The regular meeting of the Council was held on September 13th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns for healing of family and friends, for comfort to those dealing with the death of a loved one, for the people who have lost their homes to fire, flooding, bombings, etc., praise for Ron’s recovery and return to good health, and for stability and peace in Sudan and Syria.

Pastor Laaker led devotions from Psalm 3:2-3 and Mark 1:40-41. The first tells that even when surrounded by those who doubt God, we should find comfort in knowing that God is with us lifting us up. The second shows that God has compassion and love for us – all we need is to turn to God and ask for God’s presence in our lives.

Visions for Ministry: The author presented the idea that for those in a leadership role it isn’t always in the best interest of a group to take the easy route or the route that the majority chooses; but, rather, to challenge the group to take bold moves. However, it’s important also to maintain a healthy balance by nurturing steady progress, as well. Read pages 99-123 for next month.

Committee Reports: Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

Christian Education: The ELCA has put together a study document in preparation of a social statement regarding sexism and justice for women in the church. We have a year to review, then modifications will be made, and it will be available for review once more before it is voted on at the next church-wide assembly. Pastor provided information on the Declaration on the Way, which consists of 32 statements on how the Roman Catholic and Lutheran churches agree on certain issues.

Evangelism/Outreach: Grace Reads has begun a new school year. We have added 3rd grade classes this year along with the 2nd grade classes. Spring Lake School had some hesitation based on past experience with volunteer groups not following through with their commitment. We are waiting to hear back from them. Neighborhood Cleanup took place this past Sunday as part of God’s Work Our Hands. Halloween is approaching...so we need to start talking about whether or not we want to put on a Halloween party this year. We will plan to meet briefly after church on Sunday, September 25th. Arlone & Amanda have offered to submit for Thrivent Action dollars to help with costs.

Malachi talked about how he works with prison ministry and invited anyone who may be interested to become a sponsor, or as a church to be a location for one of the services. We could also choose to provide a meal for the group following the service. The size of group is usually around 50-60 people.

Finance: Health care costs will rise about 5% next year.

Property: Carpet installation was completed. We do have extra pieces of carpet that we can use to replace the old carpet behind the altar if we have volunteers willing to help with that. New street signs are all up. The cracked ceiling and repair is under way. There was a water leak in our entryway, so the work that was done did not fix the problem. The company that made those repairs will be back out sometime to look more closely at the issue. MUD is out replacing water and gas lines in the area, so hopefully they will take care of it before the cold sets in. Roger Meisinger (who has ties to the Hufford family) had the old Grace Lutheran Church stained glass window in his attic and recently gave it back to us. We will look at options for displaying it.

Service/Social Ministry: Habitat for Humanity Neighbors South Coalition will be completed and the dedication will take place Saturday, October 29th.

Support/Stewardship: None.

Worship: This Sunday, September 18th we will go out on the River City Star with St. Luke’s for worship service and will follow with a potluck here at Grace. The Nebraska Brass has chosen Grace as a location for their June 15th, 2017 concert.

Unfinished Business: Remember to continue following the election. OTOC will be hosting a candidate forum in October, if you’re interested in attending.



I've been thinking about all the things that happen in October. Yes, there's Halloween but I was thinking more about the opportunities presented to us to make a difference in another person's life. On Sunday, September 25, in the Gospel of Luke, we heard Jesus tell the story about the rich man and Lazarus. As I opened my

most recent email from Habitat for Humanity-Building on Faith, there was this engaging quote from Mother Teresa:

"Poverty doesn't only consist of being hungry for bread, but rather it is a tremendous hunger for human dignity. We need to love and to be somebody for someone else. This is where we make our mistake and shove people aside. Not only have we denied the poor a piece of bread, but by thinking that they have no worth and leaving them abandoned in the streets, we have denied them the human dignity that is rightfully theirs as children of God."

On Sunday, October 9, we have the opportunity to support the Omaha CROP Walk. We have individuals walking in the walk and they need sponsors. Donations to CROP not only help to provide bread for hungry people but they also help individuals and communities develop resources that give them dignity and the capacity to provide for themselves and their families.

On Sunday, October 16, we will share information about the organization called Bread for the World. This organization invites us as Christians to write letters to our elected Congress people asking them to focus their designation of resources on the nutrition and health of mothers and children around the world. We can help Congress to affirm and provide additional resources to accelerate global progress against malnutrition.

On Monday, October 17, Omaha Together One Community invites us to participate in an Accountability Session that will address the two Candidates for US Congress and the Candidates for OPPD Board District 5. Where do our congressional candidates stand on issues like affordable health care for all and fair treatment of immigrants and refugees? Where do our OPPD candidates stand on OPPD's increased fixed service fee and transparency in Board Decision making?

Finally at the end of the month, Sunday, October 30, we will celebrate the Reformation. Kathryn A Kleinhans writes, "Each year, the students in my Lutheran heritage class at Wartburg College, Waverly, Iowa, read Martin Luther's Ninety-five Theses. 'What surprised you?' I ask them. Typically the biggest surprise is what the Ninety-five Theses are not: They are not a laundry list of all the things Luther didn't like about the Roman Catholic Church. What they are is an academic argument focused on one specific topic - indulgences."

We learned that in the ELCA Churchwide Assembly on August 10, the ELCA Church Council brought a resolution "to express profound gratitude for "Declaration on the Way: Church, Ministry and Eucharist" as another sign of the ELCA's commitment to making visible the unity that is God's gift in Christ {with the Roman Catholic Church}...and received the thirty-two Statements of Agreement, acknowledging that "receiving these agreements recognizes that there are no longer church dividing issues with respect to these Statements and to commend to the ELCA the "Declaration on the Way," "From Conflict to Communion" and the "Joint Declaration on the Doctrine of Justification" as resources for the common life of the church as we approach 2017 and beyond." The joyful recognition of this document draws together a litany of 32 consensus statements, where Catholics and Lutherans already have said there are not church-dividing differences between them.

We have come a long way in 499 years since the Reformation began. Next year, we celebrate the 500th Anniversary. I wonder what God has in mind for the church?

So, you see, there are significant things that challenge us, things that shape and form us and there are opportunities to put our faith into action. How will God work through you and me?



Death Penalty Referendum

In the last month, there have been several headlines that have captured the attention of Nebraskans. One had to do with the cost of keeping the Death Penalty in Nebraska. Another had to do with the language on the ballot. There were other headlines, too.

In 2015, the Nebraska Legislature voted to end the death penalty in Nebraska. The vote to end the death penalty was supported by 16 Republicans, 13 Democrats and 1 Independent. Following this vote, a ballot measure was put underway to restore the death penalty and was successful in putting this on this November’s ballot.

I wrote earlier that the ELCA adopted a Social Statement in 1991 specifically on “The Death Penalty.” In the Social Statement it says, “We begin by assuming that government plays a God-given, protective role. “God entrusts the state with power to take human life when failure to do so constitutes a clear danger to society” (p. 2). This view is qualified, though: “[T]his does not mean that governments have an unlimited right to take life” or “must punish crime by death” (p. 2). The text quickly questions whether it is even possible to administer the death penalty justly. By the end, the social statement concludes that it is not.

“Three reasons are given to oppose capital punishment: 1) executions represent an unacceptable, non-restorative approach to violent crime; 2) executions can reinforce social injustice; and 3) the death penalty cannot possibly be administered justly.”

In an Op-Ed Commentary piece within the Omaha World Herald, on Monday, September 19, Tom Venzor, the Executive Director for the Nebraska Catholic Conference, summed up the Roman Catholic stance on the death penalty. He ended his commentary by saying, “the bishops of Nebraska urge Catholics and all people of good will to vote to retain the repeal of the death penalty this November.”

While I honor those whose opinions differ, I will be voting to Retain the Referendum Measure 426. I believe this bipartisan solution to replace the death penalty with mandatory life without parole is the direction my Christian conscience calls me to support.

GAME hosts Tuesday evening Bible studies downtown at SOZO coffeehouse on Jones St. Each week a meal is prepared, a small worship service is had, and we break down parts of the Bible based on the book of study or topic selected (currently in Mark). GAME also does service projects while collaborating with various organizations such as Open Door Mission and Stand Down for homeless veterans. Additionally, they offer weekly and monthly venues and events as ways of fellowship and healthy social growth. Their target group is young adult professionals, but they have a wide range of participants.

These are just two of several groups I am a part of that have greatly shaped my experiences here in Omaha. In conjunction with my work with Grace, these have given me extended opportunities to serve and be served through ministry, fellowship, and growing in the Word. I am blessed to be a part of such great ministries and hope to build new collaborations in the future through some of the partnerships and connections I have made in Omaha. 

Keep Your Home Performing

home bright:

As the days get darker, we turn the lights on earlier and leave them on more each day. Lighting accounts for about a quarter of all electricity consumed in the U.S. Here are some ways to lighten the energy load while keeping your

Replacing light bulbs. Regular incandescent light bulbs are inefficient, with 90% of their energy going to generate heat not light. Replace standard lamps with compact fluorescent (CFL) bulbs - they cost more per bulb but are far more efficient and last up to ten times longer. Over the life of one CFL, you can avoid replaing up to 13 incandescent bulbs and use 75% less energy!

Use lighting controls.

Photocells turn lights on and off in response to natural light levels - for example, on at dusk and off at dawn.



Crank timers, which are spring-driven and similar to old oven timers, limit lights to short durations where the need for light is brief.

Occupany sensors activate lights when you enter a room and turn them off after you leave. They are good for areas of infrequent use, such as storerooms.

Dimmers reduce the wattage and output of light bulbs. They also significantly increase the life of the incandescent bulbs.

Don't overuse kitchen and bathroom ventilation fans. Left on for too long, these fans can pull out much of your heated air.

Clean fixtures and lamps annually by wiping off the dust (make sure the bulb is cool first).

Clean or repaint walls. Dirt on surfaces reduces the amount of light they reflect and make the room feel darker.

Turn off incandescent lights when you are not using them, even if you are just leaving the room for a few minutes.


