Support/Stewardship: 120th Celebration of the church was great!

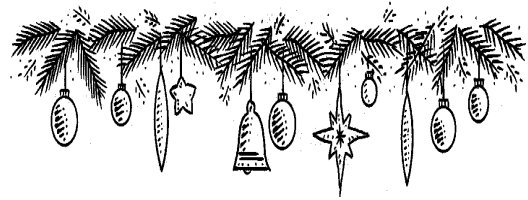
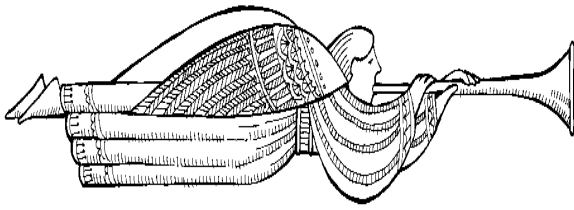
Worship: Remember that we will be hosting the Thanksgiving Eve service for 4 other congregations. Remember to bring treats for fellowship afterward!

From the Pastor



Soon we will see that wonderful Children's holiday classic "The Grinch Who Stole Christmas." I trust you'll recall in the story how the Grinch enters all the homes by way of their chimneys disguised as Santa Claus. He takes all the presents and ornaments, the trees and stockings, and even their food down to the last morsel. He drags his loot up to his mountain and then looks down upon Whoville with a sinister grin. He is listening for the cries and wailings of the people to start as they wake up on Christmas morning to discover a Christmas lost. What he hears instead surprises him. Up from the town of the Whos comes a joyful Christmas carol. They are singing. Why he asks. It is because, he learns, Christmas resides not in things but in the heart that is thankful. He could not steal their gratitude.

Our forefathers were not so much thankful for something as they were thankful in something. In bounty or in want they were thankful. In feast or in famine they were thankful. In joy or in misery they were thankful. There is a big difference between being thankful for something and being thankful in something.

There was a wonderful hymn written in 1607 by a German by the name of Martin Reinkardht. The name of the hymn is "Now Thank We All Our God." In the year that Reinkardht wrote that hymn it is interesting to note that over 6000 persons in his German village, including his wife and his children, died of pestilence. Yet, in the midst of that catastrophic social and personal loss Reinkardht set down to pen this great hymn of praise: 'Now thank we all our God, with hearts and hands and voices.' The Christian faith affirms that in the midst of everything--in death, in loss, in hardship--we are to turn to God in praise.

This does not mean that we are to put on a false front of happiness. It does not mean that we are to try to psych ourselves into feeling better. Rather we are thankful in times of hardship because we know that, just as on Calvary's hill, it is God who has the final word. We know that in any and all circumstances the victory is ours through faith in Christ Jesus.

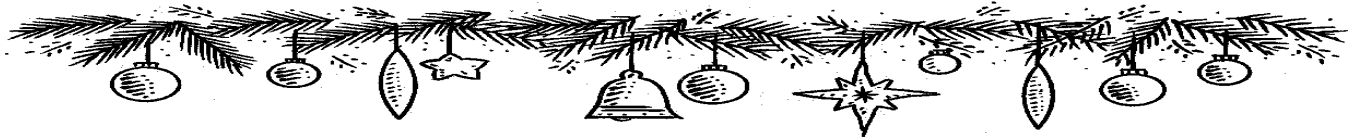
I discovered that in the Bible the words for gratitude and faith are interchangeable. If one has faith one will also have a sense of thankfulness. If one is thankful one must also be a person of faith. You show me a person who is not thankful, whose attitude is that life has somehow short-changed them, and I will show you a person who does not have a complete faith in God.

I am delighted to serve as your pastor. I have faith that God is at work among us. I am thankful for the wonderful people that we get to serve. May our love and care shine in service to all.

Interfaith Health Service: Spotlight on Latinas in Action

This month marks the beginning of a semi-regular feature that will be posted on Interfaith's website, *interfaithhealth.org*. Gema and I plan to try and interview a Latinas in Action participant each month. One of our childcare directors, instructors, youth club (Amigos in Action) participants or one of our regular Zumba and educational participants will be featured. We will not publish every interview in the congregational newsletters, but wanted to let folks know where to find additional interviews in the future.

To start things off, I asked Vanessa, one of our Amigos in Action youth group members to be our first featured guest. Vanessa and her mother and 2 brothers have been attending Latinas in Action faithfully since our program began. It is always a treat to see Vanessa and her family and hear about their week. I have had the privilege of working fairly closely with Vanessa, in particular, over the years. She may not remember this, but when we first met, she was shy and quiet but always ready with a beautiful smile. These days, Vanessa is one of our regular participants and she has grown in confidence and maturity. She would not be described as shy by any of her peers. She is extremely intelligent, quick-witted, caring and gracious, and a loving older sister.

Here are some highlights of my IHS conversation with Vanessa:

Age: 12

School: Norris

Something about me not everyone knows about me:

"I have a dog. I've had Bella since she was a puppy. She is a year and a half old but she is NOT named after the lead character in those books everyone at school is reading." (Twilight series)

I like:

"Sleeping, eating, talking to my friends, soccer, saxophone, vanilla ice cream, my favorite school subject is math."

In the future, I want to:

"Be a pastry chef or an artist."

God has blessed me:

"With my family and my life."

A favorite memory of the past year:

"The day before Thanksgiving last year, my mom and I got up really early, around 6 in the morning. We went to No Frills in South Omaha and bought all the spices and ingredients for making a the turkey my dad got from his work. It was fun because it was just me and my mom cooking. We were surprised at how well the turkey turned out. We went over to my grandmother's house to celebrate the day and let's just put it this way—there were no leftovers from our turkey! Everyone else liked it as much as we did!"

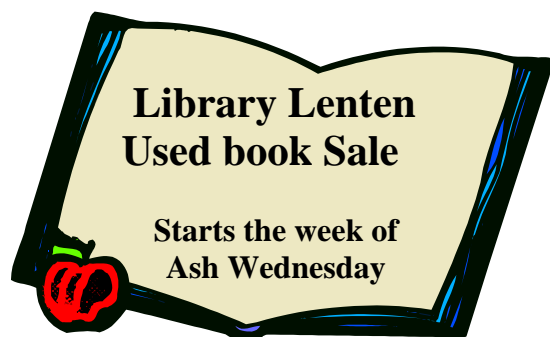

Stewardship Minute

*Monthly reflections on our role
as managers of God's blessing.*

"Effective Stewardship" by Kenneth L. William

The Lord Jesus was very clear in His description of how God empowers us when He made this statement as recorded in Acts 1:8, "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you." Power, genuine power, God-given power, accompanies our salvation that is given to us through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. By God's grace through faith, the Spirit of God then enables us to do the work of God.

But even prior to receiving God's power through faith in Christ, we are beneficiaries of God's power. Whether we describe the creative act of Christ in bringing the world into being or how He holds all things together by His word, all of us are the direct beneficiaries of God's power.

In fact, seeing God's power in action is one of the wonderful by-products that comes from studying the Scriptures. We soon realize that the God of Elijah is alive and well today and that He provides for us as He did for the prophet of old. We recognize that the God of Daniel maintains His rule over the affairs of men. While God may not shut the mouths of literal lions for us as He did for Daniel or rescue us from a hot fiery furnace as He did for Daniel's companions, God continues to demonstrate His power as we trust Him implicitly to provide for us. The words of First Kings 8:56 stand as a beacon on a hill: ". . . not one word has failed of all his good promise, which he spoke through his servant Moses." And Isaiah's words ring out loudly and clearly as he proclaims that God ". . . gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless."

It's in our response to God's power and God's ownership of all things that we have difficulty. We tend to underestimate God's power, and our response is sometimes pitifully weak. As J. Hudson Taylor, great missionary to China, said, "Many Christians estimate difficulties in the light of their own resources and thus attempt little and often fail in the little they attempt. All of God's giants have been weak [people] who did great things for God because they reckoned on His power and presence with them." Or as F. B. Meyer observed so well, "After all, it is not so much what we do for God that counts as it is what we let Him do for us." And that certainly fits the picture painted in Isaiah 26:12 where the prophet states, ". . . all that we have done, you have done for us."

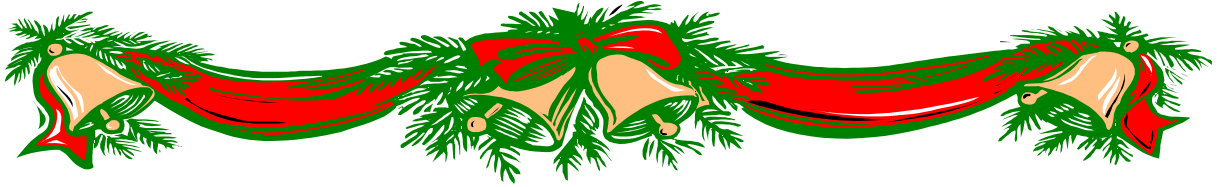
Frankly, though, as we respond to God's power and ownership of all things, frequently, we put other things or people first on our list of priorities. Sometimes, in fact, what we make available to the Lord amounts to little more than glorified leftovers.

Leftovers are such humble things,
We would not serve them to a guest,
And yet we serve them to our Lord,
Who deserves the very best.
We give to Him leftover time,
Stray minutes here and there,
Leftover cash we give to Him,
Such few coins as we can spare.
We give our youth unto the world,

Peanut butter is always in short supply!

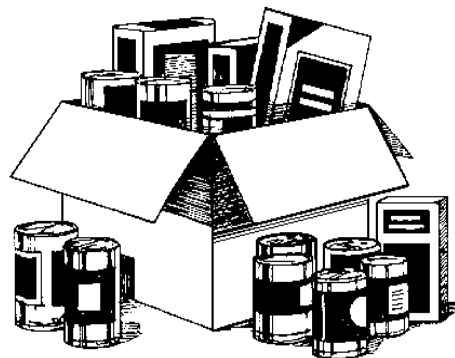
