The regular meeting of the Council was held September 8th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We pray for the healing of those in our midst, Vicki Cox with her cold symptoms, Thelma Harahill and her broken bone, Ken Hilmer and his continued health struggles, Arlone Farber and her physical therapy on her shoulder; we pray for Arlone's friend, Ken Cattlett, as he learns that his cancer has spread to his brain, for the family of Andrew's friend, David Chappell, in mourning his death, for the family of Ambros Lado as they mourn his passing, for the family of Eve Samson as they struggle with unknown ailments; we pray for Ivo Mounto as well as his family; we pray for continued guidance with the start of our Faith Quest program; we pray for all those returning to school, and for all of our service people abroad and local.

Pastor led devotions from Hosea 10.12 and Luke 9.62. Hosea reminds us that our everyday experiences reestablish our relationship with God. God will not forsake us. Luke reminds us to set our sights on a goal and move steadily toward it. Do not allow yourself to become diverted.

Visions for Ministry: The Council is reading "Radical Welcome" by Stephanie Sleeper. We discussed how we needed to be clear in our mission, and remain focused on our path. Please read pages 97-119 for our next meeting.

Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

Christian Education: Faith Quest will begin on 9/23. Brenda Spahr will be the coordinator. There will be snacks, but no meal. The time will be from 6-7:30. Confirmation class starts Friday, September 11, as well.

Evangelism/Outreach: Our picnic was a great success! Thanks to all for their support and attendance!

Finance: As of 1/1/10, Thrivent Financial will no longer pay the bank charges assessed with the Simply Giving contributions. The council ratified the allocation from the Disney endowment fund.

Property: An inspection is planned for the stained glass windows. A bid will follow on whether to replace/repair the stained glass. Sudanese Building Use Policy will be amended, as solutions are identified.

Service/Social Ministry: Habitat House Dedication will be 3:30 pm this Sunday, September 13. October 11 is the CROP walk.

Support/Stewardship: 120th Anniversary planning is in final stages. Pictures need to be to Amanda Vazquez by 9/15. Remember, Pastor Hahle will be here on October 11th. The plan is to go out to lunch after service. We will have the celebration / potluck at church on October 18th and Pastor Konig will be here.

Worship: No new report.

Unfinished Business: No new report.

New Business: No new report.

Announcements: Pastor will be at Synod Staff Retreat on Wednesday and Thursday, Synod Council on Friday and Saturday, and at a speaking engagement on Sunday. He will be in California September 17-21. He will attending the Healthy Congregations National Gathering and will not be at our October meeting. June will bring treats for our October meeting.



As we left our early days story last month, the congregation has just received word that Board of Church Extension was willing to loan \$3,000 for a new building. Now the story continues.

"A special congregational meeting was held January 21, 1892, to discuss the need for a building and the present financial condition. It was decided that the congregation was too poor to secure the additional \$5,000.00 needed to meet the conditions of the deed and build an \$8,000.00 building." On June 22, 1892, the Council recommended that the Articles of Incorporation be amended to show a change in the church name. A special congregational meeting was held on October 12, 1892, and the name of the congregation changed from Shull Memorial Evangelical Lutheran Church to Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church, the name it bears to this day." A building committee was appointed in April of

1893. The committee consisted of Mr. J. Fred Smith, Mr. D. W. Shull, Mr. W. H. Koenig, and Pastor Kuhns. One of their recommendations was to level the lots in preparation for the time when the congregation might be able to build its first building. In September, new hitching posts were installed in front of the chapel and connection was made to the city water line.

"The grading work began in earnest in March of 1894. In the process of grading the lots, several graves were uncovered. It seems that in the early settlement of Omaha, about five acres of land, on the crest of a beautiful elevation in what is now Shull's Addition, was used for burial purposes, practically "without leave or license." In this old burial ground, used for only a few years, Thomas B. Cuming, twice acting Governor of the territory of Nebraska, was buried on March 25, 1858. However, on August 29, 1872, his body was removed and buried in Prospect Hill Cemetery. Later, on July 8, 1907, his body was moved once more. This time to Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

"During the excavation, an expensive iron casket, with heavy plate glass, was unearthed, and near by there was brought to the surface a coffin in which was the body of a man encased in a soldier's overcoat, with buckshot in the pockets. A pistol was also found in the coffin. It seems, as Mrs. Kate M. Jackman, daughter of Jacob and Susanna Shull and charter member of the congregation, later recalled many bones of early inhabitants were uncovered. She is quoted as saying that "...an old metallic casket was uncovered. It contained the body of an army officer's wife, a Mrs. Clark, who had come from St. Louis by boat. The body was later buried in Prospect Hill Cemetery." She also indicated that both Nebraska Governors Cuming and Izard were buried there originally. Her parents, Jacob and Susanna Shull are buried in Prospect Hill Cemetery, which is located in the area of 32nd and Parker Streets in Omaha.

"Another old resident, of the area, Al Williams, many years ago verified Mrs. Jackman's remarks. He stated that as a boy he lived over a saloon at 20th and Pierce Streets. When his father built their home on the north side of Pierce Street, east of 27th Street, he helped in the digging of the "cellar." They unearthed the skeleton of an Indian sitting on a horse. He explained that to the south of what is now Poppleton Avenue was an old cemetery that was supposed to be closed, but there were still occasional burials there. North of Poppleton Avenue and down the hill to the creek, at about Pacific Street, there were Indian burials. The creek started from around 28th and Poppleton, about two blocks northwest of the church, from a huge spring, a reason for the Indians to make it a favorite camping site.

"According to the church council records, Mr. D. W. Shull was appointed to make proper disposition of the human remains. A task which was obviously completed.

"Later that year, 1894, an agreement was reached with the Shull heirs to extend the deadline for building a permanent church structure. In addition, preliminary plans were presented for a new building. Negotiation continued with the Board of Church Extension.

"In December of 1894, Grace was host to the North Platte Conference meeting of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Nebraska. "The Church Council met on April 29, 1895, to review the latest proposal from the Board of Church Extension. Rev. Yarger, of the Board of Church Extension, wrote that the Board was in favor of giving the congregation \$3,000.00 and raising a loan of \$2,000.00, if the council would proceed to raise the remaining \$3,000.00 in order to erect a building in accordance with the requirements of the deed. The Council was not willing to assume the indebtedness with the bleak financial and economic prospects within the community.

"In October 1895, Pastor Kuhns traveled east to meet with the Board of Church Extension and the Board of Home Missions in the interest of securing support for building a new building. The boards agreed upon mutual lines of work. An immediate result of this visit was a donation of \$200.00 by the Board of Church Extension and their consent to give \$3,000.00 as a loan toward the erection of a \$5,000.00 church building. The Board of Home Missions increased their appropriation by \$100.00, bringing to \$400.00 their yearly grant for the support of the Pastor.

"At the December 1895 council meeting Pastor Kuhns reported on the trip and its outcome. In addition the council authorized the use of an envelope system for congregational giving. The money received through the envelopes would go towards the salary of the Pastor and current expenses."

As we see, congregational life and ministry had many opportunities for celebration and struggle. I would like to think that while much has changed, much remains the same. Today we have many opportunities for celebration and we have our struggles. It was a wise decision to begin a congregational giving emphasis. We continue that effort today. Please take note of the opportunity to review your financial giving toward the ministry offered in Jesus' name through Grace Lutheran Church as we enter our fall emphasis "Empowered by God – Responding by Grace."



As Fall approaches, it seems like a good opportunity to reflect on the growth and blessings that have blossomed within Interfaith Health Service over the summer months. I'd like to share some of those with our Interfaith congregation members and partners in this month's article:

Our former Faith In Action Director, Julie gave birth to a healthy son, her third, Michael. He is simple beautiful.

Martha, who has been part of our educational group from the beginning, invited Latinas in Action staff and participants to be part of her wedding celebration this month. She was a stunning bride and we all enjoyed celebrating the sacrament of marriage with her and her loved ones.

We have a new home with Pixan on 32nd and I street for our Wednesday Interfaith Exercise and Education classes. Our numbers as a result of our partnership with Pixan have increased by 20%. Participation has expanded to include families living in the neighborhood, several physicians, college students, a native of Germany and numerous "regulars" from our former Grace United Methodist location.

Interfaith staff (Gema, childcare director, instructors and I) will be attending a weekend planning retreat to gather ideas about the future and plan for Interfaith's Latinas in Action program.

Our participants and staff united to support our lead childcare coordinator as she mourned the death of her young niece who passed away in a car accident.

Participants worked together to donate items that will be used for a garage sale benefitting a local high school student who is in need of medical care.

Latinas in Action women and I helped organize and donate clothing to the Pixan garage sale that was a tremendous success and hosted hundreds of visitors at the Pixan site.

IHS's grant writer continues to have excellent ideas about grants and potential partnerships and is always available to help look for new ways to leverage assets within the community.

All of our Super Kids Teen participants have graduated to the next grade in school. Several of our participants have started high school and are taking on more of a leadership role in the program.

Our Arts for All partnership will continue this Fall with additional art classes for teens and youth.

Our childcare worker, Eva, has begun attending college but will continue on working with IHS because of her belief in the program and its community-based focus.

Interfaith's 3rd Station of Hope, was held at InCommon Community Development this month and was a wonderful opportunity to learn more about the work being done by InCommon in the Park Avenue neighborhood.

At Interfaith, we are grateful for the support and prayers of our congregations, Board members and community partners as we look toward the future in hope and in healing.



Stewardship Minute

Monthly reflections on our role as managers of God's blessing.

"Effective Stewardship" by Kenneth L. William

Empowered by God — Responding by Grace"

"Now as you excel in everything — in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in utmost eagerness, and in our love for you — so we want you to excel also in this generous undertaking" (2 Cor. 8:7).

We are entering into our annual stewardship emphasis entitled, "Empowered by God — Responding by Grace." During this time, we will consider how God has empowered us and how our response, by grace through faith, can be used by God, especially in the ministry here at Grace Lutheran Church.

Just what does it mean to be empowered by God? The Lord Jesus said that His disciples would receive power when the Holy Spirit came upon them (Acts 1:8). That not only happened as He said it would, but we, too, receive God's power by His grace through our faith in Christ as the Holy Spirit takes up residence in us. The words of a contemporary anthem by David Clydesdale and Claire Cloninger express this truth clearly: "Empower me! Like a rushing river flowing to the sea, Lord, send Your Holy Spirit flowing now thru me. 'Til I'm living as Your child, victorious and free. Send the power of Your love; empower me!" (Copyright © 1984 John T. Benson Publishing Co./ASCAP. All rights reserved.)

As we experience God's power through faith in Christ, our hearts respond. Our response begins with the realization that God owns everything. As Edwin Frizen stated, "... Scripture is full of evidence that all that we have comes from God." God is our Source. God is the Creator and Sustainer of life. God is the Provider of all that we have, whether it be life itself, the air we breathe, water which sustains us, or financial resources through which we obtain the necessities of life. On a daily basis, God demonstrates again and again His abundant power as He "richly provides us with everything" (1 Tim. 6:17).

And what should be our response to God's provision for us? According to 2 Corinthians 8:7, we respond by "faith," implicitly trusting God to provide all that we need. We respond by "speech," sharing the good news of the Gospel with others. We respond by "knowledge" through the study of God's Word. We respond in "complete earnestness," that is, through a demonstration of the sincerity of our love for the Lord. And we respond by excelling in the "grace of giving."

As an example of what it means to give by grace, the Apostle Paul points to the Christians at Macedonia. These were poor people — dirt poor, poor as the proverbial church mice — who were commended by Paul for giving beyond their ability to give. How could they do that? The answer is found in 2 Corinthians 8:5 — "... they gave themselves first to the Lord." Giving does not begin with the movement of the hand to the wallet, purse or pocketbook. Giving begins in the heart.

In fact, this principle goes back to God's instruction to Moses in Exodus 25:2, "... from all whose hearts prompt them to give you shall receive the offering for me." This principle is still in operation today. As we give our time, talents and treasure to the Lord, we do so by God's grace because we have already given our hearts to Him.

"Empowered by God — Responding by Grace." That was true of the Macedonian Christians. May it also be true of us here at Grace Lutheran Church.




