Devotions were led by Pastor Leaker reading the selected verses of Psalm 33:17-18 and Matthew 5:5 from the "Daily Texts." The Psalm verse reminds us that one cannot save anyone else on their own might—it is truly the fear and hope in the Lord's steadfast love that saves us. Matthew reminds us we are always spiritually poor; therefore, we must remember to always be open and available to God's love.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: The Council continued their discussion on the book titled, "*Leadership in Congregations*." Leadership requires learning forms of power and using them in a disciplined way. Information, skill, and accessing money are all forms of power—however; it is our task and calling to use power in a disciplined Christian life.

Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

<u>Christian Education</u>: Pastor Laaker plans on having confirmation classes after Labor Day. There will be more discussion at the end of August for the final details on the classes.

<u>Evangelism /Outreach</u>: The "Kids at Work" program, under the direction of Brenda Spahr, is over for this year and we celebrate its success. Ernie Olson and Samantha Trejo reported that the youth attending were good and cooperative, making it a very enjoyable year.

<u>Finance</u>: The Mission Investment Fund paperwork has been completed on the sale for the property to the north of the Church (Olson Property). The office has purchased a new chair and computer out of the Memorial Funds. The Synod Mission Trip, which is going to be taking place in Lexington, Nebraska from Sept 30th-Oct 21st, will be installing bunk beds for the families of immigrant's. These beds cost approximately \$250.00 each to install. The Council would like to ask our Congregation for assistance in raising enough money for one or two beds. Lexington has a very diverse population that has a meat packing industry, but there are many families that do not have a bed of any sort to sleep in. The Council feels that this is a worthy humanitarian effort and is asking the Endowment Board for matching funds.

<u>Property</u>: We await the work of the Engineer who will conduct the survey, draft the plans and seek bids for the work. The flat roof, damaged by hail, will need to be replaced. Church Mutual Insurance has authorized its replacement. The original asbestos slate roofing on the main portion of the church has also incurred damage. Negotiations are underway with the insurance company on options of repair or replacement. Pastor Laaker expressed thanks for Joel Gammon's help in the roofing matters.

<u>Service/Social Ministry</u>: The "farewell" summer picnic was absolutely great. The Habitat house is finished and the dedication will be held on September 11th.

<u>Support/Stewardship</u>: We still need some donations for Joseph LaL, the young gentleman working toward being a Lutheran Pastor in the Sudan, for housing funds. We have collected approximately \$148.00, but would like to see if additional donations might be secured. Joseph's family lives in a refugee camp in Ethiopia.

<u>Worship</u>: We are still looking for a full time organist to replace Lynda Laird, but we are blessed to have Jennifer Johnson for the next three weeks as a substitute.

Unfinished Business: No unfinished business.

New Business: No new business.

I have been doing some thinking. An author that inspires me is Edwin H. Friedman. His thinking challenges me and motivates me to work hard on things that pertain to me. In doing this, it helps me function more effectively as a leader.

We all know of the impasse that developed this summer in Congress. We even heard the words describing this impasse as "gridlock." Friedman says that he believes there are three major, interlocking characteristics common to any relationship system that has become imaginatively gridlocked: 1) an un-

ending treadmill of trying harder; 2) looking for answers rather than reframing questions; and 3) either/or thinking that creates false dichotomies. I found it easy to connect this description to the happenings in Congress.

My challenge has been to think of the ways I get imaginatively gridlocked. When I think about some of the issues that I face in my own family of origin, I wonder how often I simply fall into the pattern of trying harder to fix some piece of the relationship. What methods do I use as I scramble around trying this and then trying that? I know I am tempted to look for easy answers and hope one will simply appear out of the air. I also know how natural it is for me to fall into either/or thinking that creates a separation of things that I think I can understand or manage.

I wonder how this plays out in our efforts within the church. Is it easy for us to simply try harder at things that haven't worked in the past but believing with the right data or effort, it will be different this time? Is it easy for us to look for answers, especially easy answers, rather than asking a different or difficult question that pushes us to think more creatively? Is it easy for us to quickly divide things into an either/or category, thereby being able to dismiss the struggle to understand the difficult place we find ourselves in?

In retrospect, I think back to thirteen years ago when we started the Kids At Work program. We had never done anything like it before. We had tried any number of efforts that mirrored the past but gave us no new results. We had to take the risk of trying something completely different. We had to ask different questions, especially questions that engaged the community beyond our doors. We had to expand our thinking of engagement beyond "membership or recruitment."

I cannot express the totality of the kind of joy I feel as I see these young people engaged in ministry. Their willingness to give of themselves is marvelous tribute to the work of the Spirit among us. I give thanks for the untold ways peoples' lives have been touched by their efforts. I give thanks for the ongoing creative leadership of Brenda Spahr as director. I give thanks for the volunteer team leaders who in turn give of themselves to mentor and guide the young people.

I pray that God continues to push us to try new things in new ways. I pray that God helps us to



explore questions without the seeking the same answers. I pray that God keeps challenging us to look for new and creative ways to engage God's Spirit at work among us.

Property Update

Ehrhardt Griffin has completed the topographic survey of the property. The architect has drafted the site plans. The plans have been submitted to the city for approval. The City Planning Department has placed a conditional use amendment on the project. This means the building permit will not be approved until October 5. Bids will be sought in the meantime so that the plan can be completed by early November. Once we have bids in hand, we will select the contractors who will be doing the demolition and removal of the house and existing parking lot, regrading of the lots, excavation and sealing of the north basement wall, installation of the retaining wall and fences, and pouring of the new lot surface. We trust they will be able to begin work immediately after the building permit is issued.

Once work begins, it means that access to the church building will be through the northeast glass doors for all events until the lot is completed. Thanks for your understanding and patience.

Arizona, Alabama, Georgia, and South Carolina recently enacted harsh, anti-immigrant legislation attempting to shift federal authority to regulate immigration down to the state level. Many provisions have been blocked as unconstitutional.

Similar legislation is now pending in Nebraska's Legislature (LB48). The Judiciary Committee has asked for public response to this bill so

OTOC's position is that the current federal system is broken and needs to be improved but enforcement and legislation should remain at the federal level.

Mark Tucker, from Community Action House, and his crew load items into Gaylord boxes, then divide the food after the Walk according to each pantries needs. Usually three to four boxes of food are received and meet a big need in this community.

Another enhancement aimed to instill a sense of community in the Walk is a large sign-in banner that each person autographs under their church/ organization's name. Seeing the names of 1,000 walkers written on this huge banner reminds people of those they walk alongside in their own community and globally.

Other enhancements to last year's Walk included the prayer ribbons Walkers created following registration that blow in the wind during the Walk; seed packets given to each Walker, symbolizing the efforts we share culminating in a bountiful harvest for those in need; and a \$15.15 per Walker gift by a few donors in recognition of their Walk's 30th Anniversary.

In this pregnancy, she is proud because her physician has noted that she and the baby are extremely healthy and need no additional treatment. She shared that she is also proud of the work she has done to maintain a healthy pregnancy and also feels so happy that all of us in Families in Action are so excited for her and her family.




