



The regular meeting of the Council was held on June 11th. Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses in the "Daily Texts." Readings were from Daniel 7:14 and Hebrews 13:8. The first is uplifting, speaking of the unchanging Earth and responsible Dominion. The second reminds us that God is Everlasting. 




