The regular meeting of the Council was held November 11th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: Care for those in need of healing; Bobby Heesacker, Julie Hovey, Susan Goodrich, Herbert Fitle; care for those within the Grace family that they continue to heal; we pray for Ron Andersen Jr., Teri Briley, Sandy Fitzgerald that they stay strong during their battle with cancer; we pray for Richard Moore and his recovery from pneumonia; we pray for all who have lost loved ones and that they remain steadfast in hope; we pray for an end to all of the unrest and conflict in the world; we pray for Veterans and their families on Veterans Day; we pray in praise to the families of the military and all who have come home safely; we pray for wisdom for the newly elected leaders and officials; we pray for wisdom in the agencies that have changes upcoming due to recent voting outcomes. Pastor led devotions from Psalm 2:12 and John 6:68 both verses take comfort in knowing the one we seek refuge with, our King and Savior.

From the Pastor

Endings and Beginnings.



Life is a series of endings and beginnings. We also experience those same endings and beginnings in the rhythm of church life. In a few short days, we will end our church year with the celebration of Christ the King. Then on the following week, we will begin once again with the Season

of Advent. Advent is a time of beginnings, a time of promise and hope.

Herbert Brokering wrote some stories that he and his wife Lois shared together over their 58 years of marriage. The first story that he shared was titled: Angels.

"Once upon a time God created the beginning of everything to be fruitful and multiply, to keep living, to be bloom and be seed, to reproduce. Figuring out how to live keeps people very busy thinking, talking, sharing, exploring, and researching. When something new is discovered people are in awe. Sometimes they pray, or are silent, or run and tell what they saw, sing, laugh, and take a picture.

"Once upon a time I saw Jack-Frost on my window that looked like an angel. It was a Saturday morning when I was eight. I watched it until it slowly was erased by sunlight. I pretended that it came from far away and visited me in this winter night. My prayers at night always had angels in them so the angel on the window belonged there.

"Once upon a time I had a dream. An angel met me in my barn, up in the hay loft, and told me something that was comforting. It is a long story I have remembered for seventy years.

"Once upon a time a man was in a burning car. He said an angel in white reached through the open window and pulled him out, laid him on the road, then drove off in a white truck. An ambulance came in three minutes. It was an angel of Hope.

"Once upon a time an angel came in the night and told a man in my childhood parish that he would soon hold a young man who was dying. He told his family at breakfast. It happened the next afternoon. He held my dying brother after the accident.

"What is your 'Once upon a time' angel story?

"Angels visit people of God throughout the Bible and through the whole world. Some are in white with wings. Some are hosts in the sky over Bethlehem. Some wear nursing caps, some dress like fire fighters, some swim, some fly, some are like mothers. Some say, 'Lo and blessed are you.' Some say: 'Hold on! Don't give up! You can be sure! Help is coming! You will not be forgotten! God loves you!' These are angels of God full of hope and reminding us of promises.

"Angels know the truth. They are God's messengers. All of life is their work. The world is full of angel stories, in the Bible and in books, and inside people we know. Look, listen, be still: and angel of God is visiting us.

"What is your angel story?"

As we begin the new season of Advent, let us look for places of hope and promise.

Everything we have comes from God's bountiful hand and is a blessing to us from Him. Our response to His provision should be one of contentment and thanksgiving, realizing that God is indeed our Source.

But our response should be much more than that. Because of God's love for us, and because He has demonstrated that love in so many ways, we should seek to cultivate a stewardship lifestyle. A steward-ship lifestyle is one which realizes that our role is that of a manager, a steward, who is accountable to God for the use of the resources — time, talents and treasure — which He has given to us.

Stewardship, in fact, has been compared to a three-legged stool. Remove one of the legs, and the stool cannot stand. But when all three legs are present, then the stool is able to do that for which it was designed. Similarly, a stewardship lifestyle consists of time, talents and treasure, all of which are gifts from God and all of which are to be used for God's glory.

God's servant, Moses, gave us tremendous insight concerning the "treasure" aspect of stewardship when he wrote in Deuteronomy chapter 8: "... remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth." For that reason, there is no such thing as a self-made man or woman.

That's why our role is not one of ownership, but that of a manager, a steward, of what God has given to us. What's the difference between an owner and a manger? An owner has rights; a manager has responsibilities. That's why we hold our possessions with an open hand — not a clenched fist — realizing that everything is a gift from God. And as we do so, we seek to put first things first.

In describing exactly how we are to do that, Jesus said, "... store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matt. 6:20-21).

How do we lay up treasures in heaven? How do we seek first God's kingdom when it comes to financial matters? How can we who have been blessed by God in turn be a blessing? One of the primary ways is by giving to the ministry here at Grace Lutheran Church. Our giving to God is thus a

response to His blessings in our life and to His love for us. We do not give to prove anything or to earn anything. Rather, we give out of joyful hearts that have been redeemed by God's grace and in response to all He has done for us.

Total stewardship consists of giving to God our time, our talents and our treasure. But even as we emphasize those three important elements, let's remember that the "treasure" aspect is very important. In some ways, it is the culmination of a stewardship lifestyle. As one person expressed it so vividly before the offering was received in his church, "Lord, in spite of all we say or do, this is what we think of you."

Thank you for giving of yourself, of your time, of your talents and of your treasure to the work of the Lord here at Grace Lutheran Church. Thank you for following the pattern of Abraham who realized he had been blessed by God to be a blessing to others. Thank you for seeking God's direction concerning your financial support of this ministry as part of this year's stewardship emphasis. And thank you for being faithful to the Lord as you covenant with Him concerning your giving in the future. Remember, we have been "blessed by God to be a blessing."

2 Peter 1:3-4 (The Message)

My husband's family is a little more formal than mine. Each Thanksgiving season, my husband's sister and brother-in-law, Deb and Bob, send out formal invitations to each of the family members, inviting us to celebrate Thanksgiving at their home. They thoughtfully prepare the sumptuous Turkey with all the fixing's, supplemented by specialties each of us is known for...Orange Tapioca Salad from me, Dan's special three layer cake filled with cream and cherry or blueberry pie filling, Kay's Baked Beans, Mom Reents Rice Pudding, and other goodies that cause me to salivate as I write. My family is less formal, preferring to pass the word around as to the "where, when and what to bring" details. Our meal is also filled with traditional foods, time together and thanks to God for His bounty.

As I was reading in 2 Peter, chapter 1 this evening, I found another invitation in verses 3 and 4. God has given me an invitation to have a personal and intimate life with Him. Not only that but the beginning of the passage says that "*Everything that goes into a life of pleasing God has been miraculously given to us...by the One who invited us to God.*" This invitation does not require me to bring a "dish to share!" It's all been provided through Jesus Christ.

So what will happen if I accept His invitation ? The passage goes on.

"...building on what you've been given,

(that is "Getting to know Him personally and intimately." Verse 3)

complementing your basic faith with

good character,

- spiritual understanding,
 - alert discipline,
- passionate patience,
- reverent wonder,
- warm friendliness,
- and generous love,

each dimension fitting into and developing the others."

2 Peter 1:5-9 (Bullets and Parenthesis, mine)

Every invitation deserves a response. Verses 10 and 11 put it this way;

"So, friends, confirm God's invitation to you, his choice of you. Don't put it off; do it now. Do this, and you'll have your life on a firm footing, the streets paved and the way wide open into the eternal kingdom of our Master and Savior, Jesus Christ."

Do you know God "personally and intimately?" The invitation is there as well as the provisions to make it possible. All you have to do is respond to the invitation by saying,

"Yes, Lord. I want to live a life pleasing to You. I accept your invitation to know you personally."

That <u>IS</u> the best invitation you'll ever receive.

Building Communication and Relationships through Ministry



When I began working with Interfaith Health Service several years ago, I remember distinctly that Pastor Laaker talked to me about the importance of "building relationships" with others in ministry. He asked me what kind of relationships I considered myself forming with others. My response was that I believed wholeheartedly in the "ministry of presence" in any relationship. I believed in listening to the stories of others, of showing up and demonstrating

though consistently following through on presence and commitments that I cared. This, I reasoned, would help others develop trust in me, while consistent dialogue and actively seeking to get to know each other would help deepen the relationship both ways.

A story of building relationships was re-affirmed for me this month when one of our Interfaith Latinas in Action participants stopped by my house late one weekend to ask for help in filling out some college scholarship materials. I have known this particular participant, "Elizabeth", for as long as Interfaith's ministry has been in place in South Omaha. I am amazed at Elizabeth and the person she is-assured, intelligent, caring, articulate, funny. Elizabeth and I spent time on her scholarship materials for several days. I also wrote some letters of recommendation for her, writing from my heart about her many gifts.

I was more than thrilled to hear from Elizabeth last week that she won the Nebraska Heartland Scholarship she applied to receive. I was honored to be asked to accompany her to the presentation of her scholarship. I was also struck by how blessed I am to know people like Elizabeth and her family. Just hearing from Elizabeth via email or phone calls each week can brighten my day and guarantees a smile. It helps me remember that a relationship is a two way street. Sure, I was able to help Elizabeth formulate her scholarship responses and help her tell her story to the scholarship committee, but that was a very easy task given the wonderful person she is. Elizabeth, in turn, was able to do much more for me in helping me connect with her as she shared the gift of her presence and her deepening life story with me.

The Economy and our Faith

"Not that I am referring to being in need; for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through Him who strengthens me." Philippians 4:11-13

The economic upheaval of the past month has been very difficult. The market turmoil and uncertainty has left many shaken, riddled with anxiety and fear. Feeling out of control has replaced a sense of safety for some, and worry has escalated for others. In the midst of

times such as this, we must ask **are we any different than others because of our faith**? Does our faith shape our response to these challenges?

Please allow me to make some straightforward faith statements in the face of such fears:

Our security has never been tied to this world. We are a people of God's kingdom who trust in the power of the cross, the amazing grace of our Creator, and the encouragement of God's ever-present Spirit. We do not place our confidence in things of this world. Jesus spoke clearly: "Store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal." (Matthew 6:20)

All of life is a gift received. Daily we recognize our vulnerability and our fragile nature. "From dust we came, to dust we return." Therefore we cherish the goodness of living in the midst of all circumstances. We also recognize God's profound care over all of life: "If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's." (Romans 14:8) Life is not a problem to be solved, but a mystery to be embraced and affirmed.

Christian insight gives perspective. These are tough financial times, but as followers of Jesus we see the overall picture. When a Tanzanian exchange pastor arrived in Kimball, she heard of the severe seven-year drought in that part of the state and of its devastation. She responded with empathy: "Tsk. Tsk. Pole. (I am so sorry.) Tell me, how far do you have to walk for water?" Without meaning to, she offered perspective which gave rise to a new reality and a genuine gratitude.

Hard times have the ability to sensitize us to our shared humanity. Sometimes we become insulated to the vulnerability and challenges others live with day after day. This may be a time of unique possibility because so many are desperately hurting and need the response of others. Will they become the face of God for us to serve and to care for? It is during such times, that the poorest of the poor hurt ever more. Will we respond to Jesus' challenge to care beyond ourselves?

Faithful stewardship is always an expression of our response to the Grace of God. We recognize with clarity that we own nothing, but only hold as managers all of God's gifts. What will we do with what we have been entrusted? While it may be that surplus sharing will not be possible, will sacrificial sharing be given? Rather than giving from "leftovers" for God's purposes, we need to make choices that express what is genuinely important to us. Will we live love with the grace and courage of Jesus? "Together, we live love with the grace and courage of Jesus."

Because priorities are re-awakened, the Church has been strong through the hardest of times.

In times of challenge, questions of what is genuinely important inform our lives. Peripheral matters become just that as we strive to live faithfully. God's kind care will not abandon us. Nor is our calling to be about mission and ministry lessened. We are a servant people striving to shine the light of Christ's love in a hurting and darkened world. Here is our opportunity to truly be a different people ... God's people!

May God bless you and use you as you respond to God's goodness and God's calling. Blessings!
