COUNCIL NOTES:

The regular meeting of the Council was held May 19th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: Care for those in need of healing; Wendy Henexson (daughter of Pastora Liz), Bobby Heesacker, Ron's neighbor Angelo, Ernie's friend Maxine Beard; care for those within the Grace family that they continue to heal; Ambrose Lado and his struggle with cancer, Pastor Laaker with the pain in his hip; we praise God in joy for Angela's graduation from the Lutheran School of Theology and ask for God's guidance in her final days of Internship with paperwork. We pray for God to surround the family of Arlone's friend Les who recently died. We pray for wisdom and guidance for the new mayor, city council, and police officers of Omaha. Pastor led devotions from Lamentations 3.22 and 2 Peter 3.9. The first speaks to us about God's goodness keeping us from being swallowed up while the second reminds us that repentance will keep us all from perishing.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: The Council is reading "*Radical Welcome*" by Stephanie Spellers. Please read pages 51-60 in the book by the next meeting.

Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

<u>Christian Education:</u> Faith Quest will break for summer after 3 more weeks, and will resume in the fall.

Evangelism/Outreach: Kids At Work has planned their Welcome dinner for Tuesday, June 2 at 6:30 p.m.

<u>Finance:</u> An extended discussion continued concerning Internship. Vicar Angela expressed her desire to remain with us until she receives her first call or the end of 2009, which ever comes first. She expressed her desire to be employed on a part-time basis only in order that she might have time to relax and renew before receiving her first call. The Council discussed the financial needs necessary for this effort. A letter will be sent to the congregation members describing the plans and the needs.

Property: Endowment report received and ratified.

Service/Social Ministry: No new report.

Support/Stewardship: No new report.

<u>Worship:</u> The congregation bid farewell to Cody & Jen Talarico last Sunday. They will be greatly missed. We have a couple of potentially interested individuals for the position. Please keep in mind that the last Sunday in May we will be celebrating Vicar Angela's graduation. It is also Pentecost – remember to wear red!

<u>Unfinished Business:</u> The Council finalized the dinner plans for Pastor Laaker's celebration on June 14th. Ernie will prepare and bring the meat items, the council will supply the cake, and would ask that the congregation bring side dishes.

<u>New Business</u>: Council asked that the financial giving numbers, printed in the bulletin for Sunday, show only what is actually contributed to the church in the Sunday offering.

<u>Announcements</u>: The Nebraska Synod Assembly will be in Fremont on June 5, 6, & 7. Pastor, Mary Laaker, and Andrew Edwards will attend, along with David Nange and John Boato for the Sudanese congregation. Gloria will bring treats and lead prayer for our June meeting.





I have written at various times about the importance of seeing our neighborhood as the place where God is at work. I have written about these things because I am convinced that God is desirous of Grace becoming the place where all people can experience God's amazing grace.

Grace was begun 120 years ago. This neighborhood was just beginning to take shape. People were building houses. The congregation began with meetings in some of the neighborhood homes. Finally, a small frame building was erected between the current church building and the home to the south. It was an exciting time.

People began to invite their neighbors to come with them to this new congregation. People were dreaming about ministry and interest was high for belonging to a church family.

Obviously, times have changed. The neighborhood has gone from a newly developed suburban area, to a settled area, to an urban area, now to a re-development area. Many people no longer see the area as a desired area in which to live. Transition is taking place. The racial makeup has gone from the dominant white folks to a racial mix.

The same kind of change that marks the differences in the neighborhood have also taken place in people's desire to belong to a congregation.

To understand the range and differences among American Christians, Christianity Today International recently partnered with Zondervan Publishers to commission Knowledge Networks to conduct attitudinal and behavioral research of U.S. Christians. In September 2006, more than 1,000 self-identified Christians 18 years of age and older were surveyed on their religious beliefs and practices. The results reveal a number of significant differences. In fact, portraits of five distinct segments emerged from the study. They have named them Active, Professing, Liturgical, Private, and Cultural Christians.

Each group represents about one-fifth of those identifying themselves as Christian, with Active Christians most likely to have a personal commitment to Jesus Christ that affects their beliefs and inspires an active church life; Cultural Christians are least likely to align their beliefs or practices with biblical teachings, or attend church. Between the two is a range of beliefs, commitment levels, and public practice of the faith.

Leadership discussed the survey results with leading pastors and religious experts to ascertain the ramifications for church leaders. Three critical issues emerged:

- 1. The local church is no longer considered the only outlet for spiritual growth.
- 2. Churches must develop relational- and community-oriented outreach.
- 3. Lay people have to be better equipped to be God's ambassadors.

Another necessary shift is recognizing that the old metrics of success may no longer apply. Wilkerson says, "We need to spend the next ten years investing in the life of our surrounding community and finding ways to regain a hearing for the gospel. Instead of going to the nursing home and holding a church service, we're just going to go and love and serve people for years and years, until the staff and residents ask, 'Why do they care so much?' This won't result in 150 decisions for Christ in a year. You might not see results for five or ten years."

Churches that do engage their local communities may discover that what they gain surpasses what they give. At Evergreen Baptist Church-LA, the demographics of the city of Rosemead, where the church is located—Asian, Hispanic, and lower-income—differ from the congregation itself—predominantly Asian and largely middle- and upper-middle class. The Pastor strives to encourage the right attitude as his church engages the surrounding community.

"As we reach out to kids in the neighborhood, we tell our congregation that we don't just do this to be good Christians. We tell them that maybe these poor kids know something more than we do about knowing God, more so than us middle-class snobs," he says. "It's not enough to reach out because we think it's the right thing to do. That is paternalistic. We need to see that there is something that different people with different perspectives can show us that we're missing."

I am struck by these reflections. In my minds eye, they have described Grace's neighborhood. They have described the change that has happened around the church. They have also described some of the efforts that Grace has undertaken in the last 10 years. The efforts that reach out to youth in the neighborhood and beyond through Kids at Work and Wednesday Faith Quest. We are seeking to learn together and act in caring ways that demonstrate that wonderful statement made by Jesus, "Love one another the way I loved you." (John 15:12)

I am pleased that God has placed Grace here. I am pleased that God continues to bless us with ministry opportunities. I am pleased that we can love one another. May we do so, even more so, so that others will come to see God in us and in one another.

What's in a name?

Names are funny. I know that some people are very particular about what people call them. For example, my best friend, Christina has some definite opinions about her name. For the most part, she doesn't really care what people call her. She'll answer to just about anything—Christina, Chris, Tina—anything that is except Christy. She absolutely hates it. For me, I don't mind if people call me Angela or Angie or any derivative thereof. In fact, growing up with three sisters and a brother, I seldom was called by my own name. My mom did the roll call thing. You know? She would throw out names of my siblings until she found the right one. Basically, our rule of thumb was, if Mom was looking at you, then you were the one she meant—no matter what name she called. Once she even called me the dog's name. I thought, "Now wait a minute. That's getting a little ridiculous!" So, I guess for me, the old adage rings true; "Call me what you want. Just don't call me late for supper!" Well at least that was until recently.

My son, Konami, has developed an annoying habit. Sometimes he calls me "Angie." I really don't like it much. Although I do understand why he does it. Everyone else calls me by my first name so I guess he thinks he should too. However, I am also well aware that toddlers are constantly exploring boundaries. After they have identified a boundary, they are ready to move into the next phase—testing said boundary. Now, I'm sure many new age parents are perfectly comfortable with their children calling them by their first names. But I'm not. So I've been encouraging him to call me "Mommy." The odd thing is that Konami will point to a picture of me and say, "Mommy." But in the very next moment, he'll turn right around look me square in the eye and call me "Angie". . . even if I am the one holding the photograph.

Well, recently, we've made some progress. The other day Konami was playing in his room when he called out, "Mom?" From the other room, I answered, "Yes?" As I walked into his room, he called out again, "Mom?" And again I replied, "Yes?" Then, as we stood face to face, he called me a third time, "Mom?" Tickled by his persistence, I laughed out, "Yes." Then he smiled and said, "I don't know" and he quickly went back to playing with his toys- completely finished with our exchange. I got such a kick out of his antics that I burst into laughter.

It felt so good to hear him call me "Mom." It's interesting. I didn't want him to call me by my name. Instead, I wanted him to call me *by our relationship*. I'm Angie to everyone. But I'm "Mommy" to Konami. And now, because of the depth of my love for my son, "Mom" has become my name as well. Konami called me, it seems, to test a boundary. He wanted to make sure that when he called for me, I would be there for him.

Earlier today, I was sharing this little anecdote with a friend. As we talked, I suddenly remembered a verse from Isaiah. "And it shall come to pass that before they call, I will answer; And while they are yet speaking, I will hear" (Isaiah 65:24). It is comforting to know that as a child of God, I can call on God and trust that God will hear me. In fact, Isaiah teaches us that *before* we call, God will answer. So, we can call on God by name or by relationship. We can call on God whether we are merely testing boundaries or are in dire need. We can even call on God when we don't know what to say. Because, regardless of our circumstances, God stands at the ready to hear us, to answer us, and to renew us!
