

Let's have a half dozen folks attend!



Where to begin? In the past month, we have celebrated Easter, witnessed the election of a new Pope, watched in horror a bombing in Boston, experienced weather that went from 60+ degrees to snow and hail, participated in a primary election that had a few surprises, observed the US Senate unable to pass legislation requiring background checks for all gun purchases, and learned of proposed immigration legislation that may address some of the hardships and barriers individuals and families face in becoming citizens, to name just a few. In addition, we continue to see the impact of food insecurity, hunger, on individuals and families.

If this isn't enough the list could include many more things from the political, economic and local scenes. It is easy then to see how it is possible to cry out with the words of Jesus on the cross, "My God, My God, why...?"

Years ago, I was introduced to Bread for the World. This is a citizens organization that intentionally advocates for political and economic solutions to our world hunger issues. Each year they encourage us to become engaged in writing to our elected national leaders, Senators, Congress people and the President on behalf of people living with hunger insecurity.

This year the focus uses the theme "A Place at the Table." Let me share with you a few sentences from the latest Background Paper. "The table is a natural and powerful symbol of community.

"Whether eating meals, playing games, or discussing the household budget, families regularly gather at the table... Jesus met with his disciples around tables to share his teachings and fellowship. He gathered his closest disciples to the table for a last supper to gather strength and provide guidance before his fateful journey to Calvary." On Sunday, April 14, we heard from John's gospel, Jesus gathering the disciples around a breakfast fire on the shore of Lake Galilee.

God's table is abundant for all people. We hear regularly of the abundance that God provides. The difficulty we face is the adequate distribution of God's abundance. Can we find both the will and the way to accomplish a fair distribution?

I invite you to write to Congress to ensure a place at the table for hungry and poor people by protecting programs vital to them. Our letters are encouraged to focus on three issues:

- Protecting anti-hunger and anti-poverty programs like Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly food stamps), the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC), and poverty-focused development assistance (PRDA).
- Making permanent the current tax credits for poor families: the Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) and the Child Tax Credit (CTC).

Raising adequate revenue to end hunger.

I hope you will consider writing to your Senators and Congress people on the behalf of others. This is a marvelous way for us be Christ for others.
