed for the doctors. I prayed for the family and friends left behind. I shared my story with Brenda. Brenda prayed and shared my story with her sister, Joann. Joann lives in the Denver area. Joann prayed. Now...here comes an amazing part of my story. Joann obeyed the Lord! As she prayed, she felt God calling her to visit my loved ones. Joann does not know me well. She knows me through Brenda and Eva and the few times we've met. She does not know my cousin at all. But Joann knows the Lord and decided to visit. She did not come empty handed. As she contemplated her visit, she stopped at a gift shop. Balloons didn't seem appropriate. Maybe a devotional book. Joann's eye fell upon a journal. Yes. That's the right gift.

Joann walked into Janelle's hospital room. Journal in hand, she sat by Janelle's bed. Joann became an ambassador on behalf of God's people and on behalf of my cousin's friends and my family prevented by distance from visiting. The journal was exactly what Janelle needed. She had been trying to keep track of things in a small pocket notebook that was really not adequate. God sent an ambassador with the very item Janelle had longed for.

I am amazed by God's guiding and by the obedience of Joann. I'm not sure I would have been able to visit a total stranger who had suffered such a great loss. I have trouble knowing what to say to those I know well when horrible things happen. Everyone involved in this situation, my family and by extension, Janelle's church family was touched. By Joann's obedience, I learned again what God can do if I am listening and willing to His smallest command.

The Schoenwald family knew the Lord. Their testimony in the community was one of great love of God. Without a doubt, I know where Ken, Jenna and Jace are today. Each of them had made a commitment to allow God to be in control of their lives. They knew that nothing they did could make them clean in God's sight. They had each prayed to accept His gift of salvation.

How about you? If you died tonight and stood before God, why should He let you into heaven? The only answer is that you have accepted that you are not able to earn your way past your sinful ways. The only way to God is by asking Christ to cleanse you and cover your sinfulness with the sacrifice of Jesus Christ who died so that the penalty of sin which is death would be paid. This Easter season, give your heart to God in response to the glorious sacrifice of Jesus Christ. (John 3:16)




