The regular meeting of the Council was held on March 8th. The Council shared their prayer concerns for those who mourn, those facing death, those seeking healing of health conditions, those missing in relationships and praying for peace from all of the violence afflicting our country.

Devotions: Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses in the "Daily Texts" from Exodus 33:19 and 1 Timothy 1:12-13. The first tells us that God is the One who decides who will receive grace and mercy. The second teaches us that God's mercy is for all regardless of their past actions.

Visions for Ministry: The author discussed leadership versus empowerment, explained the basic difference between the two concepts, and how we use those ideas to determine success. He also talked about how we understand different measures used to achieve a result versus the actual result, which can differ based on the way we view the information. There can be quite a difference in our view of the result based on whether we look at it intellectually or emotionally. We will read part 1 pages 26-40 and take the survey if you haven't already.

As you read this, I will be recovering from hip replacement surgery. My left hip has been on a downward spiral for a number of years. I finally made the decision to undergo surgery to remedy this painful and limiting situation. I would appreciate your prayers for full and complete

healing. I long to be well so that I might serve you, God's people, well.

Some thoughts in this post Easter time. On Easter Sunday, in the gospel of John we met Mary Magdalene in the haze of dawn. She comes to the tomb and the stone of death is rolled away. Peter and the beloved disciple race to the tomb and see the empty linens. There are glimmers of life in this absence of death. After the men leave, Mary waits outside and weeps as she is questioned by angels, and then sees Christ's face which she does not recognize. Those of us who know the story want to burst into the story and begin the proclamation: He is risen! He is risen indeed! We can see the marks of the resurrection, but Mary cannot until she hears the voice of Jesus and cries out "Rabbouni!"

Jesus Christ promises to be with us, but sometimes we do not recognize him. Easter Sunday we sat in our service, drenched in the proclamation of the resurrection, but will we recognize the risen Christ when we meet him on Monday or any other day of the week? Christ comes to us each and every day, but sometimes we do not recognize him. We are made in the image of God and so Christ resides in all of us, when we feed one another, when we offer help to our neighbor, and when we forgive our enemies. Let us live in the promise of Easter morning and cry out with Mary, "I have seen the Lord." (John 20:18) as we bear witness to Christ's love manifest in us.

So, we have now entered the 50 days of Easter. This gives us seven weeks to celebrate God's amazing gift of love as seen through the resurrection of Christ. It gives us the opportunity to look with new eyes at all the ways God meets us in the ordinary encounters of each day. Maybe with Mary, we need to be greeted with Christ in human form for us to recognize the abiding presence of God.

Keep your eyes open to the ways God will appear to you! A blessed Easter to one and all.

Mischievous organists who tickle churchgoers

A recent church research survey indicated that many church organists have a mischievous sense of humor and occasionally play pranks on congregations or exact subtle revenge on clergy who displease them.

Half of 2,000 churchgoers polled by Christian Research said they had noticed an organist slipping unexpected, playful tunes into services, reported JN consulting editor Rev. Dr. Karl R. Kraft of Dover, DE.

Tactics included slipping snippets of heavy metal classics, advertising jingles, and even nursery rhymes into hymns and anthems. For instance, an organist in Scotland who had a falling out with his church's clergy retaliated by inserting a rendition of "Send in the Clowns" as the clergy processed in for a Sunday service.

Another pastor fired an organist after he played "Roll out the Barrel" at the funeral of a man who had a reputation for being fond of beer. Another organist spiced up some orthodox choral music with the tunes "I'm Forever Blowing Bubbles" and "I'm a Barbie Girl."

One parishioner reported that "we had an organist at our church who played every hymn as if it were an 'all skate' at the local roller rink. Old Rugged Cross to 6/8 time is unique at best."

Still another organist had the congregation bursting with laughter when he played a slowed-down version of "Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious" from Mary Poppins.



Stephen Goddard, of Christian Research, commented: "Hidden from view, your local church organist may appear unassuming and selfdeprecating, but like any true artist, he or she can be eccentric, mischievous, and very opinionated. Mess with him/her at your own peril."

Earth Day Begins at Home

There are plenty of ways you can make every day Earth Day. Improve your own small part of the planet by considering these suggestions for spring-cleaning, garden preparation, and home improvements.

Purchase non-toxic cleaning products. Use natural fiber sponges and cleaning agents that are biodegradable, phosphate-free, chlorine-free, and unscented.

Reduce paper use. Use rags instead of paper towels; cloth napkins instead of paper ones. Buy post-consumer recycled paper and recycle it when you have used it.

Refurbish responsibly. Use water-based or vegetable-based paints, stains, and varnishes. Don't wash paint thinners, household cleaners, oil, or pesticides down the drain or pour them on the ground; use them up, give leftovers to friends or a charity, or dispose at your local toxic waste disposal center.

Repair instead of replace. Reupholster furniture. Resole your shoes.

Replace disposable goods with renewable ones. Buy rechargeable batteries. Use dishes instead of paper plates.



Plant for the planet. Strengthen your garden's resistance to pests by planting resilient plants, by rotating the fruits and vegetables you plant, and by attracting friendly bugs to prey on the pesky ones.
