

The regular meeting of the Council was held on November 11th. We praise God and rejoice for the healing and improvement for Roseanne Emery.

Vicki led devotions from Jeremiah 18:14-15 and Matthew 23:37. The first speaks to us about taking time to acknowledge blessings; not taking things for granted. "Oh give thanks unto the Lord for he is good and his mercy endures forever." As a child, this was our closing prayer at mealtime. I remember it well and often as I think of all the ways that God has surrounded me with goodness and grace.

Our celebration of Thanksgiving is here. We have much to be thankful for personally and as community. We are able to praise God and extend love and care through actions of generosity.

Our Stewardship Emphasis, "Living Generously," has given us a glimpse into the life a family and those this family has blessed.

Our third visit had us watching Frank's journey toward understanding generous living. He was affected by his dream and determined to be more generous. An interaction with Re led Frank to the soup kitchen, and Frank is encouraged to do more than pull out his checkbook. He found himself working in the kitchen. Serving stretches Frank, and he found that he has much to learn about helping people.

The soup kitchen gives Frank a taste of generous living and Re imparts wisdom that by becoming poor we are following Christ's example. Jesus calls us to become poor and serve so that we can show them God's love. And the question we are left with is, "Are you serving yourself, or are you serving others?"

In our fourth visit, we will see that all of the Donovan family has gotten involved in serving at the soup kitchen, and Frank is different. He is reexamining his financial strategies and making changes, but Frank still believes he is in control of developing a safe future for his family. Then he gets the phone call. Cassie, Frank's wife, was mugged. The doctor in the hospital tells Frank that she is in a coma to stop her brain from bleeding. There is nothing Frank can do.

Frank joins Re at the top of the hospital where Re shares about his wife's battle with cancer. He shares the word the Lord gave him during that time, "The name of the Lord is a strong tower. The righteous run to it and are safe. The rich man's wealth is his strong city..." Cancer taught Re that God is the real Strong Tower, not anything that could be built with human hands. Re continues by saying worldly security is fleeting. To love is to be vulnerable, but God's faithfulness is forever. Running to the name of the Lord is trusting in Him. And the questions we are left with are, "Where do you run in the day of trouble? Are you investing in the temporary or the eternal?"

In our fifth and final visit, we will see a television depicting news of the financial crisis, but Cassie is home from the hospital. Great things are happening at the soup kitchen. A construction company is there promising to fix the old building and to hire the soup kitchen's clients to assist with the repairs. Re suspects Frank is involved in their promises, but Frank is evasive to Re's questions. Later, Frank tells Cassie that her accident showed him that he couldn't protect his family from hardship. He tells her that he wants to take risks and trust God. They agree to an entire shift towards a lifestyle of living generously. The whole Donovan family – Frank, Cassie & their 2 children - meets with the financial advisor to tell him they want to make their money more accessible so they can be more generous.

Later, Re talks about how God wants us to take risks. In the story of the talents, God only rebukes the servant that buried his talent. Re quotes Matthew Henry, who said, "Our present time is seedtime, in the other world we shall reap as we sow now." Our story concludes with Re joyfully throwing seed into the air. The questions we are left with are, "What are you doing with the resources of time, treasure, and talent that God has given you? Are you living generously?"

I pray that we might offer prayers of thanks and orient our lives in such a way that living generously becomes more than words on a page, it becomes our way of life.

- "Get dressed, you married gentlemen, get huffing you this May."


