

Ice Cream Is Good For the Soul

"Last week I took my children to a restaurant. My six-year-old son had asked if he could say grace. As we bowed our heads, he said, "God is good. God is great. Thank you for the food, and I would even thank you more if Mom gets us ice cream for dessert. And liberty and justice for all. Amen."

Along with the laughter from the other customers nearby, I heard a woman remark, "That's what's wrong with this country. Kids today don't even know how to pray. Asking God for ice-cream. Why, I never."

Hearing this, my son burst into tears and asked me, "Did I do it wrong? Is God mad at me?" As I held him and assured him that he had done a terrific job and God was certainly not mad at him,

an elderly gentleman approached the table. He winked at my son and said, "I happen to know that God thought that was a great prayer."

"Really?" my son asked.

"Cross my heart." Then, in a theatrical whisper, he added (indicating the woman whose remark had started this whole thing), "Too bad she never asks God for ice cream. A little ice cream is good for the soul sometimes."

Naturally, I bought my kids ice cream at the end of the meal. My son stared at his ice cream for a moment and then did something I will remember the rest of my life. He picked up his sundae and, without a word, walked over and placed it in front of the woman. With a big smile he told her, "Here, this is for you. Ice cream is good for the soul sometimes, and my soul is good already."



Pray about a New Opportunity Here at Grace Church

God moves in mysterious ways his wonders to perform. I am consistently surprised by God. You may recall that following my first Sabbatical in 1997 I returned to work bringing two new ideas that God had laid on my heart. Those ideas are now ministries that serve others, Kids at Work and Interfaith Health Service.

Last year, I returned from Sabbatical thankful for the time away. God has tugged at my heart to try something new but the opportunity didn't seem right. Either I was reluctant to step out and see if it was something we might try or it wasn't God's time. Well, God's time seems to have presented itself once again.

Three weeks ago, my Synod Staff colleagues put in my hand a request from the Lutheran School of Theology for a special consideration of an Intern site in Omaha. Now, I have thought about Grace being a wonderful place where an Intern might learn a lot about pastoral leadership. I just never could figure out how or even if this was a real possibility.

Two weeks ago, I shared this idea with the Congregation Council. Since none of us had given it much thought, our best thinking that evening was "it sounds like an intriguing idea. How will it affect you, Pastor?" Each person expressed their thoughts and then as a group encouraged me to learn more about the Internship program and interview the young woman for whom the request was made.

This past week, I was in Chicago attending the SCUPE (Seminary Consortium on Urban Pastoral Education) Congress. This was a marvelously wonderful educational experience. While there, I had the opportunity to interview Angela Khabeb. We had a delightful conversation. Our shared desire was to try and make this work. God must be in this.

I believe Grace would be a wonderful place for Angela to learn and practice her skills in pastoral ministry. The description in the material from Lutheran School of Theology says, "An internship is designed so that the intern can gain experience in all aspects of parish life. This offers an opportunity to test out more comprehensively the strengths and weaknesses of the student's preparation for pastoral ministry."

There are a number of things that must be figured out. Things like, how do we pay for this ministry, where might she and her family live, etc. However, trusting that this is a God motivated possibility, I ask you to include this in your prayers. Ask God to help us work out the details. Ask God to bless this, if it is to be. Ask God to help us be the best place for an Intern to serve.

In a recent Sunday morning message, I said that God has not called us to play it safe. God has called us to live our faith in a trusting relationship with God. I trust God is calling us in this direction. Will you join me in praying, planning, and acting on this call from God?


Pentecost is a time of **red** -- a color of fire and zeal and passion and heat. The Spirit is incendiary within us.

Omaha was selected based on availability of sports venues, accessibility of city and local interests and excellent accommodations.

The news these past few weeks has been frightening and confusing. Gas prices rising and the general fear about how we will continue to support ourselves through these difficult financial times, politicians campaigning with passion but continually called upon to defend and clarify their stances and beliefs...in short, not much good news. I struggle with the desire to live in a world where there is only smooth sailing and wanting to shy away from the things that God may ask me to do that would upset my secluded world.

This morning I found myself reading in the book of Hebrews. Chapter 11 is filled with examples of people who found themselves having to make a choice between cowering or taking hold of the faith that they had and moving ahead in obedience to God—Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Joshua and the Jericho experience, Rahab the prostitute who hid the spies sent out to scope out the promised land. The writer, Paul, has to stop himself from expounding on more people of the Bible because there are so many more examples in the Old Testament of folks whose faith was tested. In verses 32-38, he just starts listing all of the different ways these Bible characters were tested and how they overcame their trials through acts of faith with God's help.

Over and over this past week, the phrase, "Looking to Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith" has run through my head. (Hebrew 12:2a) It is easy for me to see how Jesus is the *author* of my faith but I don't think it's as simple for me to look at Him as the *finisher* of my faith. I know that my redemption, the freedom from the punishment of sin ,came only because Jesus Christ came as a man, still retaining his deity, to wipe out the penalty of sin (death) on the cross so that I can come before God boldly. However, when it comes to working through how my faith will be put in practice, I tend to take that upon myself. I push myself ahead spiritually or hang my head in shame if I feel that I have fallen short of the mark that I think God has set for me. I suffer from the "I want to do it myself" attitude. Frankly, there is a lot of stress in that. No wonder if feel like I've been put through the wringer. When my own child had that attitude, I let her find out the consequences, knowing there was a better way. How often God must have to stand back and let the circumstance of my folly play out, waiting patiently for me to turn to Him and yell for help!

I must confess that lately there are some circumstances that I have tried to overcome on my own. As my friend, Brenda, would say, You're living in "Eygpt...in denial." (de Nile). Excuse the pun! If God is indeed the finisher of my faith, I need to change my attitude about those things. Running this race is a waste of time if I'm not on the track God has set for me because even if I am making good time, I'm going nowhere.

Here is the plan God has for me...and for you. Let's step up to it!

"Strip down, start running—and never quit! No extra spiritual fat, no parasitic sins. Keep your eyes on Jesus, who both began and finished this race we're in. Study how he did it. Because he never lost sight of where he was headed—that exhilarating finish in and with God—he could put up with anything along the way: Cross, shame, whatever. And now he's there, in the place of honor, right alongside God. When you find yourselves flagging in your faith, go over that story again, item by item, that long litany of hostility he plowed through. That will shoot adrenaline into your souls!"



Coming of Age! It's A Book... It's A Conference...

It's a Movement in the church to "come of age" and reach out to and connect with younger men August 1-3, 2008, men of all ages will gather in Omaha, NE, under the same theme verse as the founders, "...your old men will dream dreams, your young men will see visions." (Acts 2:17).



Featured speakers include Tom Osborne, athletic director, University of Nebraska, Lincoln. Osborne was head football coach of the Cornhuskers for 25 years, helping the school claim three national titles before he was inducted in 1999 to the College Football Hall of Fame. Nebraska's 3rd Congressional District elected him to three terms during 2001-2007 in the U.S. House of Representatives.

The "Coming of Age" theme has a twofold meaning. LMM is marking its 20th anniversary by becoming a financially self-reliant, separately-incorporated ministry of the ELCA.

The theme also refers to a spirituality project LMM undertook to understand what churches can do to engage young men between the ages of 18 and 34. As part of the project, 88 young men from across the United States participated in extensive interviews. Sixteen of those interviewed organized the LMM Young Men's Ministry Council. The results of the project were presented in the book, "Coming of Age: Exploring the Identity and Spirituality of Younger Men." The gathering's purpose is to bring men of all ages into a deeper relationship with God and assist younger and older men in building intergenerational relationships.

"We will serve, we will play, we will learn, we will worship, we will encounter God — and each other – and we will grow" said Doug Haugen, Director, Lutheran Men in Mission, ELCA offices.

A 48,000-square-foot interactive center will include room for building Habitat for Humanity sheds, high-ropes courses and other games.

The gathering will be preceded by the 2008 LMM Assembly July 31- Aug. 1. The organization's triennial business session will elect a president to succeed Heber Rast, Cameron, S.C., and other officers and board members. Rast will complete his second three-year term. The assembly will adopt a budget for LMM and celebrate the organization becoming an incorporated, self-funded ministry of the ELCA with a full-time staff.
