The regular meeting of the Council was held on April 12. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: we pray for the town of Mapleton, Iowa, as they recently had a tornado that destroyed 60% of their community, but sing praises of thanksgiving for minimal injuries and no loss of life; we pray for the nation of Japan that has been faced heavy loss of life and destruction following a major earthquake; we pray for Phil Minino, who has lung cancer, a brain tumor, and a fractured hip; we pray for fellow Grace member, Ken Hilmer, as he is having eye surgery; we pray for the countries of Sudan, Libya, and others who are experiencing political unrest; we pray for an end to the violence in our own city that affects not only victims and their families, but so many innocent people; we pray for Sue Rose, who is undergoing radiation and chemotherapy for lung cancer; we pray for our shut-in's, Barbara Nelson, Barb Narducci, and Mae Lane; we sing praises of thanksgiving for Kevin Courtney, as his strength is slowly returning after his treatment of colon cancer; we sing praises of thanksgiving for David Hufford and the rest of the Nebraska Synod travelers for returning home safely from their trip in the Middle East; we pray for Jerry Wiebelhaus, who is diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease; we pray for Alice Morgan, who has a staph infection of her blood; we pray for Alice Gillett, who has pneumonia; we pray for John Hassel, who has had a pacemaker implanted; we pray for the millions of people across the nation that are unemployed, including our own fellow member, Titus Duli; we pray for all people suffering from physical and emotional trauma caused by natural disasters; we pray for the needs of our Sudanese brothers and sisters; we pray for the safety of armed service personnel, police and patrol officers; and as we count our many blessings, we pray for the poor, the hungry, the homeless, and the oppressed.

Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses of Jeremiah 31:10 and Romans 4:21 from the "*Daily Texts.*" Jeremiah gives encouragement to those being scattered in different directions. All people will be comforted by God's love and be gathered together, much like a Shepherd gathers his flock. Romans also tells us of God's encouragement. Paul had great faith and was fully convinced that God would keep his promises to the people of Israel.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: The Council continued their discussion on the book titled, "*Leadership in Congregations*." There are so many significant changes going on in congregations and churches in this day and age, we have to have "open" attitudes and a good sense of humor, which are necessary tools in keeping relationships open and working. There will always be criticism, but we must find ways to make it constructive. We cannot just sit around waiting for something to happen; we need to act on the changes that are happening around us now.

Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

<u>Christian Education</u>: Anna Ernst has been involved in discussions with a few other Lutheran Churches; hosted by St. Matthew's, on youth serving Omaha. This is an effort to bring together youth and staff for ministries in South Omaha. This effort is for a week of service this summer. The dates for VBS have been set as June 26-30.

<u>Evangelism/Outreach</u>: There was a walk in the neighborhood on May 2<sup>nd</sup>. This walk was focused on building awareness as a neighbor to neighbors around us. There will be a second walk planned by Anna Ernst and there will be a sign up sheet for anyone wishing to join the walk. In reflection, we would like to explore ways of partnering together for common causes. "Family Fun Night" will be on May 15<sup>th</sup> at the Church, hosted by Anna Ernst. On May 17<sup>th</sup>, the Council is invited to welcome the kids and their parents who will be involved in the "Kids at Work" Program this year. A light supper will be served at approximately 6:30 p.m. A reminder, that on April 16<sup>th</sup>, from 6:00-9:30 p.m., OTOC is hosting "OTOC 2011." This is a celebration of art, music, and community. Pastor Laaker is selling tickets for \$20.00 to anyone who is looking for some good, clean fun. This event will be held at the Hot Shops Art Center, located at 1301 Nicholas. The Christian band, "Lost and Found", will be at Shepherd of the Hills on Thursday, April 14<sup>th</sup>, located at 60<sup>th</sup> and Redick.

<u>Finance</u>: Pastor Laaker reported that Habitat for Humanity verified that the Olson house on the north side of the Church could not be moved by them. The Olson family is aware that the house will probably be torn down. Purchase agreements have been given to both property owners to review. At this point, no further contact has been received from the property owners to the south of the Church.

<u>Property</u>: The Articles of Incorporation have been redone to comply with Nebraska regulations. New batteries will be put in the exit signs before the inspection is due.

Service/Social Ministry: Habitat for Humanity will start a house build at 1519 South 27th Street on June 10th.

<u>Support/Stewardship</u>: The Gideons sent a thank-you note for the 115.00 that was collected from the congregation.

<u>Worship</u>: The last mid-week Lenten service will be on April 13<sup>th</sup>. There will be two Easter Services at the Church. The first one is 6:30 a.m. and the second one is at 10:30 a.m. The Moyer's will be hosting the breakfast at 8:00 a.m.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: One more person is needed to go to the Nebraska Synod Assembly during the first weekend in June. The meeting is titled, "Faith 2 Grow." David Hufford has agreed to be a voting member, but another person is needed.

<u>New Business</u>: The Church is in need of purchasing a new Risograph machine. Pastor Laaker has obtained different bids and presented a proposal to the Council. Pastor Laaker received a letter from the Coram Deo Church looking for space that would be large enough for 500 adults and 120 children. Pastor Laaker will call them back if he knows of a place that would be large enough. The Council reviewed a written security/privacy policy, which has been suggested by the ELCA. The policy was adopted.

<u>Announcements:</u> Ernie Olson will bring treats and lead the closing prayer for our May 2011 Council meeting. Pastor Laaker is to be recognized by the United Way as one of the top five volunteers in the community. David Hufford has written a poem that came in third place and will be published in the "*Writer's Digest*."

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We have just journeyed through our Lenten season and now have celebrated the joyful good news of Easter. Throughout Lent, during our mid-week services, we heard how "Faith Is" an important part of peoples' lives. We heard how faith informs, encourages and sustains. As we enter this Easter season, change is all around us. Now only the change from death to life, as evidenced in spring flowers, greening grass, budding trees, resurrection from the dead by Jesus but also change in our lives as the Spirit of God moves within us.

Change is never easy. Mark Twain once said that "the only person who likes change is a wet baby." But change is necessary, perpetual, and a sign of growth. Without openness to change, decay sets in and death lurks in the shadows. Martin Luther said that the Word of God, whenever it comes, comes to change and renew the world.

In our Sunday morning scriptures over the next few weeks, we will hear about change. On Easter, we heard that Peter had a big change. He said, "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him." This is a big change for Peter. He was schooled as a Jew. This was an exclusive faith community. For him to see God's work open and inclusive was a big change.

The women on that first Easter morning went to the tomb expecting to find a corpse. When they arrived, they were met by an angel who told them that the dead one they expected to find was no longer dead but alive. How do you change death to life? They were afraid and joyful at the same time. The change that they experienced was in the meeting of the risen Christ. Their fear becomes overwhelming joy. He is risen!

The disciples experience change when Jesus shows up in their midst. They are behind locked doors and Jesus appears. They experience the change of hearts captured by fear of those who carried out the execution to hearts filled with the Holy Spirit willing and able to share the good news about this one, this Christ, who is risen and lives. Those two disciples on the road will say, did not our hearts burn within us while he was talking to us. This one that is resurrected has the power to recreate hope in our lives.

I have experienced change in my life. Yes, I've gone from younger to older. I expect that change. The change that I didn't expect has been in the way God has influenced my understanding of poverty and wealth. This has not been an easy change or a miraculous quick change. It has been a process that God has been working on me in these last ten years or so. I used to think that I was poor in material means. As I looked around, lots of folks had more things, received more in income, and were recognized as models of influence. I wanted to be like them. I wanted to have more. But God placed me here and has kept me here on this side of the city. Here God has changed my heart and my mind. God has shown me the poverty of my wealth. God has shown me the wealth of poverty in the people I supervise and serve. Now my heart is broken for my brothers and sisters who struggle to make ends meet but find joy in caring for one another. My heart is broken for my brothers and sisters who have so much that they are captured by the need to hold onto all their things and in so doing experience fear and loss.

God has changed me. I now want to be in relationship with those who have less because I want their joy to infect me. I want to express my outrage at those who make policy decisions that mistakenly believe that pooling more and more resources into the hands of a few will bring about change and uplift for the many.

My faith is changing me. I wonder what faith is doing for you?



How many times have you stood up for yourself? Expressed your opinion, not in an argumentative or pressuring way, but in a way that says to the world, "I have feelings about this, I value those feelings and myself, and I want to share those feelings with you"? When was the last time you did that?

Sometimes I have a very hard time standing up for myself. Though I have been working forty hours a week for social justice since last August and loving it, sometimes the fear and anxiety I see in myself or others makes me want to give up. Maybe I should just stay in bed and pull the covers over my head, because nothing I say or do is really going to make a difference anyway. I'm just one person.

One Grace congregation member, greeting at the door on Palm Sunday, was just one person doing what she could do – warmly, lovingly, genuinely welcoming neighbors into worship. We are definitely blessed by members such as Louise – one person among many who show God's love to others.

Jesus was one person, too, who had a hard time standing up as he was being whipped and beaten on his way to the cross, carrying the burden of our sin. But when Easter Sunday morning came and the angel rolled the stone away from Jesus' tomb, he wasn't there anymore! He was standing up, risen, because sins had been forgiven, to announce life, peace and love. Death could not and would not keep him in the grave, and it won't keep us there either. Alleluia! Hallelujah! Hooray!

So, what can we do? How can we stand up for ourselves? How can we brush away the dead branches of fear and anxiety from our hearts, roll the stone away, and say "I am here, world, and I want to love you as Jesus loves you"?

As I write, the lot where the new Habitat for Humanity house is to be built this summer at 1519 South 27<sup>th</sup> Street (a three-minute walk away from Grace) is being prepared. What a wonderful opportunity for us to do what we each can do - together! This summer, on Fridays and Saturdays working, serving food and/or praying for the build, and during VBS and our time with the Kids at Work, we can stand up, throw open our doors and our hearts to the summer air, and let the love of the risen Christ shine in and out of us in our church and in our neighborhood. What a joy it will be to stand up with you!

I'm SO excited to spend my summer at Grace and in the neighborhood. 



So they left the tomb quickly with fear and great joy, and ran to tell his disciples. (Matthew 28:8)

Mary Magdalene and Mary walked to Jesus' grave, expecting to find death. It's understandable. Images of violence filled their minds. Thoughts of their vulnerability and mortality deadened their spirits. Death had become the defining story of their lives.



Instead of death, the women met a resurrection messenger who said, "He is not here: for he has been raised, as he said." As they hurried to tell others, the risen Jesus met them. They were changed. Now resurrection, not death, would define their lives.

Jesus lives! Now resurrection, not death, defines our lives. Jesus continues to meet you in resurrection messengers, just as Jesus met me in Pastor Josephus Livenson Lauvanus, president of the Lutheran Church of Haiti. As we walked through the ruins and rubble that lie in the aftermath of Haiti's earthquake, Pastor Livenson Lauvanus proclaimed, "We will not be defined by rubble, but by restoration, for we are a people of the resurrection."

Baptized into Jesus' death and raised to newness of life we, too, are people of the resurrection. We, too, are resurrection messengers. We, too, are about God's work of restoration.

The world aches to hear the message we have to tell. Sing with joy! Jesus lives! We are a people of the resurrection.



### Meeting the Mission: Pennies for S.W.I.M. (St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Valley)

The Sunday School kids at St. Mark's in Valley collected 300,000 pennies over a four-month period as part of "Pennies to SWIM" in an effort to buy a water purification system to help those overseas without fresh water.

The purification unit was purchased through Safe Water International Ministries, an organization that distributes the technology to areas in need worldwide. The unit itself is a ready-to-use device that purifies enough wa-

ter to meet the needs of a village of 1,000 people.

The St. Mark's kids used a five-gallon water jug to collect the pennies. They sought donations, raked leaves, among other things, to earn the pennies. One young man reportedly cleaned his parents' car out each night for change to give to the program.

Now that the jug has been filled once, the kids at St. Mark's have expressed a desire to start over and fill it again.
