The regular meeting of the Council was held on May 14th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We pray for the continued recovery of those close to us; We pray for the healing of Ken Hilmer and his ongoing health issues, for Jack Williams after breaking his arm, for David Hufford as he suffers with a collapsed lung, and for Pastor Gittler and his family while he struggles to recover from some health concerns. We pray for the 3 women that were abducted in Cincinnati, and for all the areas of unrest in our world. We pray for all of the new graduates and for the children who will soon be on summer vacation. We pray for Vicki's brother in law, Ron Hansen, with his chronic meningitis, and for Ethel Johannsen's family, mourning her death.

Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses in the "Daily Texts." Devotions were from Nehemiah 9:33 and 1 John 1:9. The first reminds that we will be punished for our own actions. The second reminds us that we know and should admit that we are wrong. We need to try to correct ourselves. Let's have some honest recognition; we are human beings and must depend on God's Grace and Mercy.

Visions for Ministry: We discussed the studied chapter in our book. Where was our church at its conception? Where was our church during its highest point? We were the suburbs. Were we the affluent? Mixed housing / working class. Lots cost a significant amount of money. We were not an ethnic congregation, but we retain diversity. At the end of the 1960's, end of WWII, with larger families, transportation began, interstate began to come through, which forced the relocation of 60% of the congregation. The church was visible only to the neighborhood, not by accessibility. Now, as native English speaking declines and Spanish speaking continues to grow - how do we bridge and make a connection? Please re-read through chapter two for next meeting.

Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

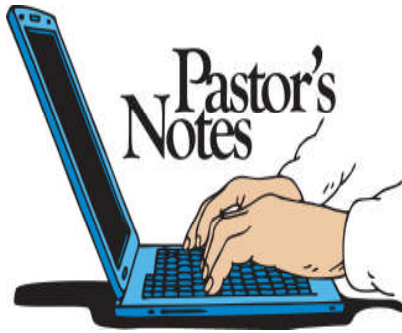


Ten Dollar Gift

The Council is reading and studying the book, "Can Our Church Live?" by Alice Mann. The title of chapter two is "Why Your Congregation is in Trouble Now." She begins the chapter by saying that congregations are born from a spark of interaction between faith and context.

I have been reflecting on that statement. In looking through historical documents a number of years ago, I was fascinated to learn that the first pastor of Grace congregation, Rev. Luther M. Kuhns, was the son of the Rev. Henry W. Kuhns, the founder of Kountze Memorial Lutheran. Rev. Henry W. Kuhns was instrumental in starting a number of congregations here on the eastern edge of Nebraska. So, a part of the spark of interaction between faith and context was the mission focus of Rev. Kuhns as he sought to plant churches in this area.

The context of the beginning of Grace congregation was a gift by the Shull family of two lots in what was then a sparsely populated area of southwest Omaha. This was in 1885. Grace was organized on April 7, 1889. This area was the newly developing suburbs of Omaha. Lot prices were high; \$4,000 per lot. Men's worsted wool suits sold for \$15 apiece. It is estimated that costs today are 30 times more than they were in 1889, at least for some things. So, the context of the beginning of the congregation was that this was a prosperous time. New homes were being built. New subdivisions were being planned.

This was a time of hope built on faith. People were moving into this part of the community and there was a need for a neighborhood church.

The congregation grew slowly at first but then much more rapidly following the World Wars. In its prime, the congregation boasted over 600 members. We learned looking back in the records that the first time average worship attendance was reported in the statistics was 1974.

The question that we are called upon to struggle with today is: what current cultural factors must the congregation come to terms with to frame a vital ministry? We are exploring this question along with others as we seek that spark of interaction between faith and context.

I invite your prayers. I invite your creative thinking. I invite your openness to the work of the Holy Spirit as we seek to live out our mission of sharing God's Word and love in care and service to all.

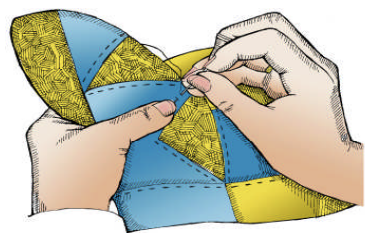

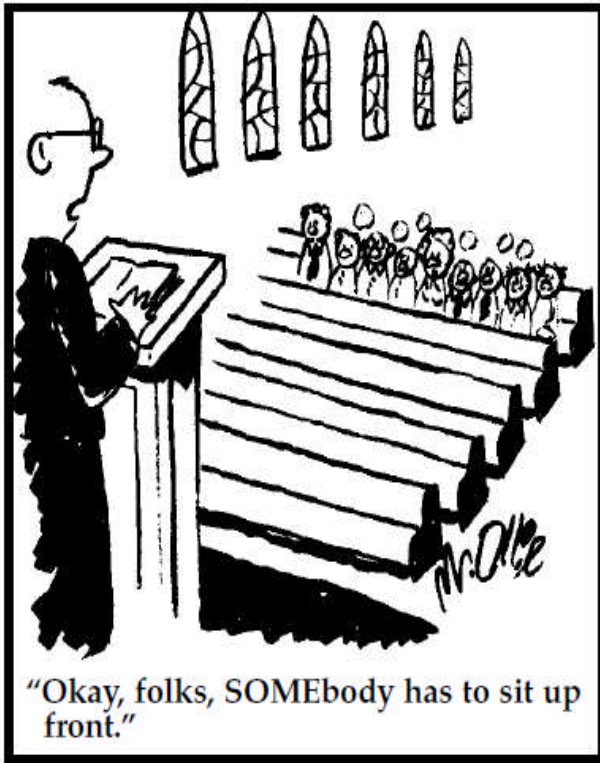

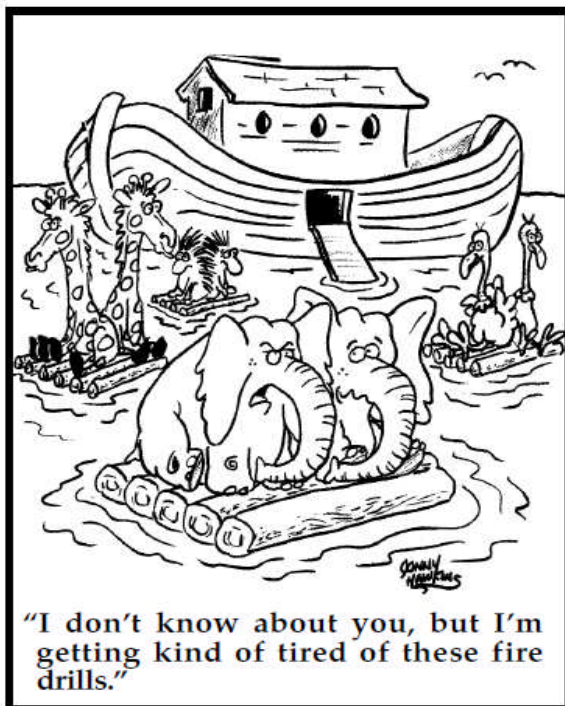
