The regular meeting of the Council was held on June 14. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: we sing praises of Thanksgiving for Pastor and Mary Laaker's "new" grandson delivered earlier today, as well as praises for all newborn's coming into the world; we pray for the Harold Fisher family, as Harold has died; we pray for the Lucy Monico family, as Lucy has died; we pray for Phil Minino, who is recovering from lung cancer and a fractured hip; we sing praises of Thanksgiving for Joe Fitle on his marriage; we pray for Becca Fitle, as she travels this summer; we sing praises of Thanksgiving for David Hufford's neighbor's son, as he is arriving home from his second tour of duty in Iraq; we pray for Sue Rose, who is undergoing radiation and chemotherapy for lung cancer; we pray for Norma Courtney, who is having blood clot issues and is hospitalized; we sing praises of Thanksgiving for Jim Horwath, as he is responding well to medication; we pray for Dottie Hula, who had successful carpal tunnel surgery and is recovering nicely; we pray for our shut-in's, Barbara Nelson, Barb Narducci, and Mae Lane; we pray for the people across the nation that are unemployed, including our own fellow member, Titus Duli, as well as Tamara, and so many others that we personally know who are looking for work; we pray that advocacy groups will be able to challenge a restrictive law against undocumented immigrants in Alabama; we pray for St. Luke's Church as they are facing budget concerns; we pray to have a successful Vacation Bible School this year and are so thankful to have wonderful leaders and helpers; we pray for the summer program, "Kids at Work", and again, are so thankful for the wonderful leadership and volunteer help; we pray for the people in Ethiopia, who are in a deadly cycle of drought and famine; we pray for the countries that are going through tumultuous times, including Sudan, Libya, Egypt, and others; we pray for a resolution of ending violence in our own city; we pray for all people in the United States that have been faced with physical and emotional trauma caused from natural disasters, leaving a widespread trail of death and destruction; we pray for the safety and hope in the rebuilding efforts; we pray continually for tornado victims and for the people in Joplin, Missouri, who are now dealing with a terrible fungus that many workers and victims have contacted; we pray for Brenda Spahr's family traveling from North Dakota to Omaha in the next couple weeks, as well as safety for all people traveling in flooded areas; we pray for flood victims in our own state of Nebraska and surrounding states as well, praying that the levees hold; we sing praises of Thanksgiving for the hundreds of volunteers who have helped in sand-bagging, as well as lending physical and emotional support; we pray for the fire fighters who are helping to contain the wildfires, and pray for the people leaving their homes; we pray for the needs of our Sudanese brothers and sisters, and pray for the people in Southern Sudan, who face the challenges of providing for needs, for hospitals and schools; we pray for the safety of armed service personnel, police and patrol officers; and as we count our many blessings, we pray for the poor, the hungry, the homeless, and the oppressed.

Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses of Psalm 73:24 and Revelation 15:30 from the "Daily Texts." The Psalm reminds us to live faithfully with God's direction. This verse in Revelation reminds us how great and marvelous God's work is.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: The Council continued their discussion on the book titled, "*Leadership in Congregations*." Good leadership comes when congregations work together, not against each other. A "vision" is better shared by leadership, which promotes good communication and a feeling of belonging is sensed by all. When one becomes "controlling", it is easy to be cut off from God's work. Our discussion tied in with an article on "Missional Renaissance" from Pastor Laaker, which emphasizes redefining a Church's position in the community through service and sacrifice. A question that can be asked to anyone is, "How can we ask God to bless you?"

Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

<u>Christian Education</u>: There will be one more planning meeting for VBS and anyone is invited to attend. The official dates and times for VBS are June 26-30 from 6:00-8:15 p.m. We are fortunate to have Janet Hula in charge of VBS and any help is much appreciated. Anna Ernst reported that the "Youth Serving Omaha" has approximately thirty kids involved and is going well.

<u>Evangelism/Outreach</u>: "Kids at Work" program is going well thus far, under the leadership of Brenda Spahr and several volunteers. Anna Ernst reported that at some time in the near future, another neighborhood walk will be planned. At this time, Anna is analyzing some different issues in the neighborhood.

<u>Finance</u>: The sale on the property to the north of the Church (Olson Property) was closed on May 31st. We will now seek a loan from the Mission Investment Fund of the Evanglical Lutheran Church of \$170,000.00.

<u>Property</u>: On Sunday, June 19th, there will be a "Special Congregational Meeting" held directly after the morning worship. The Council adopted the Resolution/Affidavit to Authorize Mortgage to be presented for congregational approval.

<u>Service/Social Ministry</u>: Neighbor's South Habitat for Humanity Coalition began building a house at 1519 South 27th Street on June 10th. A letter from Habitat for Humanity was read by David Hufford, thanking Grace for the gift of money that was allocated from the Disney Fund.

Support/Stewardship: Pastor Laaker talked with Paula Kitt from the Mission Investment Fund of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. She asked him to be a congregational advocate for MIF.

<u>Worship</u>: The Council voted to give Todd Laird a weekly stipend for the summer months, as he helps with the congregational music.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: Anna Ernst reported that the Nebraska Synod meeting was a great learning experience. The meeting was titled, "Faith 2 Grow." Vickie Cox and Andrew Edwards attended the OTOC meeting, which was a good meeting with discussion on immigration issues, workforce development, refugee action team, youth education, and housing/neighborhood revitalization.

New Business: No new business.

<u>Announcements:</u> Ralph Fitle will bring treats and lead the closing pray for our July 2011 Council meeting. Pastor Laaker will be out of town July 1-7 and Pastor Bob Johnson will do the worship service on July 3rd.



I have been reading a book titled, *Missional Renaissance*, by Reggie McNeal. It has captured my imagination and my heart. On Sunday, June 19, I suggested that our understanding of Father, Son and Holy Spirit is a formula for life. It is none other than God, God's very self: the Creator/Giver, the Redeemer/Lover, the Sustainer/Presence. This is the One who creates life, blesses life, and graces life. This is a formula worth carrying with us on all our journeys, for it is our source of hope, confidence and joy for life. This means that you can "Go." You can go and bless others.

I then suggested that we could begin practicing this effort of blessing others by turning to the person next to us and saying, "How can I ask God to bless you today?" This is a question that McNeal suggested in his book. So, we did just that. I followed it up with a story about my experience earlier in the week with a young man seeking help. Dan (not his name) stopped me and asked if I could help him. (I am working on not being suspicious of everyone who asks for help.) So, I asked him how I could help him. He said he needed a ride to get to the courthouse for a court appointment. I agreed to take him. On the way, he told me a little about himself. He told me about how he had made a mess of his life. In turn, he asked me what I did, so I told him I was a pastor. We talked about that for a little bit. Then I thought to myself, I wonder if this question that I had read in the book would be a good question to ask. So, I took the risk and I asked him, "How can I ask God to bless you today?" Dan broke down in tears. He began by saying that he didn't deserve God's blessing because of the mess he had made of his life. I assured him that it was God's desire to bless him today. So he told me what would be a blessing. I asked if I could lift that up in prayer. He said, yes. I then dropped him off for his appointment.

I don't know what happened to Dan that afternoon. I know he has been on my heart and mind ever since. I trust God has found a way to bless him.

McNeal says in his book, people may ask you, "Why are you doing this?" He answers by saying, "Having your motives questioned is music to the ears of someone prepared for it. So, respond, I am a follower of Jesus, and I am blessing you because that's what he came to do." Absolutely! This makes sense to me. It fills my heart with joy and purpose. I trust the power of the Holy Spirit to move in the life of the other person and bring them closer to a personal relationship with Christ.

I wonder what would happen if we, each one of us, took this as an intentional way to live out our Christian life. Can we see our task as blessing others? Can we be bold enough to ask those that we meet, those that we encounter in conversation longer than, "Hi, how are you?", How can I ask God to bless you today? I suspect we need to practice it with one another for a short while until we build up the confidence that we can ask the question comfortably and naturally. It would also mean that we would need to practice the ability to pray with one another on the spot.

Now, more than likely, I have crossed the line. If you are saying, "he's crazy, I can't do that!", stop for a moment and ask yourself how you first learned to ride a bike. Did it take practice? Did it take a tumble or two? Yet, you kept at it until you learned. We can do the same with our faith practices. A stumble or a tumble, simply means that we will do better the next time. If, as McNeal suggests, "the central task is developing great followers of Jesus, believing that God has created people to demonstrate his redemptive intentions to the world in and through them," then we can surely be willing to learn how to bless others.

I'm willing to keep trying and learning. I invite you to practice with me. Let's see what God may do through us.



The day promises good food, great fun and lots of beautiful quilts donated by friends of Carol Joy Holling Camp. The auction and barbecue lunch will be held rain or shine. Quilts will be on display by 9:00 a.m. The auction begins at 10:00 a.m. We will continue until all quilts are sold, which is usually around 5:00 p.m.

I've learned something very important this summer so far. Teamwork, while sometimes frustrating, complicated and hard, leads to results that are much more rewarding than what I can accomplish on my own. You'd think that I would have learned that already, but the examples of teamwork that I have been a part of recently have resulted in exceptional rewards.

With about 15 other Habitat for Humanity volunteers, I lifted up the frame for a wall on a home. With three other youth and Christian education directors, I planned a weeklong summer program that brought together 30 kids (ages 6 – 18) and about seven adult volunteers from three churches that allowed them to make new friends, have fun playing games and singing together, and got them out into the city of Omaha by serving in a different site every morning. By the time we ended the week with a pizza lunch at Table Grace, I was rewarded with an offering of more than \$200 to present to Head Chef Matt Weber and many smiles from both kids who had made new friends or grown closer with old ones and had fun, and adults (parents and grandparents) who were so happy with the week their kids had had.

Similarly, it is great to see the Kids at Work kids getting to know each other better and have a good time together as they work. They are doing a super job at the organizations where they have worked; their help has been very much appreciated and their positive attitudes are really great as well. As I write, Vacation Bible School is just a few days away, too, and I know it takes a lot of teamwork to make that happen.

Even though I have always felt wonderfully supported by both congregations this year, at times I have also felt very alone. I know that God is always with me, but when I have to make a tough decision or think about a tough situation and I'm on my own, I get scared. That is why it has been so great for me to see the results of teamwork recently...I've seen God working through other people and am reminded that other people want to work with me through those tough decisions and situations, too. I don't have to do it all on my own.

I think that's a good point to keep in mind for the future of the church – Grace, the Nebraska Synod, the ELCA, everybody. When it comes to being active in ministry, our individual motivation is important, but we do not have to do it all on our own, and we really CAN'T. We need God with us – in our individual spiritual time, and in work with each other. We need to work together to show God in ourselves to each other. Teamwork is sometimes frustrating, complicated and hard – showing up to meetings, figuring out how to deal with discomforts and disagreements, etc. – but being saved by grace is also about doing good works; even good works that aren't always fun. I can't say it enough or more emphatically – the rewards of doing good works together make life meaningful.

My year of service comes to an end the first week of August, but I think I'm out of space for this month, so I'll wait to tell you about that.

Celebrate Safely

Fireworks are fun, especially when used safely and with a little bit of planning.

Here are 12 Fireworks Safety Tips for all ages!

- 1. Consider attending one of the many free public shows available.
- 2. If you hold your own show, choose fireworks that are legal. Anything you buy from a vendor in Nebraska will meet this requirement.
- 3. Choose fireworks that are age appropriate. Young kids should never handle any fireworks, including sparklers. Teens should be supervised.
- 4. Don't allow running or horseplay by anyone near fireworks.
- 5. Don't try to relight duds. Wait at least 20 minutes before handling; then soak in water before disposing of the dud.
- 6. Plan your show to avoid having fireworks come down on people, houses and cars. Remember, the winds often change direction.
- 7. Have at the least, a bucket of water available and a garden hose on and ready to go.
- 8. Have a first aid kit nearby just in case.
- 9. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for lighting fireworks.
- 10. Wear close fitting clothes, and sturdy shoes or sneakers.
- 11. Use a "designated shooter" who is alcohol free and wearing safety glasses! Light one device at a time and keep a safe distance once a firework is lit.
- 12. Never light fireworks in containers.

Bishop grateful for ELCA as congregations prepare for North Dakota floods

CHICAGO (ELCA) -- As Minot, N.D. prepared for imminent widespread flooding, the bishop of the Western North Dakota Synod said he is grateful for the "gift" of being connected to the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA). Many members have called or sent messages asking how they can help.

"We're getting emails and calls from other ELCA congregations across the country," said the Rev. Mark E. Narum. "This is the gift of the larger church. This is a devastating event, but we do not stand alone."

To help with flood response, ELCA Disaster Response provided a \$20,000 emergency grant last week to Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota, Fargo, and a \$5,000 grant to the ELCA Western North Dakota Synod, Bismarck, said the Rev. Kevin A. Massey, director, ELCA Disaster Response.

Government officials have ordered the evacuation of 11,000 residents of Minot. Some 4,000 homes and businesses are likely to flood, and it's possible the water will remain for weeks, they said. Four ELCA congregations in the Minot area are preparing for significant flooding. The water is from the Souris River, the result of heavy rains in western North Dakota and Canada.

Floods threaten Christ Lutheran Church, First Lutheran Church and Augustana Lutheran Church, all in Minot, and Peace Lutheran Church in Burlington, N.D., Narum said. If secondary levees hold, First Lutheran, Augustana Lutheran and Peace Lutheran may be spared significant flooding, he said. This is the second time this spring the congregations have been evacuated, Narum said.

"I'm extremely concerned about Christ Lutheran," Narum said. "There could be a couple of feet of water on their main sanctuary floor." Volunteers, some from as far as 60 miles away, responded to a call for help from the synod this week to move furniture and worship supplies out of the congregation's sanctuary, he said.

To help the congregations in the flood zone continue with worship, the synod has paired each one with another Minot-area ELCA congregation, Narum said. Synod staff will meet June 23 with Minot-area ELCA pastors at Zion Lutheran Church, followed by a worship service.

Lutheran Social Services of North Dakota will use some of the disaster funds for disaster coordination and case management staff to respond, said Bonnie Turner, disaster response program director.

The social service agency will work with local leaders to determine long-term flood recovery needs, she said. "We've got great partnerships," Turner said. "We work in tandem with our partners. This recovery will be successful. It will just be long and tedious."

Turner said next week Lutheran Social Services will host training for flood cleanup supervisors and volunteers in Bismarck, and sessions in other locations are being planned. Volunteers are now working in Williston to clean up flood homes, she added.




A six-year-old boy told his father one day, "I'm going outdoors and play ball with God." "So how do you play ball with God?" the father asked.
