

The regular meeting of the Council was held on November 16. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: we pray for Sandy Fitzgerald, who battles brain cancer; we pray for Rick Moore as he struggles with health concerns; we pray for Julie Cahill, who is in rehabilitation and has lost a great grandchild; we pray for Kevin Courtney, as he struggles with side effects from chemotherapy treatments for colon cancer; we lift praise for Jimmy Wyman, although he is still recovering from a bad motorcycle accident, he is feeling somewhat better; we pray for friends and relatives who have lost loved ones, that they will be able to move forward in their own lives; we pray for our custodian, Brian Sutej, who is recovering from a broken leg; we pray for the Hawkins family who has lost a son to a violent act; we pray for John Volcheck who struggles with liver and colon cancer; we pray for the family of Stacey Klinger, the South High teacher, who was killed in a traffic accident, as well as, the gentleman who was involved in the accident who is having a hard time dealing with grief and depression; we pray for the children in the "After School" program and their families, as well as the children who start and then do not return; we pray for safe travel during the holidays while people go to see their loved ones; we pray for people suffering from damages caused by natural disasters; we pray for the needs of our Sudanese brothers and sisters; and we pray for the safety of armed service personnel, as well as our police and fire personnel, who protect each one of us.


Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses of Isaiah 2:12 and 1 John 2:17 from the "Daily Texts." These verses remind us that we are held accountable and live up to our responsibilities. We cannot be "into ourselves." Loving God shows up in how we treat others. The love of God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, leads us to doing what God wants, not what we want. We remember that we are God's servants and we convey God's goodness's and kindnesses in everything we do.

<u>Visions for Ministry:</u> The Council continued their conversation on "Radical Welcome." Interestingly enough, the Bible verses from the "*Daily Texts*" tied in with the conversation. We represent God's Church, not "our" church. We must take the responsibility to tune into what God is doing and what God wants us to be doing. We must ask ourselves if the things we do within the church are something we want to do our way, or are we following God's mission and doing things God's way. It's a struggle for all of us to stay involved and have trust, but God's love will guide us in the right direction. In God's Church, we must care for one another and hold firm in our faith in God.

Council Notes...

<u>Finance</u>: The Council and Pastor Laaker had discussion regarding the property to the north of the Church that is going to be for sale. The owners are giving Grace Lutheran the first chance at buying the property.

This effort would require a loan. The Mission Investment Fund of the ELCA offers such a loan. The Council felt that it would be appropriate for Pastor Laaker to go ahead and submit a "preliminary application" to see if it would be financially feasible to pursue the idea of expanding the Church's property. Discussions will continue and the Council will keep the congregation up-to-date.

It was reported that Pastor Laaker's health premiums through the Board of Pensions, will not increase in 2011.

The Council will have a discussion at the December meeting on the amount that will be recommended for the 2011 Mission Share.

<u>Property</u>: Cold weather projects are being completed at the Church. Sealant will be applied to the roof where a leak has developed in the upper fellowship hall.

<u>Service/Social Ministry</u>: On Sunday, November 21st, the 300th "Habitat House" will be dedicated at 2:00 P.M. at Salem Baptist Church in Omaha. Everyone is welcome to come and celebrate this amazing accomplishment in the city.

<u>Support/Stewardship</u>: The Fall Stewardship materials have been mailed. Remember, God wants us to use our time and talent for his purposes.



An Advent Message From the Pastor

We have begun the season of Advent, a time of expectant waiting and preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus at Christmas.

For Christians, Advent should be a time of preparation, but our society places lots of pressure to skip Advent and go straight to Christmas. It's much like skipping Lent and going straight to Easter.

Advent is a time for Christians to recognize the great gift God has given to us through the birth of Jesus. It's not just the baby Jesus, but the fact that he grew up to be a man and showed us how to live. We are called to give of ourselves, which seems to be the opposite of what society tells us.

The word Advent is Latin for "coming" or "arrival." It's a whole lot more than looking forward to the birth of Jesus. The scripture readings for the first Sunday center on the second coming of Jesus, while the second and third Sundays focus on John the Baptist and his prophecy that a savior is coming. It's not until the fourth Sunday in Advent that we hear about a baby being born.


The spirit of Advent is expressed well in the parable of the bridesmaids who are anxiously awaiting the coming of the bridegroom (Matthew 25:1-13). There is profound joy at the bridegroom's expected coming. And yet a warning of the need for preparation echoes through the parable.

"Advent is not just a time of waiting for Jesus, but a time of preparing ourselves," said Sister Roberta Marie Doneth, administrator of the St. Francis Spirituality Center, Tiffin. "(It's) believing in hope that even with all our shortcomings and wrongdoings, God loves us so much that God is willing to dwell in our midst and nourish us abundantly with the graces we need to follow our spiritual journeys."

Advent also symbolizes the spiritual journey of individuals and congregations. A key focus is on God's giving of God's self to the world. We, in turn, focus on sharing the light of Christ with others. All lights point to the light of Christ. Christ is the real light that shines in the darkness.

May we prepare well this Advent and work to become the best reflection of the light of Christ.


- -More family-friendly coffeehouse/movie nights



Faithful Stewards of God's Infinite Grace"

In addition to time and talents, God has also given us financial resources. For most of us, this means working to secure monetary gain. But make no mistake about it: According to Deuteronomy chapter 8, God gives us the ability to earn money. According to King Solomon, even work itself is a gift from God (Eccl. 5:19) In fact, everything we have — even the air we breathe in order to be able to work — is a gift that has been temporarily loaned to us by God.

The truth of the temporary status of our financial resources was brought home to a pastor who needed a dark suit to conduct a funeral. He had very little money, so he went to a local pawn shop where he found a like-new suit in just the right size at a very inexpensive price. As he paid for the suit, he asked the clerk how the pawn shop could afford to sell the suit at such a low price. The clerk smiled and admitted that all their suits had once been owned by a local mortuary that had gone out of business.

The minister felt a little strange wearing a suit that had once been part of a funeral home's inventory, but he quickly set aside his apprehension since the price was so low and since no one would know. Everything was fine until in the middle of the funeral service, he casually started to put his hand into the pocket of the pants — only to discover there were no pockets! What an object lesson he received that day as he preached about the importance of living in the light of eternity while wearing a pair of pants without pockets!

All of us know the old saying, "You can't take it with you." That's why whatever we are going to do with the financial resources God has entrusted to us has to be done in this life. In fact, whatever we intend to do for the Lord with our money, we need to be doing now. Or as one person observed, "Do your giving while you're living so you'll be knowing where it's going!

How we use the money which God has given to us is an indicator of our priorities. Our checkbook will reveal clearly the things that are really important to us. How we spend our money is, in fact, a barometer of our spiritual temperature and of our personal faith. You see, it doesn't take a lot of faith to make a rational, logical decision concerning our giving. As we review expenses and anticipated income, we can easily find the balance and base our commitment on the numbers alone. But exercising faith, looking to God as our Source to provide above and beyond what we might reasonably be expected to give, well — that's another story.

As you consider your life during this time of stewardship emphasis, will you — like the Macedonian Christians — begin by first giving yourself to the Lord? Will you then be one of the "Faithful Stewards of God's Infinite Grace" who will step out by faith by giving your time, your talents and your treasure to the Lord?

On behalf of our entire congregation and staff, we want to express our sincere thanks and appreciation to you for your participation in this year's stewardship emphasis, "Faithful Stewards of God's Infinite Grace." We thank God for you and for your willingness to step out by faith with others here at Grace Lutheran Church concerning your giving in the future.

Interfaith Health Service's Programs Build Relationships, In Large and Small Ways

At Interfaith and Latinas in Action, we have seen quite an increase in participants in all of our programs! Our sewing classes/micro-business classes are at capacity with a waiting list for future classes as soon as we secure additional funding. Our outreach/Zumba program reaching domestic violence survivors has also met capacity and necessitates considering adding another class for women and children. Our evening programs, as always, are welcoming many new families each week and has also meant an increase in our children and teen participants.

I have been in meetings lately with groups of students from the University of Nebraska Omaha and Creighton interested in helping out during our evening programs. If this takes shape, it will likely include some assistance in childcare and in regular activities. Like many other folks, I view partnerships as a two-way street. Volunteers within our programs are sharing their own time and talents. Our participants, too, share their time and talents with the volunteers. The whole experience of mutuality can be very rich and rewarding. Building such relationships does not happen over-night and requires a commitment to honoring the reality that time, care and attention must be intentional in nature for relationships to blossom. Such elements, along with others, are necessary to facilitate mutual trust and openness in relationships.

A very small example of relationship building has been apparent for me this month when one of our Amigos in Action students, Christopher, began returning regularly to our evening classes to participate in teen programming. I had not seen Christopher since I happened to share lunch with him and his family at the zoo this summer. He is now in 7th grade at Beveridge Elementary school and very involved in sports. Many of his soccer games conflicted with Amigos in Action activities. Now that his soccer season is over, Christopher shared that he missed seeing his friends (and even missed talking to me!) and taking part in Amigos in Action a great deal.

Christopher had been going through a tough time in school and had a setback when he missed several weeks due to illness. He has recovered fully and is now attending school every day and has the energy to attend our programs with his mom. I enjoy checking in with him on school, homework and sports each Wednesday and Friday. His mom shared with me that he values this type of adult time and that she is very happy he has a place where he feels so connected and welcomed each week by other teenagers. She noted that some of his friends and neighbors are already experiencing negative influences, especially after school and in the evenings, and she believes Amigos in Action is having a very positive impact on him. He is the one rushing her out the door to get to classes, she marvels, so that he can spend as much time as possible with Amigos in Action.

For my part, I am so happy to see Christopher return to our programs! Amigos in Action participants and I were able to take up with him just where we left off in sharing our stories. He is a wonderful young man. He is witty, full of energy, and is always ready with a story about school or a recent experience to share. Christopher is also extremely kind to our younger children and is an amazing example of someone who role models positive behaviors around them. It is remarkable how much our three and four years olds, in particular, pay attention to him and seek him out because of his willingness to engage them.

When we hosted a group of nursing students from Methodist College recently, Christopher was as engaging as ever and eager to talk with the students about college. He shared a few jokes with the students that he learned in school and every student commented on his sparkling personality. For me, just as is true for students or participants, it is easy to spend time with Christopher because I learn a great deal about what his hopes and dreams are, his values, his commitment to his faith and my life is richer for knowing him and his family. He is a real blessing for each one of us.


