As we left our early days story last month, the council has just approved the use of an envelope system for individual donation records. Now the story continues.

"On April 7, 1896, an agreement was reached with the Shull heirs. The deed was changed making possible the erection of a \$5,000.00 church building.

"Excitement began to build. New conversations were held regarding the building of a permanent church structure. Information was received that indicated a pipe organ was available from a congregation at McCook, Nebraska, for the cost of transportation. Finally, a way was found to fund the transportation of the organ, then at its meeting on August 4, 1896, the council was informed that someone else had stepped in and claimed the organ.

"Prior to this meeting, Pastor Kuhns had been approached by someone who suggested that the congregation might wish to investigate the structure of a church building in Oakland, Iowa, as a possible model for its building. A committee was appointed. On August 5, 1896, Messrs. J. F. Smith and William Wilke, together with the pastor, visited Oakland, Iowa, to see the church recommended for duplication. This was a 72 mile round trip in a buggy in one day. The return trip was made in a rainstorm, the only light being flashes of lightning. Mr. Smith was the driver.

"The church building in Oakland, Iowa, still stands. The name of the congregation is First Congregational Church. It was built some 11+ years before Grace's building.

"The committee returned with great enthusiasm. A special council meeting was held and Pastor Kuhns was authorized to begin conversations with Kent and Bell, architects, Council Bluffs, Iowa. In addition, he was to seek a settlement with Walker and Kimball, architects, Omaha, for work done earlier.

"The council met again on August 24, 1896, to review the plans submitted by Kent and Bell, architects. They proposed a set of plans substantially duplicating the church in Oakland. Their proposal was to draw the plans, supervise the construction, and other necessary details for a fee of \$40.00.

"On September 1, 1896, the council authorized Pastor Kuhns to take charge of "breaking ground for the new edifice." Then on September 15, 1896, the council decided to invite bids for the construction, with the bids to be opened on September 28^{th} .

"October 5, 1896, at a congregational meeting, the church council as trustees, were empowered to enter into a contract for the building of the church. That same evening, with Mr. Charles W. Haller as legal adviser and Mr. Lyman Waterman as notary public, a contract was made with John A. Anderson & Company, Omaha, for complete mason work for \$1,715.00, and with C. Bosen, Council Bluffs, Iowa, for complete carpenter work for \$1,796.50. In addition, the council was authorized to execute a mortgage of \$3,000.00 to the Board of Church Extension. All these papers were held in escrow until the dedication of the church, when they were recorded in their proper order.

"On Wednesday, October 7, 1896, Mr. W. S. King, County Surveyor, ran the lot lines and fixed the levels for the new building, and at 11:00 a.m., ground was broken. Then on Sunday, October 25, 1896, the corner stone for the new Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church was laid."

We have had the marvelous opportunity to celebrate with Pastors Hahle and Konig a bit of our history. We rejoice in the vision of our ancestors to plant a mission center here in this place. It was a wise decision to begin a congregational giving emphasis. Please take note of the opportunity to review your financial giving toward the ministry offered in Jesus' name through Grace Lutheran Church as we enter our fall emphasis "Empowered by God – Responding by Grace." Our future lies before us. May God Bless us we seek to be faithful in mission sharing God's Word and Love in care and service to all.



Stewardship Minute

Monthly reflections on our role as managers of God's blessing. "Effective Stewardship" by Kenneth L. William

- ♦ First, there is a matter of our time. Time is one resource that is given to everyone equally. All of us have twenty four hours in every day. No more, no less. How we use our time reflects accurately what is a priority in our lives. Some people have made the TV a priority in their lives. They might not admit to it, but by totaling the amount of time they spend in front of the set, it would be hard to draw any other conclusion. Others have made sports a priority. How can we tell that's true? Again by the amount of time they spend pursuing sports. The key question is this: How much of the 168 hours available to each of us every week is spent in pursuing of God or in service to God's kingdom, especially here in this ministry?
- ♦ Then there is matter of our talents, an area in which all of us have not been gifted equally. Some have been gifted by God to work with their hands, with machines, or with computers. Others excel in their ability to communicate orally or via the printed page. The effective outreach of the Gospel here at Grace Lutheran Church is made possible only when Gods people who are part of this fellowship use their combined talents for God's glory and for the good of his ministry.
- ♦ Finally there is the matter of our treasure. Don't be confused. Money cannot be buy salvation. Money cannot buy eternal life. Money can't even buy security which God alone provides. But how we use money is an indication of our priorities. Think about the process: God owns everything. According to Psalm 24:1." The earth is the Lord's." God has never relinquished His title deed to the world, but God enables us to earn that which rightfully belongs to Him. God then seeks to have us return a portion of what He entrusted to us through our giving.
- Giving is not to help the poor God pay His bills. Giving is not because God needs anything from us. Giving is God's way of growing Christians. Every time we give to Gods glory from hearts that have been redeemed by God's love and grace, we give away a little of our selfishness. Every time we give of our resources, we grow in grace and in walk with Christ.
- ♦ As you consider your life during this time of stewardship emphasis, will you- like the Macedonian Christians excel in the "grace of giving "by first giving yourself tobthe Lord? Will you then respond by grace through giving your time, your talents and your treasure to be used by God in this ministry?
- As you consider your response to these questions, and as you seek the Lord's direction concerning your giving in the next few months, please remember these simple yet profound words:

Only one life, t'will soon be past; only what's done for Christ will last.



Interfaith Health Service Part of National Conference

For the past several months, I have been involved in helping organize and plan out a National Immigration and Refugee Conference that was held here in Omaha on October 2nd-4th. The conference, sponsored by the United States Catholic Conference of Bishops (USCCB), was initiated by Interfaith's newest partner, the Pixan Leadership Team, to facilitate learning more about educational opportunities, leadership development and a Christ's call to be of service to others within the immigrant community.

I was delighted and humbled to be one of the few community members involved in the conference this year. Over 80 people attended the weekend activities from California, Arizona, Oregon, Kansas, Iowa and Nebraska. Highlights of the conference included meetings with the USCCB organizers from Washington, DC, to discuss health care, education and community organizing, presentations from UNO and College of Saint Mary's on learning opportunities, small groups sessions focusing on teenagers and higher learning, and a Robert Wood Johnson presentation on health disparities among immigrants.

A personal highlight for me was listening to keynote speaker, Juanatano Cano, share his immigration journey. Juan is one of 11 children, all of whom grew up in a remote farming village without electricity and running water in Guatemala. In a small group break out presentation, Juan also shared that as the oldest in his family, at 5 years old, it struck him that he did not have many material possessions when some of the villagers treated his family differently because they did not have money for shoes or for new clothing. He decided that education was the only way forward for his family. He immigrated to the United States when he was 20 years old and completed college and graduate school with an emphasis in teaching. Juan noted with pride that all 10 of his brothers and sisters finished college and well over half completed law school, medical school and graduate schools in California. Juan speaks three languages fluently and travels around the United States to encourage others to pursue education along with their dreams.

The USCCB was so pleased with conference attendance and the rich dialogue that resulted from group discussions that they have voted to return to Omaha next year for another conference. I have already begun meeting with Pixan leaders to talk about hopes, dreams and themes for next year's conference. I hope to extend an invitation to the 2010 conference to all of our Interfaith Health Service Latinas in Action participants, partners and congregation members when dates are finalized. Please keep our planning process in your prayers so that we may be Spirit led in our discussions.



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What is Advent?

Advent is a season of the Christian year when we focus on the coming of Christ. It's a time of waiting, hoping, and getting in touch with our need for a Savior. It's a season of preparation for Christmas, much as Lent is a season of preparation for Easter. In some Christian churches, Advent is a time of fasting and repentance.

In Advent we look back to the experience of Israelites as they yearned for God to forgive their sin and restore their nation. We put ourselves in their shoes as they hoped for the coming of the Messiah. Thus we ready our hearts to celebrate the good news of Christmas.

Yet Advent is also a time to look forward to the second coming of Christ. Though defeating sin and death through His cross and resurrection, Christ hasn't yet finished His work of renewing creation and restoring the kingdom of God. Thus we continue to experience the brokenness of this world, in violence, disease, natural disasters, and other forms of human suffering. In Advent we yearn for God's completion of the salvation begun in Christ.

What does "Advent" mean?

"Advent" comes from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "visit" or "coming" or "arrival." The season of Advent is a time to get ready for the two "visits" of Christ: His first coming through the Incarnation, and His second coming as the reigning Lord.

When is Advent?

All Christians who keep Advent do so immediately prior to Christmas. Western Christians (Catholics, Protestants) begin Advent four Sundays before Christmas. Because Christmas falls on various days of the week, Advent ranges from 22 to 28 days (including Christmas Eve). Technically, in most traditions, Christmas Eve is both the end of Advent and the beginning of Christmas (at sunset). This year Advent begins Sunday, November 29.
