The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We pray for Sandy Fitzgerald, who is battling brain cancer; we pray for Mickey Andersen, who is struggling with health concerns; we pray for Amy Johnson as she struggles with an infection along with brain cancer; we pray for Kent Cattlett as he continues his treatments for lung cancer; we pray for Kevin Courtney, as he is receiving treatments for colon cancer; we pray for Barbara Nelson, as she recovers from her stroke, and for Barbara Narducci, as she recovers from a fall; we pray for our Grace shut-ins; we pray for Gwen Grady as she has recently been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer; we pray for the "recovery" of the oil spill disaster as it has presented many hazardous problems; we pray for Diane Webb, as she is having a knee replacement; we pray for the safety of everyone as they travel for reunions, that they will be vigilant of the weather conditions; we pray for Bobby, as he has had some teeth removed and tests done; we pray for the safety of police, patrol officers and our armed service people as they protect cities and fight for our freedom; and we pray for a successful year for Vacation Bible School and the Kids at Work programs at Grace. We are so blessed to have good leaders and helpers to make these programs possible.

<u>Service/Social Ministry:</u> The Douglas County Voting Commission sent a thank-you note with appreciation for Grace Church serving as an election site. The Neighbors South Habitat Coalition begins its 12th home building on Friday, June 18.

I find myself conflicted. Today, as I write this, one of our Nebraska communities is voting to enact a city ordinance in an effort to address some of its residents concerns on immigration policies. I am conflicted because I too want some action on comprehensive immigration reform but I do not think it is best to do this on a city by city basis.

I am also conflicted because I am fully convinced that all people are made in the image of God. To me, this means that our current societal movement that labels certain people as "illegal" leads us to stereotypes and actions that diminish this understanding of all being made in the image of God.

I am also conflicted because my faith calls me to love, welcome, and show compassion for the stranger among us (Deuteronomy 10:18-19, Leviticus 19:33-34, Matthew 25:31-46). The current conversation within our communities seems to alienate me from those who are different from me and set up good or bad categories.

I have been looking at my family history recently and find that my great grand parents came to this country as strangers. They could not speak the language but they found welcome. My grandfather moved from eastern Indiana to western Nebraska and homesteaded on land that once was occupied only by our Native American brothers and sisters. If my extended family found welcome in those days, then I believe I must act with the same kind of welcome today.

Therefore, I agree with a coalition of Christian organizations, Christians for Comprehensive Immigration Reform (CCIR), call for fair and humane immigration reform to be enacted by Congress this year.

The policy principles espoused by CCIR are as follows:

We call for enforcement initiatives that are consistent with humanitarian values.

We advocate for much-needed reforms in our family-based immigration system that reduces waiting times for separated families to be reunited.

We call for establishment of a process for all immigrant workers and their families already in the U.S. to earn citizenship upon satisfaction of specific criteria.

We encourage an expansion of legal avenues for workers and families to enter our country and work in a safe and legal manner with their rights and due process fully protected.

We call for solutions to address the root causes of migration, such as economic disparities between sending and receiving nations.

I would hope that we might work to change the current conversation and move toward positive solutions that recognize the image of God in all of us.




