The regular meeting of the Council was held on April 12. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We pray for Sandy Fitzgerald, who is battling brain cancer and for Mickey Andersen, who is struggling with health concerns; we pray for Kent Cattlett as he continues his treatments for lung cancer and for Kevin Courtney, as he has recently been diagnosed with colon cancer; we pray for Barbara Nelson, as she recovers from her stroke; we pray for Jerry Goodrich, as he continues to heal and is having financial concerns because of illness and we pray for Joe Horwath, who is in hospice care; we pray for our Grace shut-ins; we pray for the safety of the people in Thailand, as unrest is causing much upheaval; we prAay for the nations of Hatti, Chile, and Indonesia, as well as Southern California, as they recover from earthquake damage; we pray for the safety of police, patrol officers, and service people as they protect our cities and country; we pray for Bob, Ernie's friend, as he is recovering from a stroke, we pray for Ernie's Aunt, Jan, as she is having foot surgery; we pray for the people of Poland, who have lost several of their leaders in a tragic airplane accident; we pray for the violence in our own city and schools to have peaceful resolution; and we pray for the leaders of our country as they make decisions that affect all of us.

Each day I receive a devotional piece from Rev. Richard Rohr. He begins by asking a question and then shares a reflection. During this past week was the occasion of Earth Day, so many of his reflections focused on our relationship to our world. Here is one of those reflections:

"Your soul is your deepest you. We've called it the True Self, who you are in God, who you are in your deeply connected, invisible self. For many of us, it's a scary place to go because for forty, fifty, sixty years, we've defined ourselves by our roles, our titles, our degrees, our clothes, our ethnicity...all those things that are going to die in a few years, anyway. The soul is before all of that, deeper than all of that, and also what endures after that! All seem to agree that the soul has an eternal quality to it.

"I don't think that there is any way we can more *quickly* make contact with that soul than through nature. Both Bill Plotkin and Brian Swimme say that nature has an "alluring" quality to it. Try to listen to that pull, nature's inherent delight, that cosmic allurement which you feel in nature and around animals much more than in anything constructed by human hands. "I don't know anything that can mirror us more lovingly, more truthfully, and more foundationally, than nature itself. Religion just takes it from there! Today let Brother Sun, Sister Moon, Brother Dog, Sister Water talk to you. And you know what? They always talk to you in a nonjudgmental way and a fully accepting way! That is what we mean by mirroring. So today we find that dogs and horses are among the most successful "therapists" for many people who have been deeply wounded by society."

As I reflect on what he says, I find myself thinking about the ways God speaks to me through nature. I have shared with you in a variety of ways my connection to the soil. I love to get my hands in the dirt of my garden. There is something whole and holy about the connection to nature. I thank God for the opportunity to be connected to the nature that God has created. I don't know that I would have connected this dirt experience with soul.

I do know that many people experience great peace through dogs and horses. I am grateful that these creatures can help individuals experience more fully the fullness of God.

May we all experience the fullness of our soul, who we are in God.


