C. S. Lewis wrote "Just a hurried line...to tell a story which puts the contrast between our feast of the Nativity and all this ghastly 'Xmas' racket at its lowest. My brother heard a woman on a bus say, as the bus passed a church with a Crib outside it, 'O Lor'! They bring religion into everything. Look – they're dragging it even into Christmas now!" (From Letters to an American Lady, Dec 29, 1958, p 80.)

It is the official Christmas season now as I write this. It seems odd that someone might say these things about dragging religion into everything. Yet, we struggle with this same concept today.

As people of faith, one might clearly say, "Religion is in everything." Recognizing that God created us, we are spiritual beings connected to the creator. In that matter, then, "religion" in its purest form is a part of everything. The Psalmist (Ps 148) invites all created beings and things to praise God, angels, sun and moon, fire and hail, snow and fog, tempestuous wind, wild beasts, cattle, creeping things and all peoples.

As St. Paul addressed the early Christian community of Colossae, he invited us to do whatever we do for the Glory of God. In order to do that, we have to bring religion into everything. To bring the Christian religion into everything, we have to bring Christ into everything. So Paul wrote, "As God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourself with love...and whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him."

These are marvelous words to meditate upon as we close out one year and enter another. Clearly St. Paul believed that everything was held in relationship to the Creator and Christ who lived among us. We, too, as persons claimed by Christ in our baptisms, are held in relationship to the Creator and Christ who redeemed us.

I wonder, not upon a star, but upon these words. I wonder whether I can live my life, in every way, fully in Christ. I long for my life to show the love of God in all that I do. I recognize that I fail in that effort many times throughout the day. But, I pray that the forgiveness that Christ offers is sufficient and I can try, try again.

May your celebration of Christmas and the beginning of the New Year be fully in Christ. And as the hymn writer said it so eloquently, "O holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us, we pray; cast out our sin, and enter in, be born in us today" and everyday.

On a personal note, I want to express my sincere thanks for the kindnesses, gifts, and cards that many of you have shared with my family and me. I am deeply thankful.






