<u>Finance:</u> Council ratified allocations in the report submitted by The Endowment Board. A new computer was purchased for the church office with undesignated memorial funds.



"O give thanks to the LORD," says the Psalmist in 106:1. I, too, wish to give thanks to the Lord. I wish to give thanks for all the work that has gone into making our "Power Lab" Vacation Bible School a wonderful success. Are you using money and possessions as if they belong to you, or are you making spending decisions with the full realization that "God owns it all"?





Book Reviews

"Secrets" and "Unforgotten" (Sequel) By Kristen Heitzman



These books are a two-part excursion into the lives of a man and a woman, both emotionally wounded by things in the past. Their lives intersect when Rese Barrett, a talented woman renovator, buys a villa in Sonoma to renovate and run the villa as a bed and breakfast. Lance Michelli, a rogue who's relationship to God remains intact despite many trips in the wrong direction, learns that the villa actually belongs to his Italian family. The two find their way through many secrets that each has been guarding. As the story unfolds, a corpse is found in a secret cellar and questions arise about a years-old vendetta. "Secrets" takes place at the villa.

The sequel, "Unforgotten" moves to New York where Rese is introduced to Lance's enormous Italian family. Lance's grandmother holds the answers to the corpse in the cellar, who he was and who killed him but has suffered several debilitating strokes. Lance and Rese must navigate the difficulties of an old woman who cannot communicate, the codes of an old world "mafia" and how to resolve the issues of their personal lives with God's grace.

These books started a bit slow but picked up after several chapters. I enjoyed them! Check them out!

News from the Families of Grace Lutheran Church



- ▼ Titus and Teresa Duli are preparing to find out what can be done about their son's physical difficulty with his arm. Papers are being sent to the Mayo Clinic to see what might be available for consideration. Titus is a lay leader among the Mabaan church worshipping here at Grace. Teresa was a student in our ESL for Sudanese Women program. Their son was born with damage done to his arm. Support will be needed to help with transportation costs and housing if they are eligible for medical care. 

This hymn was written by a woman named Charlotte Elliott who was born in 1789 in England. For the first 30 years, her life was normal. Charlotte was bright and vivacious, earning the nickname of "Carefree Charlotte." She had many talents including painting portraits and writing humorous verse.

Then illness struck. Her illness was described as overpowering weakness, sluggishness and exhaustion day after day. She could not easily get out of bed. Her mood became despondent and depressed. She became bitter towards God for what He had allowed to happen to her. Her father, desperate to bring emotional health back to his daughter, invited Dr. Caesar Malan, a Swiss minister, evangelist, and musician to the Elliott home to help Charlotte regain confidence and faith. Charlotte lashed out at the minister, spouting her bitterness regarding her situation. Dr. Malan spoke plainly to her, telling her that holding on to her anger had made her sour and resentful. Charlotte's heart responded and, unburdening all of her feelings, she asked the minister how to find peace and joy. His response was to "Come as you are to the Lamb of God...who takes away the sins of the world...bring your fears, hate, temper, and pride and He will give great love in their place. She would be "...welcomed and relieved." It was a life changing experience. Charlotte became a changed person. During her lifetime, she wrote 150 hymns. The hymn, "Just as I Am," was described by her as an "autobiography" and has become one of her most popular hymns.

In one of my devotional times, a phrase jumped off the page of the book. I was startled by it because it was a phrase I seldom thought about. "Exactly as I am." Whenever I am reading and that happens, I have discovered it is something that God wants to talk to me about.

I had been fretting about my imperfections and feeling useless to God because of them. I know that this is a lie whispered in my ear by Satan to keep me away from thinking on the truth but, feeling frustrated and despondent, I struggled against listening to it and failed to see the truth that God has been offering to me! Accepted "Exactly as I am!" "Tossed about, With many a conflict, many a doubt, fightings and fears within, without."

I fight feelings of hopelessness and helplessness when I see the devastation of all the disasters here in the Midwest and around the world. I am frightened by what may happen with the coming economic situation regarding my family and friends. I am angry at the twisting of justice and righteousness to fit current popular perceptions. I want to lash out or run and hide. Neither is the correct response. God is willing to welcome, pardon the foul sins of my life and cleanse me. He wants to take these emotions from me!




