#### Gifts to Remember - From the December 2011 edition of The Lutheran Magazine...

A mother's love...When I was 6 or 7 years old, my parents were just starting farming and had very little money. However, I had big wishes. When the Christmas catalog came out, I found a beautiful bride doll that I wanted for



my Christmas gift. I asked Santa for nothing else. On Christmas morning my old doll was under the tree dressed in a beautiful bride outfit. My mother, who hated to sew, had made this outfit for my old doll. It wasn't until I was older that I realized just what a precious gift that really was.



Advent? Christmas? Which is it? I find myself in a state of quandary. My spirit says that it is Advent and time to prepare. My culture says it is Christmas and time to buy, shop, and prepare. Only this preparation has nothing to do with spiritual matters.

On Sunday, the first Sunday of Advent, we heard the prophet Isaiah: "Oh that you would tear open the heavens and come down..." Sometimes, I, too, wish that God would tear open the heavens and come down. I listen to the stories of people longing for meaningful work, families separated by archaic immigration policies, health issues that leave some struggling to survive. I listen to stories about military policies that allow for unmanned drones to bomb villages killing women and children without any sense of horror or dread. I read stories about politicians unwilling to work together to offer solutions to our economic stalemate. Maybe God could sort this all out, just tear open the heavens and come down.

How do I prepare to observe this holy time when there seems to be so many unholy things that demand God's intervention in order to set things right?

I am grateful for the prophet's later response: "Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand. Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD, and do not remember iniquity forever. Now consider, we are all your people." This response gives me hope. God is still forming and forgiving.

I was intrigued by a daily devotion that I receive from Fr. Richard Rohr. He writes: Jesus identified his own message with what he called the coming of the "reign of God" or the "kingdom of God," whereas we have often settled for the sweet coming of a baby who asked little of us in terms of *surrender*, *encounter*, *mutuality or any studying of the Scriptures or the actual teaching of Jesus*.

"This is what I am inviting you to this Advent. But be forewarned: the Word of God *confronts, converts, and consoles* us—in that order. The suffering, injustice and devastation on this planet are too great now to settle for any infantile gospel or any infantile Jesus."

I invite you to find a place for some holy time this Advent. May you experience the real presence of Jesus through the power of the Holy Spirit. May we all surrender to the one who confronts, converts and consoles us.

I invite you to worship on the Sundays of Advent, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. May the presence of Christ bless you and yours.

The first Christmas form letter (from Egypt)

Dear Friends:

We're sorry to resort to this form letter, especially since we are sending it after the holidays, but this has been a busy year; it is amazing how parenthood takes away free time. That's right, parenthood. Joe and I are the proud parents of a beautiful baby boy, a gift from God. Literally.

Now, I know that you're good at mathematics, and I know you don't remember a wedding invitation, just that we were engaged, but it is not what you think. It is a little hard to explain, however. You also will notice that the postmark is not Nazareth, but Egypt. No, we did not move, at least not permanently. No, Joe did not get transferred, just transplanted.

You remember that census thing? Joe and I had to go to Bethlehem – Joe is a Davidson, after all – and wouldn't you know it, my time came while we were there. Everything was full up. Bethlehem was a madhouse. Holiday Inn was packed for the holidays. Red Roof not only had no frills but no vacancies, and Motel Six turned the light off for us.

We ended up going to, of all places, a cave. While it wasn't a picnic, it was a miracle. As we wrapped him up, Joe and I just marveled at this new little life. We named him Jesus. Actually, an angel named him. I told you it was a busy year. Anyway, we had just the best Christmas together – that's what we're calling it, Christmas. We even had a surprise visit from some shepherds; I won't tell you how they knew, because I know this already is quite a stretch for you.

Our Families in Action Sewing and Micro-Business classes began nearly two years ago with a donation of high-end wedding dresses from Wells Fargo Bank. Thanks to a \$1,000 grant from Countryside Community Church, we were able to continue classes this Fall.

Because Families in Action is a trusted organization, classes continue to be filled to capacity. There are currently several dozen women enrolled, none of whom had taken a sewing class prior to attending classes. On average, each women involved in the program has 3 children. Classes are held once a week and last for 2.5 hours.

Community-wide fashion shows continue to be hosted at Grace Lutheran Church in conjunction with our micro-business program. Over 100 community members and leaders attend the shows, including students from South High School, faculty members from Creighton University and Methodist college, and directors of small non-profits in the community. A unique thing about our fashion shows is that participants volunteer as models for the show and contribute products which are sold afterwards. Proceeds go directly to funding for additional classes. Participants share that they are proud of being able to model the products they make in class and that it is a big event for them to model in front of an audience of all women. This illustrates pride in craft, as well as self-esteem imitative.

Ramona, a Families in Action exercise participant, continues serving as our Latinas in Business Instructor. She brings a wealth of skill and the ability to instruct on several different level simultaneously.

The reputation Families in Action has worked tirelessly to build in the community has been the key to our success in our sewing and micro-business programs. Many organizations attempt new projects, few have success from inception like Interfaith. This is largely because of the investment, trust and leadership participants have in the organization, and because of the dedication of staff who intentionally live and work in South Omaha.

For participants, classes have become a special time to learn together and support one another in something tangible: making clothing for selves, family or to sell in fashion shows or at churches or farmer's markets. Classes have become an outlet to explore participant creativity while using the time wisely to develop plans for the future. Local Latina business leaders have spoke to classes about self-employment options, price points, vending options, creativity in advertising.

Participants in Latinas in Business have asked for additional classes, guest speakers and expansion. Families in Action is limited by funding dollars in ability to offer on-going services, thus, we are actively seeking support for the future. Your support and prayers are appreciated. We remain grateful for all of our partners in ministry, and we look forward to providing additional programs in the future.
