The regular meeting of the Council was held on December 14th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: we pray for Sandy Fitzgerald, who is battling brain cancer; we pray for Rick Moore, who struggles with health concerns; we pray for Kevin Courtney, who is struggles with side effects from chemotherapy treatments for colon cancer; we pray for our fellow Grace members, Brian Sutej, who is recovering from a broken leg; Don Olson, who is hospitalized with injuries he suffered in a fall; our shut-in's, Barbara Nelson, Barb Narducci, and Mae Lane; we pray for the Laird family that the hope of employment will be a reality; we pray for Gwen Grady, as she struggles with pancreatic cancer; we pray for the children in the "After School" program in their daily struggles as well as praying for the direction of the program for the future; we pray for safe travel during the holidays while people go to see friends and families; we pray for people suffering from damages caused by natural disasters; we pray for the needs of our Sudanese brothers and sisters; we pray for peace among North and South Korea as well as all nations; we pray for the ELCA World Hunger Program, may contributions will be plentiful; we pray for the safety of armed service personnel, police and patrol officers, who protect each one of us; and as we count our many blessings, we pray for the poor, the hungry, and the homeless that they will have shelter, food, and water.

Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses of Psalm 51:13 and Luke 1:48 from the "*Daily Texts*." These verses contain marvelous and powerful words. In the Psalm text, even though David loved God so much, he was still a sinner. David was so grateful that God forgave him for his past, that he served the Lord in encouraging others who struggled with their own transgressions. In the text of Luke, we are reminded that Gabriel visited Mary. Mary was blessed, even though she was a "lowly servant" because she heard God and obeyed God's words. These verses help us to remember not to lose our focus at this time of year and to know that God's spirit is alive in each one of us.

Visions for Ministry: The Council continued their conversation on "Radical Welcome." God is inviting each one of us to be on a personal and spiritual journey with God. We must be willing to take risks and travel a path that does not always leave us with a feeling of contentment or complacency. God wants us to always be on the move, even if it sometimes means that we have to take a step backwards and start over.

Evangelism/Outreach: Anna Ernst gave the Council a written report on the After School Program. Presently, there are three girls who come regularly to the program. Anna has asked the Council to think and pray about the future of the program

Finance: Pastor Laaker purchased \$50.00 gift certificates for the staff from “Trader Joe’s” for Christmas. We certainly appreciate the entire staff at Grace and feel very blessed to have a great crew. The Council had some discussion on the amount that Grace would commit to Mission Share next year. A decision will be reached at the January 2011 meeting.

Property: There is no new information on the property to the north of the church that is for sale. After the holidays, Pastor Laaker is going to fill out a “preliminary review” form to see if acquiring the property is even feasible.

Service/Social Ministry: The Council voiced their opinions on the Mayoral recall. It was a consensus that too much money would be wasted by the city, when it could be put to use for better things that are needed for the community.

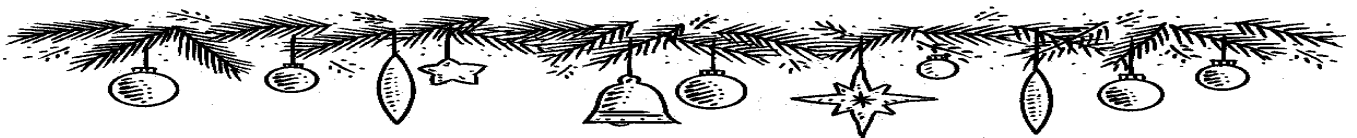
Support/Stewardship: The Fall Stewardship materials have been collected, but no specifics until the January 2011 meeting.

An Audit Committee will be formed to review books and see that they correctly reflect the actions of the year.

Announcements: Benhi, the present Church Secretary, has given his notice of resignation to Pastor Laaker. The Secretary position has been filled by Brenda Spahr. We thank Benhi for his contributions and we are grateful to have Brenda, with her knowledge and experience, step up and fill this position. Arlone Farber will bring treats and lead the closing pray for our January 2011 Council meeting.

I hope your holiday celebrations were as wonderful as I anticipate mine being as I'm sitting here writing this article, just a few days before Christmas. What a joy, blessing, and good thing to relax and spend time with family and old friends! Of course, I am so grateful for my new friends at Grace, as well, and thankful for your donations to the holiday cookie-baking party for our three after-school program girls, who had a blast (turn a few more pages to see a picture!). What a wonderful, generous congregation!

It will continue to be an honor to have the opportunity to serve St. Luke's and Grace as the calendar year rolls into the next decade. This month, I wanted to share a story with you about one of my teachers and mentors to whom I will always be grateful because of the many opportunities he has given me, including one that I was surprised and very happy to receive, because I did not really expect it to come from him.

Dr. Jeffrey Pannebaker, A.I.M., or "JP" to the many high schoolers he has led in choirs, is Director of Music Ministry at my home church, St. Luke Lutheran Church in Silver Spring, MD. He directs the high school choir and bell choir that were a very important part of my high school life. The choirs meet weekly for rehearsal – the high school choir sings every other Sunday and for Christmas and Easter, and the bell choir performs a few times a year for Sunday services and at Christmas. Once a year in the spring, both choirs get time off school for a long weekend tour and travel to churches within a three or four hour radius to perform. JP makes fellowship a crucial part of rehearsal, giving the choir a free pizza dinner once a month and making time for fun on the tour as well, which leads to strong friendships among choir members.

JP gave my friends and I, not always the most well-trained vocalists, opportunities to sing solos, duets, trios, or quartets in choir, to learn new music, to travel, and to learn how much people appreciated our performing. He offered me the chance to be Assisting Minister in my early years of high school, a great leadership development opportunity. I also got to develop my leadership opportunity as a counselor and violin teacher for the Choir Camp that JP runs for a week every summer for elementary school age children. He had me perform on violin for some services, play in small chamber orchestras for special concerts, and even gave me the opportunity to perform a Haydn violin concerto with an orchestra during my senior year of high school. JP also hosts a choir rehearsal and dinner for young adults college-age and older during Thanksgiving and Christmas break, for performances on Christmas and the Sunday after. And I am so grateful that he has written me many a recommendation, including one that helped me get my current position serving you!

Last summer, I was working during some of the days of Choir Camp, so I could not be a counselor, but JP called me the week before and asked me if I wanted to lead morning devotions on the last day of camp. The theme was "musical instruments," and I thought that he wanted me to come in and help teach violin or something like that. But instead, JP asked me if I would talk about my service experiences in high school and college and explain to the kids what I was going to be doing soon as a member of the Lutheran Volunteer Corps. He wanted me to talk about being a human instrument – ways that people can sing God's praises through the instruments of their hearts and minds.

When I stood up in front of the campers on that Friday morning, I did have quite a few stories to share from my own life. But it was so cool that JP and the church leadership had given me some other examples of ways to be a human instrument. During the week of camp, JP had the kids bring in school supplies to donate to kids in need for the upcoming fall, and they were piled up in front of the kids on tables in our sanctuary. That was an easy example I could literally point to so the campers could see and think about how their generosity would help serve others. I also talked about the summer worship and block party that my church has held for a few years now for the congregation and community and how that was a great celebration because so many people, all kinds of people, could come together to worship and sing, eat and play. Simply being together at that party and in the sanctuary, the campers could be human instruments of God's word. And my music director wanted me to tell them that!

I will do my best in 2011 to remember that, even when I have tough days, there is always some way that I can be a human instrument of compassion and love towards others, and that opportunities – for community outreach and service - may arise from unexpected places.

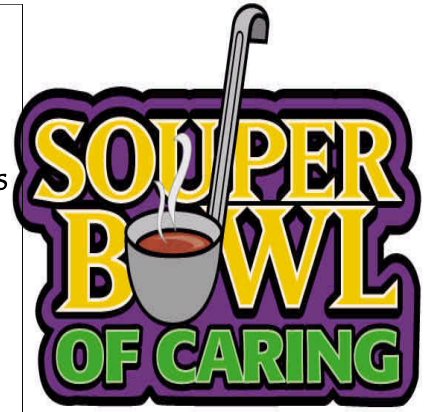

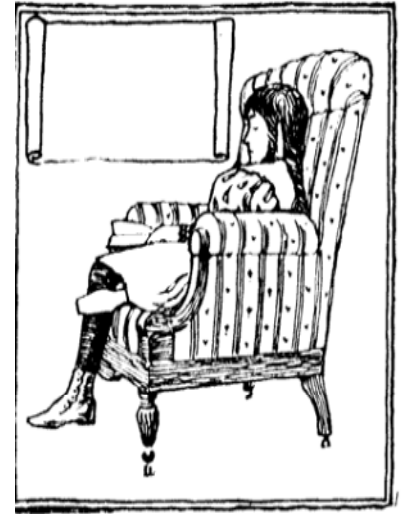

Celebrations for Christmas began at Latina Resource Center, home to our Latinas in Micro Business sewing and educational classes. I asked our participants for ideas in celebrating our first Christmas together and they were unanimous in sharing that they wanted a “working” Christmas party. Our women didn’t want to miss a class in lieu of a party, rather, they asked if we could combine a party with their classes. This highlights that our micro-business classes have garnered a committed and eager group of students! Our women have learned a lot this past semester, from how to use a machine to how to sew zippers on skirts. I suggested that our party include all of us bringing in items that needed sewing from our families. Did this idea ever take off! All participants brought in multiple items, including school outfits, party dresses and work pants. Much of the fun of the day surrounded making these items useful again. As Anabel, a student who has not missed a single class summed it up: “We don’t have much money for gifts this year in my family, but since I have learned how to fix up clothes that are still so beautiful, my children can wear them again! I’m proud I can do this for them!” The party wasn’t all work, we each brought in some desserts and shared stories about Christmas traditions.

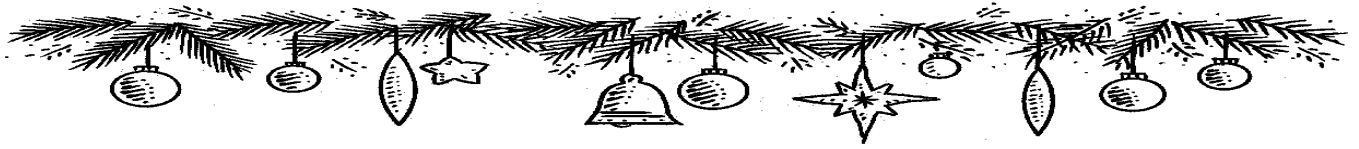
Our Latinas in Action classes also celebrated Christmas with a Zumbathon and potluck held at Grace Lutheran Church. As always, Gema did a tremendous job in decorating and thinking of many creative, low budget special ideas to make the day memorable. For Gema and me, it was amazing to see our different participants lead the entire group in various songs and dance steps. Many of our participants were new to dance completely, so seeing them have the confidence to lead and engage the other participants was tremendous. Two of our South High School students, Maria and Michelle, surprised everyone in leading for two different songs, and did so with poise and maturity. Participants and all staff each shared a bit about what we are grateful for this holiday. First and foremost, all of us shared that we are grateful for our children and families. Participants and instructors also shared that they are grateful for having time to celebrate together and shared that Latinas in Action has helped improve self-esteem, fitness and health and that the group is like a 2nd family.

Our Amigos in Action Youth Program also celebrated Christmas with an evening devoted to making crafts for family members. Many of our younger participants go to different schools, but make time to get together each Wednesday and Friday evening to see one another, compare notes about school, talk about books and catch up. This sense of community is one that makes our celebrations together much more connected and special. The ease with which the youth interact with one another and share their stories is a true blessing to behold.

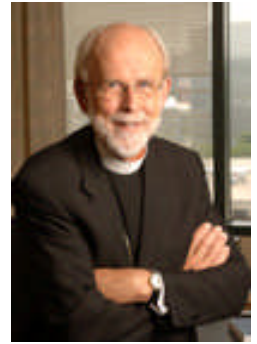

“How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of the messenger who announces peace, who brings good news, who announces salvation!” (Isaiah 52:7)

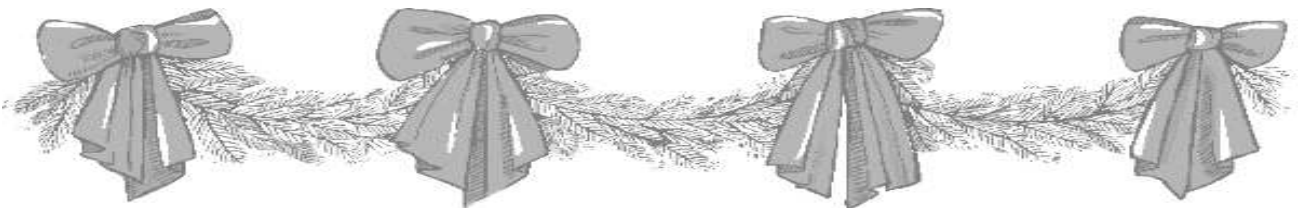
When Jesus was born, angelic messengers broke the still calm of a Galilean night to sing joyously and proclaim, “This very day in David’s city a Savior is born for you — God’s Promised One, your Lord.” Glad tidings of great joy! Common shepherds were the first and heartiest heralds of the promised Savior’s arrival then, and today the joy in Jesus’ birth fills every corner of this season.

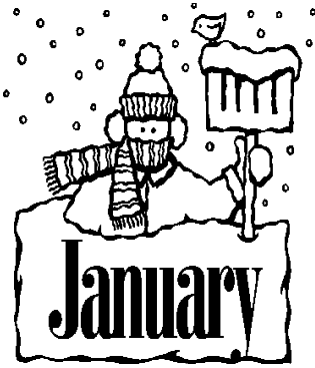
Admittedly sometimes in modern America the commercial clatter and cultural clutter of the season seem to overtake the angels’ song and the shepherds’ joyous news. Laughter is a smile with the volume turned up.

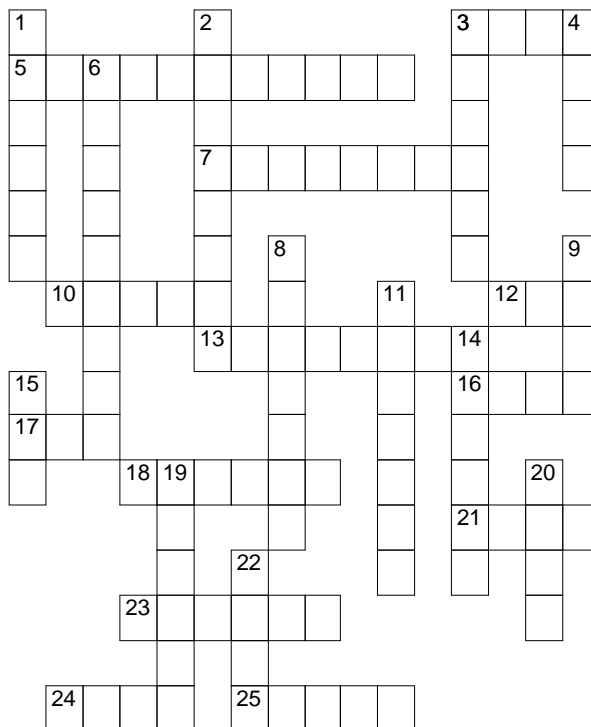
