Service/Social Ministry: No new report.


Support/Stewardship: The Sudanese Fellowship Non-profit organization will be a work in progress

The Church Council and I have begun reading a book, "Radical Welcome," by Stephanie Sellers. In the foreword, Rev. Steven Charleston says, "This is not a 'feel good' book. It is not about how we should all be nice to strangers at coffee hour. This is a book about the very hard challenges that face any of us when we decided to step outside of our isolation for the sake of the gospel." Well, I have to admit when I read those words, I thought, oops, I probably should have made a different choice for our reading this year. As we have begun to read the book, I am glad I made the choice. Yes, it will make us step outside of our comfort zones but this is important work as we seek to be the body of Christ in this place.

You may recall that last month I invited you into the journey of Lent. Well, now I'd like to invite you into the Radical Welcome

journey. The author asks, "Has God whispered in your ear or tugged your sleeve, urging you to step off the curb and onto this road?" Yes, God has been more than whispering in my ear for some time. In fact, at times, it feels like God is yelling. Some of the author's descriptions of how you know this communication is from God reinforce my sense that God desires this stepping off. A couple of those clues are 1) the neighborhood has changed 2) you know you want to see your church become radically welcoming 3) you've begun the journey toward radical change, but now you need to reckon with your history, fear (your own and the others) complacency or a host of other challenges.

The author asks very probing questions: "What new thing is God calling me to be and to do?" and "What support, education, training and practices would help me to follow through on what I now imagine for myself and my congregation?" I suspect I will wrestle with these questions for some time.

Her description of radical welcome is this: Radical Welcome is a fundamental spiritual practice, one that combines the universal Christian ministry of welcome and hospitality with a clear awareness of power and patterns of inclusion and exclusion. She then describes a church as "radically welcoming" when it means "the community seeks to welcome the voices, presence and power of many groups – especially those who have been defined as The Other, pushed to the margins, cast out, silenced, and closeted – in order to help shape the congregation's common life and mission." Wow!

Some marks of the community that seeks to achieve this radical welcome are:

- **Hospitable:** They seek to offer a gracious, warm space to all people, especially those who have been defined as "Other," systematically disempowered and oppressed, pushed to the margins.
- **Connected:** They link to their neighbors, to their neighborhood, to brothers and sisters beyond their neighborhood.
- **Open to conversation:** They attempt to listen carefully, to make room for, share power with, and learn from groups who've been silenced, closeted and disempowered, and they are open to genuine conversation and transformation based on this encounter.

**Intentional:** They engage in training, research, active listening, strategic planning. **Comprehensive:** They recognize that the work cannot be left to a specialized ministry area, it is a way of being.



**Becoming:** They realize this journey is never finished, so they are always becoming. **Beyond diversity:** They understand that radical welcome is not merely about diversity, evangelism, multiculturalism, inclusion, or getting it "right." It is about being faithful disciples of Christ. **Faithful:** They honor radical transformation not as a necessary evil...but because they are saying "yes" to God's gracious invitation to welcome as Christ welcomes.

**Compassionate:** They prioritize the work of creating "space for grace" where people can develop. **Real:** They acknowledge they will not be perfect or consistently, radically embracing every group.

Well, this will be an interesting journey. I trust the Holy Spirit will work within us and around us as we seek to embody this radical welcome.

Easter Blessings



Spring is here. The days are warmer. The winter chill has begun to dissipate (along with our New Year's resolutions). Even so, a sense of hope is in the air. Easter renewal and rebirth are calling us. More important than chocolate and pretty dresses, is the story of Easter that still speaks to the hearts and minds of Christians everywhere. Each Gospel has a slightly different account of that first Easter morning. I'd like to remind you of John's Gospel...

John 20:1-19

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Judeans, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you."

I always get a little choked-up when I read this story. I can't help but think about the stones in my life that need to be rolled away. I can't help but think about the locked doors that I hide behind. Fortunately, the good news for us today and always is that Jesus is greater than large stones and locked doors. In fact Jesus is the rock and for that matter Jesus is the door! This Easter, may we look for the Savior in the places where we hide. May we take comfort as we hear Jesus say to us anew, "Peace be with you!"



The 2009 Flower Chart has been posted on the bulletin board outside the church office.










We **still** need volunteers to sign up each month to pick up the flowers for



Interfaith Health Service Offering Youth Art Program

In February, Interfaith began a Pilot Art Program, Artists in Action, for the children of Latinas In Action participants. The Artists in Action project is funded by Thrivent for Lutherans and Arts for All and utilizes the talents of Maria Palma, a certified art instructor with the Omaha Public School System. Maria's work as an artist is impressive. Her mediums include murals, oil paintings, watercolors, and ceramics. She also is certified as a dual language instructor within OPS.

Since Maria's talents are so artistically diverse, I held several focus groups with our participants and their children to determine the type of art participants wanted incorporate into our pilot program. Requests centered on offering an opportunity to make crafts, paint, and make ceramics. Thus far, Maria's classes have been designed to focus on each of these topics for several weeks. The remaining structure of the program will be reviewed and adjusted to accommodate the broad age range of youth that attend class each week. Classes have averaged 15 students, ranging in age from 5 to 16 years old.

So much hinges on any pilot program, it seems. Before Interfaith moves forward with any program, we attempt to "set ourselves up for success" in finding the right class to offer, the right teacher, and introducing something that will meet the needs of our participants. The foundation developed in a pilot program can influence the word of mouth about the program, enthusiasm for continuing it, program demand, grant funder review and satisfaction, and participant attendance. Maria has proved to be an outstanding leader who brings many gifts to Interfaith in helping us organize this type of program.

It has been so exciting to see our youth responsive and excited in making art and designing their very own creations! It is my goal to have a simple exhibit of all of their artwork set up for display at a few different sites in Omaha.
