



How To Survive A Heart Attack Alone

Without help, the person whose heart stops beating and who begins to feel faint has only about 10 seconds left before losing consciousness. However, these victims can help themselves by coughing repeatedly and vigorously. A deep breath should be taken before coughing. The cough must be deep and prolonged and repeated every 2 seconds without letting up until help arrives or until the heart is felt to be beating normally again. Deep breaths get oxygen into the lungs and coughing movements squeeze the heart and keep the blood circulating. The squeezing pressure of the heart also helps it regain normal rhythm. In this way, heart attack victims can get to a hospital. Share this information, it could save a life!

Bethsaida

25 Years of Discovery

Aug. 24 thru Sept. 27

The University of Nebraska Omaha (UNO) Art Gallery will begin the academic year with an exhibition: "Artifacts from the Dig & Hanan Shafir: Photographs of Bethsaida."

The hexagon gallery will feature an exhibition celebrating UNO's 25 years of archeological excavations at Bethsaida, an important Biblical city located on the north shore of the Sea of Galilee.

Rami Arav, professor of religion and philosophy at UNO, discovered the site and identified it as Bethsaida in 1987. Since 1990, UNO has led a consortium of institutions in uncovering and studying artifacts. Their work has shed new light on the times of Jesus and David, and the uniquely well-preserved site has generated numerous academic and popular publications.

Small artifacts from the Bethsaida dig and a replica of the large stele uncovered at the site will be on display with over twenty of Hanan Shafir's photographs that capture both archeological discoveries and the sense of wonder they inspire among student excavators.

Shafir began his archaeological photography in 1978 in Jerusalem. His images have been published by Design magazine, Amnesty International, Biblical Archaeology Review, and other publications.

Several gift items including commemorative pottery shards from Bethsaida will be raffled and Shafir's photographs will be for sale by silent auction.

Muhlenberg came from Germany (Halle) to the Pennsylvania colony when the German Lutheran immigrants were unwelcomed and in disarray. In fact, Kountze Memorial congregation was founded by the missionary work of the Allegheny Synod, the organization of which is a consequence of Muhlenberg's work in Pennsylvania.

Muhlenberg's importance cannot be overstated. At the time, many thought Lutheranism did not have a future in the United States since most of the immigrants were worshiping in Presbyterian or Anglican congregations. Muhlenberg organized the Lutheran church, forming the first Lutheran synod and creating the first Lutheran hymn book in North America. The traveling educational exhibit is a cooperative between the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia and the Franke Institute in Germany (where Muhlenberg studied) to commemorate Muhlenberg's efforts.

Kountze congregation is hosting the exhibit (composed of 21 color panel displays) as a gift to our Synod. We will welcome folks from around Nebraska, congregations and educational institutions, to visit the exhibit while it is here.

While the boy was drowsing uneasily in bed, she climbed up behind the drapes over the air conditioner. Then she came flying out to the side of his bed, yelling "*All I vant iss your blood!*" He was shocked, captivated, and delighted by this playful vampire.

They became good friends, and he allowed her to draw the needed blood and to bring him food to eat.

The only side-effect of this caper is that when Kelly the vampire came flying down from the airconditioner, she landed on the toes of a doctor's foot.

"When are we going to get rid of this social director and get a real charge nurse in here?" the doctor said. But when he left, Kelly noticed the doctor had a big smile on his face.


