purch Officers Serving the Congregation but not on Council:

The regular meeting of the Council was held April 14th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We pray for the healing of those mentioned in our monthly prayer list, as they continue to struggle with health concerns. We pray for Pastor Liz's daughter, Wendy Henexson, as her condition improves following her kidney transplant. Our prayers are extended to Gloria Moore and her family on the death of her daughter Terri Briley. We pray for a neighbor of Ron Adrian's, Joyce Thompson, as her family and friends cope with her death. Our prayers are extended to Arlone Farber as she continues with chemo therapy for her cancer and to Les Perkins a friend of Arlone's who is on Hospice Care. We continue to remember Ambros Lado and his family as they struggle with his cancer. Prayers were extended to the nephew of June Hilmer's, Bobby Heesacker, as he continues to improve following his illness. We pray for Angelo Bonaci, neighbor of Ron Adrian, who had a TIA; for Ken Hilmer as he struggles with dizziness and breathing problems. We pray for David Nange's son Paul, as he recovers from surgery on his knee and for a neighbor of David's who is recovering from a car accident. We prayed and celebrated the birth of Sarah Emery's son, and Pastor Laaker's grandson, Tommy. We prayed for Danaka on her upcoming baptism. Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses in the "Daily Texts" from Psalm 130:8 and Colossians 1:13-14. The psalm reminds us that through Jesus we will be redeemed. Colossians tells us that through Jesus we become closer to God even when we make mistakes.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: The Council discussed the chapter, The Dream of God, in the book, *Radical Welcome* by Stephanie Spellers. A quote from the text summaries the chapter: "God rejoices when we move beyond ourselves, beyond our hostility and ignorance and suspicion, past our "dividing walls" and into relationship with one another, signifying to the world that we are one reconciled body, the body of Christ. In this, we reflect the mutual relationship and union that is the very nature of God self."

Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously. Our income is running about \$600-1,000 a month behind our expenses.

<u>Christian Education</u>: Pastor Laaker asked for volunteers to be a part of the Wednesday Faith Quest planning meeting on April 22nd.

Evangelism/ Outreach: Vicar Angela's project is completed and was very appreciated by the people who attended.

<u>Finance</u>: Jack Williams discussed with the council the purposes of the Disney Endowment; matching funds from the GELC Endowment were discussed as well. Angela's internship officially ends on June 30th. She will not be able to receive a full time call to a congregation until after the fall assignment process. The Council, in earlier discussions, expressed a desire to offer her a temporary ministry role, much like Internship, through the end of the calendar year. Unfortunately, there will be no money available through the Synod or ELCA. Ron Adrian, Arlone Farber, June Hilmer and Vicki Cox were asked to form a committee to brain storm ways to financially support this extension of ministry following Angela's completion of Internship. The Council asked Pastor to include in the quarterly financial letter to the congregation the specifics on the Church's immediate difficulties in paying bills due to a shortage in giving.

<u>Property:</u> The property appears to be in "good shape." The back flow preventers were checked for \$100.00. Bob Moss and Jerry Van Ormer have been working hard repairing and painting the small classroom across from the kitchen in the basement of the church.

<u>Service/ Social Ministry:</u> Neighbors' South Coalition will be seeking volunteers for its summer build. A grant from Lyon's Club International, to build a home for a family with a handicapped child, has been obtained.

Support/ Stewardship: No new report.

<u>Worship</u>: Lenten worship went very well. Good feed back from the Lenten speakers on the friendliness of the congregation. The youth will be performing a skit this Sunday, April 19th.

<u>New Business</u>: The Council will plan a graduation party in honor of Angela's Graduation in May. Tentative dates are May 24th or 31st. We will be celebrating Pastor's 30th Anniversary of Ordination in June. A catered dinner after church on June 14th is being planned.

<u>Announcements:</u> Ron Adrian will bring treats for our meeting in May. Pastor will be attending the conference, "The Mobilization to End Poverty" in Washington, DC, April 26 – 29. Pastor will be attending a Bridgebuilder Conference in Austin, Texas, May 4 - 6.



On Monday, April 20, Vicar Angela and I attended a conference that was entitled "Leadership in Anxious Times." The presenter, Rev. Dr. Peter Stienke, said that as he has worked with congregations in various stages of anxiety he has observed several emotional triggers. He said one can expect that there will be increased anxiety when there are three to five major issues occurring at the same time. As he went down his list of thirteen triggers, I couldn't help but notice that Grace Lutheran is undergoing at least three at this time. The three that I'm aware of are money, staff resignation, and the need for the church to change.

Now most likely none of these are new to any one of us. It is simply that they are all occurring at the same time. As he described these triggers, I couldn't help but feel like someone had turned on a light in a dark room. "Wow! So that is what some of the emotional disturbance in the life of the congregation is all about."

Over the course of the last twenty five years as your pastor, we have experienced together anxiety over these issues. I remember well the sixth year when we were having an extremely difficult time paying our bills. Then in the thirteen year, when I was granted the opportunity to take a sabbatical, we experienced one of the most difficult years in my memory. Money was not coming in; we were delaying payments, etc. But then things smoothed out, that is, until last year. All of a sudden, we were faced with shortfalls in eight out of the twelve months. This created anxiety in me and in your elected Council leadership.

It was during some of those same times in the past that we had transition in staff positions. So, as we entered this year, Pam Reents resigned and we sought new help in the office. Then about two weeks ago, Cody Talarico told me that he applied for a position with another congregation. Then this past week, he handed in his resignation. So here we have two major triggers of anxiety happening simultaneously.

In addition, the Council has been working diligently over the last six years at efforts to address the change that is necessary for us to be the church of all people in this community. We know we have to do things differently. In most cases, we have struggled to see clearly what it is that we must do differently.

All of this, plus the cultural reminder on an almost daily basis that things are not going as we might like or even expect, adds to the emotional anxiety in the life of each one of us. So what should we do? Should we try to define the things we're facing in simple black and white terms? Should we blame someone for all the difficulty? Should we look for a miracle cure or a miracle worker? Should we simply just check out?

Dr. Stienke suggested that one of the things that he has observed is that churches that understand their mission not only survive but thrive. He said, "mission has churches, churches don't have mission." This may seem like backward thinking when there has been a good deal of emphasis on "having a mission." Yet, he went on to describe a mission as a place that has missionaries and disciples, not members and patrons.

This got me to thinking. Is Grace Lutheran a mission? Do we have missionaries or members? Do we have disciples or patrons? Hmm! I wonder...

Dr. Stienke went on to say that Healthy Systems 1) focus on mission (who we are, what we are about), 2) focus on challenges, 3) focus on strengths, 4) manage conflict, 5) have clarity about roles, structures, and decisions, 6) are not afraid of pain, 7) exercise a nice spirit (observe celebrations, etc.), 8) have leadership that is working on their own levels of emotionality and maturity.

I'd like to believe the missionaries of Grace Lutheran are up to the challenge. God has not failed us yet, why would God fail us now? If God is good, all the time, then I believe that whatever lies in store in the days, weeks, months, even years ahead, must be Godly. I hope you'll join me in the challenge to be the very best God has called us to be in this place.



Our Mothering God

As Mother's Day approaches, I am reminded of the Mothering attributes of God. Certainly most of us are most comfortable and most familiar with God as "Our Father which art in heaven..." But have you ever considered the many scriptures that illustrate God as Our Mother? For example in Luke 15:8-10, Jesus, in one of his parables, depicts God as a woman who has lost a silver coin and sweeps the whole house —carefully searching until she finds it. And of course there is Matthew 23:37. In this scripture, Jesus himself steps into the role of mother saying, "How often have I desired to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings..." In Hosea 13:8, God is imaged as an angry mother bear defending her cubs. In Deuteronomy 32:11-12, we witness God as a majestic mother eagle who "stirs up her nest, and hovers over her young; as she spreads her wings, takes them up, and bears them aloft on her pinions." This rich and amazing imagery reminds us that the God we serve is far beyond our human understanding. Consequently, it is impossible for any one image to fully encapsulate all of who God is. What a blessing for us to have these many and varied representations of Almighty God.

In Isaiah 46:1-4, the prophet records God's declaration of giving birth to God's people. The prophet writes, "Listen to me, O house of Jacob, all the remnant of the house of Israel, who have been borne by me from your birth, carried from the womb; even to your old age, even when you turn gray I will carry you. I have made, and I will bear; I will carry and will save." Whenever I read passages like this, I think about all that our mothers have done for us and all that we are willing to do for our children.

In another passage from Isaiah (42:12-14), we see an image of God as a warrior juxtaposed an image of God as a woman in labor. These two representations of God help expand
our definition of God's strength and God's connectedness and concern for us. Furthermore,
these examples also offer new language about childbirth. I am sure that some women who
have been through childbirth might liken labor to a warrior in battle. The prophet writes: "Let
them give glory to the Lord, and declare his praise in the coastlands. The Lord goes forth like
a soldier, like a warrior he stirs up his fury; he cries out, he shouts aloud, he shows himself
mighty against his foes. For a long time I have held my peace, I have kept still and restrained
myself; now I will cry out like a woman in labor, I will gasp and pant." These verses paint a
picture of Our God in unmistakably feminine characteristics that we rarely encounter in our
traditional discourse about God. Aren't these verses a treasure?

So, as we think about the diverse ways that we experience God's mothering love, I would like to leave you with one of the most beautifully compassionate illustrations of God as Our Mother.

Isaiah 66:10-13

"Rejoice with Jerusalem; be glad for her, all you that love this city!

Rejoice with her now, all you that have mourned for her!

You will enjoy her prosperity, like a nursing child with her mother.

The Lord says, "I will bring you lasting prosperity; the wealth of the nations will flow to you like a river that never goes dry. You will be like a child that is nursed by her mother, carried in her arms, and dandled on her knees. I will comfort you in Jerusalem as a mother comforts her child."


