The regular meeting of the Council was held on February 9th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We pray for the family of Gloria Moore as they continue to struggle with health concerns: Sandy with brain cancer, Rick and Amy in their ongoing illnesses. We pray for Kent Cattlett as he continues his treatments for lung cancer; Chuck Rodgers as he is dealing with heart problems; for some of our Sudanese community who may be facing changes in their employment; and we pray for the Nation of Haiti, as the earthquake devastation affects so many. We pray for the local community as so many people are hungry, homeless, and unemployed. We pray that the students in our local schools will be safe and that there will be peaceful resolution to violence that has taken place.

Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses of Numbers 14:20 and John 14:13 from the "*Daily Texts*." These readings remind us to ask for forgiveness of our sins. We learn that prayer glorifies God and forgiveness, restoration, and renewal cleanses our relationships.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: The Council is reviewing a book titled, "*Radical Welcome*" by Stephanie Spellers. This book presents spiritual challenges that make us think of ways to fulfill God's dream and purpose for Grace congregation.

The Congregational Council and I have been reading the book, "Radical Welcome." I don't know what words come to mind when you hear these two words coupled together. I know that for me the word, "radical," does not elicit very many positive feelings or thoughts. In fact, I have the tendency to move away from anything radical because the connotation is that this is something that is too far right or left of the center. Now the word, "welcome," however creates a very warm and positive reaction within me. So, I wonder why did the author couple these two seemingly opposite words together?

"What is Radical Welcome? Radical welcome is first and foremost a spiritual practice. It combines the Christian ministry of welcome and hospitality with a faithful commitment to doing the theological, spiritual and systemic work to eliminate historic, systemic barriers that limit the genuine embrace of groups generally marginalized in mainline churches (young adults, the poor, LGBT people, people of color, people with disabilities)." This is the definition that is included in the study material for the book.

Our Lenten theme is Cross Ways. I can't help but connect this reading and study to our theme. The Cross was clearly a radical means whereby God reconnected humanity to God's self. This was not a centrist action. As we know, the cross was a brutal means to control radicals and those who would challenge the established method of government or religious institutional order. Yet, God uses this means to reshape the relationship between God and humanity. This is a puzzling cross way.

The Cross also became a symbol of welcome. Those who followed the "Way" marked themselves with the cross in baptism. Later it appeared on clothing, jewelry, buildings, etc. Today, the cross atop a church building is considered a sign of welcome.

Yet, if we take seriously the definition, earlier mentioned, it would appear that there is much work that needs to be done in order for the Cross and the Church to be seen as a place of radical welcome. Time, apparently, has helped individuals and churches foster a sense of "un-welcome" to a whole bunch of people. Whether intentional or unintentional, it seems that we have come to a cross way that puts welcome in a very limited box.

The study material asks the following question: What makes a church Radically Welcoming? The answer is as follows: Radically welcoming churches understand that each group brings gifts and perspectives that help the whole congregation fulfill God's dream and purpose. These churches seek to embrace everyone's voices, presence and power, with a special commitment to embracing groups who have been defined as The Other.

Now as I reflect on the definitions of these two questions, I find my heart being tugged toward spiritual practice and fulfillment of God's dream and purpose. I wonder how best to implement the practice of Radical Welcome and I wonder how best to articulate God's dream and purpose. What does God dream about Grace Lutheran, it's people and it's pastor? What is our purpose at this time? Can we be created in this cross way as a place that combines Christian ministry of welcome and hospitality to all?

Stay tuned. Together let us see where God leads us.


The 2010 Flower Chart has been posted on the bulletin board outside the church office.





The past few months have been a time filled with planning, visioning and possibly my least favorite activity next to fixing my computer--grant writing! Since grants are taking up a lot of my time these days, I wanted to share an excerpt of the narrative summary I am working on for the McAuley Foundation here in Omaha. It is a rough draft at this point, but I think it shares some new information about our ministry.

I hope you can join me in remembering our Latinas in Action Program and participants and our grant submissions in your prayers during this Lenten season.

INTERFAITH HEALTH SERVICE: A Programmatic Overview

The primary ministry of Interfaith Health Service's Latinas in Action Program is to provide bi-lingual health and wellness services to at-risk Latina women and their families. To meet this goal, Latinas in Action is participant-inspired, led and organized. Programming includes outreach, educational programming and exercise activities based on the needs and desires of the Latina women participants and their families. Latina women serve as instructors, program planners and guest speakers. Trained Latina Community Health Workers/Promotoras are on site for each class to assist in referring participants seeking additional resources and information

Our key activities are our on-going culturally based exercise and educational classes for Latina women and their families. Thanks to funding from grants and participants, we were able to host our first ever Strategic Planning meetings for our all our Latina staff members, program director and volunteers. All staff, volunteers and participants have a voice within Latinas in Action and all are responsible for its success.

In addition, Rev. Dr. Damon Laaker, President of Interfaith's Board, continued to donate his time and talents in supervising program staff. Grace Lutheran Church has been our most faithful partner and continues to provide office space for Latina Promotoras and spaces for educational and exercise classes, as well as nursery space for children and Art space for teenage participants. Dr. Beth Furlong, RN, PhD, JD, serves on our Board of Directors and was instrumental in providing in-kind oversight and programming ideas, as well as nursing student volunteers from local universities. Our lead educational and exercise instructor, Ilda and our Health Promotora Coordinator, Gema, were instrumental in training three additional instructors to keep up with the need for program expansion. Mariela Munoz, a former Latinas in Action participant and first generation University nursing student, assisted Latinas in Action in program outreach to Latinas and their family members interested in attending college. Juana Marcos, President of the Pixan Guatemalan Literacy Project, joined Latinas in Action as a participant and volunteer early this year.

Interfaith also began hosting "Stations of Hope" Community Forums every other month in the South Omaha community. Stations of Hope provides a way for local non-profits, community organizations, churches, colleges and universities to gather together and learn about community activities. Some Stations of Hope for this year included: Arts and Bi-Cultural Traditions, Community Outreach by InCommon, St. Martin's and the Omaha Public School System's Teen Parenting Program, and Health Outreach in Mexico made possible in part by donations from Latinas in Action participants and Gema's Interfaith began a partnership with Arts for All, a non-profit making arts affordable for families of limited financial means. Arts for All joined with Interfaith staff in providing art classes drawing on Latina culture at all Latinas in Action sites. Interfaith also began working with the Pixan group and over 200 Mayan/Guatemalan families who speak Canjobal, to provide health education, GED classes and literacy classes at Latinas in Action sites. It is hoped this partnership will expand to additional classes in the future.

Interfaith is grateful for the support of our grant partners, participants, leaders and community partners as we continue to reach out to all in hope and in health.






