The summer months are quickly coming to a close. Schools have begun and fall ministry emphases are underway. In September, we will observe God's Work, Our Hands on Sunday, September 11. On Sunday, September 18, we will gather with folks from both Grace and St. Luke's

for a morning ride and worship on the River City Star. A potluck meal will round out the morning after the boat ride at Grace. In early October, we will once again offer folks the opportunity to participate in the Omaha CROP Walk for Hunger.

In the middle of August, the ELCA gathered for 2016 Churchwide Assembly in New Orleans. The theme was "Freed and Renewed in Christ." The days were filled with worship, bible study, reports and updates on ministries, workshops and fellowship. The Nebraska Synod has shared a synopsis of this event on its website: www.nebraskasynod.org

I would like to highlight a couple of actions taken by the Assembly. You may recall that I, and a couple others, had submitted a resolution to the Nebraska Synod Assembly calling on the Assembly to memorialize the ELCA Churchwide Assembly to repudiate the "doctrine of discovery." Here is a brief description: "The Doctrine of Discovery was promulgated by European monarchies in order to legitimize the colonization of lands outside of Europe. Between the mid-fifteenth century and the mid-twentieth century, this idea allowed European entities to seize lands inhabited by indigenous peoples under the guise of discovery. In 1494, the <u>Treaty of Todesillas</u> declared that only non-Christian lands could be colonized under the Discovery Doctrine.

"In 1792, U.S. Secretary of State <u>Thomas Jefferson</u> declared that the Doctrine of the Discovery would extend from Europe to the infant U.S. government. The Doctrine and its legacy continue to influence <u>American imperialism</u> and treatment of conquered <u>indigenous</u> peoples." (Wikipedia)

I am grateful that the ELCA Churchwide Assembly adopted this repudiation of the "doctrine of discovery." Efforts will now be made toward public recognition of our Christian complicity in the marginalization of Native peoples. ## **Back to School Green Tips**



We all know instilling good habits is easiest when we're young, so more and more parents and educators are working to make kids aware of the importance of caring for our planet. As kids get ready to return to school in the fall, here are some simple tips to encourage sustainable habits and healthy kids!

Safe (and Sustainable) Routes to School. Instead of driving alone, start a carpool, bike train, or group walk and take turns with other parents int he neighborhood to drop off and pick up the kids. You'll each save time, energy, and fuel.

Lunch break. Pack kids' lunches in sturdy metal lunch pails or canvas bags instead of throwaway paper and plastic bags.

It might seem obvious, but check out your school's recycling

programs. Ask whether recycling bins are available and accessible - and if the kids are encouraged to use them. Make sure your child knows what can be recycled and what can't.

Make smart decisions while shopping. Buy school supplies with less packaging and seek those made with organic and/or recycled materials. Consider investing in sturdier products - this can ensure years of use from commonly used items like backpacks. You can also make environmentallyfriendly choices when buying back-to-school clothes.

**Re-use school supplies that are in good condition.** When you are in the middle of the back-to-school shopping frenzy, it's sometimes easy to forget about all those items you have at home that are still in good working condition. Binders, loose leaf paper, pencils and scissors are often only lightly used. Save money and resources by buying only what's really needed!

**Keep children in touch with nature.** After-school time used to involve catching fireflies, exploring the neighborhood woods, making mudpies, and just having a good time running around outside. This has changed dramatically in the digital age and children are less connected to nature, which can cause them to care less about its condition. Instead of plopping down in front of the T.V. or computer after school, encourage your kids to get outside for an hour or two each day. Not much daylight left after the homework's done? Take a family walk after dinner, devote your weekends to outdoor-only activities like biking and hiking. Studies have shown children who spend more time outside are less likely to suffer from obesity, Attention Deficit Disorder, and depression.



With its inception in 1969, CROP Hunger Walks are "viewed by many as the granddaddy of charity walks," notes the Los Angeles Times (Oct. 26, 2009).

On October 17, 1969, a thousand people in Bismarck, ND, walked in what may have been the start of the hunger walks related to CROP – and raised \$25,000 to help stop hunger. As far as we know, York County, Penn., was the first walk officially called the CROP Walk for the Hungry – and that event has been continuous since 1970. Several other CROP Hunger Walks occurred soon thereafter, and before long there were hundreds of Walks each year in communities nationwide.

Currently, well over 2,000 communities across the U.S. join in more than 1,000 CROP Hunger Walks each year. More than five million CROP Hunger Walkers have participated in more than 36,000 CROP Hunger Walks in the last two decades alone.

This year's CROP Hunger Walk in Omaha will be Sunday, October 9th with registration at 1:00 p.m. and the walk starting at 2:00 p.m. at the Luther Memorial Lutheran Church at 61st and Western Avenue.

Local agencies receiving funds will be Open Door Mission, Siena Francis House, and the Stephens Center.

Among more than three dozen legislative actions, the Churchwide Assembly:

- Overwhelmingly affirmed the "Declaration on the Way," a document noting 32 principles of agreement between Roman Catholics and Lutherans. The document is commended as a study resource as Catholics and Lutherans strive toward sharing Communion and ministry.
- Adopted strategies toward greater diversity within the ELCA (whose minority members represent only 6 percent of its membership) through intentional outreach and raising awareness of both overt and subtle racism in the U.S.
- Adopted the AMMPARO (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities) strategy for addressing the complex issue of minors fleeing violence in Central America.
- Elected William B. "Bill" Horne II of Florida to a six-year term as vice president of the ELCA.
- Adopted annual budgets for the next three years of approximately \$64 million annually for ELCA ministries and \$25 million for World Hunger.
- Affirmed efforts to support veterans and their families, military chaplains and all affected by war.
- Adopted strategies for positive investment aimed at supporting peace in Israel and Palestine and reduced energy usage and reliance on fossil fuels.


