The regular meeting of the Council was held February 14<sup>th</sup>. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We welcomed new members to the council. Announcements: Pastor will be in D.C. from 3/6 - 3/9 at a training seminar, as well as lobbying for Palestinian & Israeli issues. Pastor also spoke about the fact that his name has been submitted for consideration of the position of Bishop of the Nebraska Synod. This position would begin September 1, 2012. Vicki will bring treats for our March meeting.



You may recall that last month, I shared that I had begun reading a new book I picked up at our Theological Conference last October. The name of the book is "The Future Starts Now." It is a collection of ideas from a variety of authors who are part of an organization, A Renewal Enterprise.

I do like the questions this new author raises: What difference did I make in the world today? Did I make a contribution to something or somebody else? How am I being useful to God? These are marvelous questions that can help me and hopefully all of us to keep our focus on the most helpful way of being a disciple of Jesus.

On Ash Wednesday, I shared the following. This book that suggests that the way we might approach this time as the church is to be brave enough to ask the right questions, to listen for what God is saying, and to step into the future, confident in God's promise and power. The church needs to stop fighting over things that don't matter and clinging to structures that don't work anymore. The church needs to be ready to follow wherever God leads next.

To that end, the authors suggest three principles: Be who you are; See what you have; and Do what matters.

The first principle: be who you are. I shared a story about a pastor and congregation who were perceived as imperfect and undesirable. However, together they were learning some important things: They were discovering how to be who they are and see what they have for the sake of doing what matters. So, they are doing whatever they can with whatever they've got to be useful to God. They have come to believe that, no matter what anybody else thinks or says, there is an extraordinary power at work within them. And they seem committed to putting that power to good use no matter what tomorrow holds.

These disciples were challenged to use their skills as fishermen to fish for people. Other disciples, such as Matthew, were called to use their skills for the kingdom. The point is, when Jesus invites you to follow him, he invites you to be who you are and see what you have for the sake of doing what matters to God. There is nothing you need to be, earn, buy, build or acquire in order to be useful to God. There is no need for fear, embarrassment, anxiety or shame. You can't be too old or too young, too rich or too poor. There is no such thing as inadequate. Jesus sees you, knows you, calls you, and is setting you free to put exactly who you are and what you have into the service of God's loving mission.

The third principle: do what matters. People today don't want to be told what to do, especially if they haven't been asked for their input. People want their time to count. They want to be taken seriously. They want their passions to be put to good use. So, maybe what matters is participating in our community organizing group, Omaha Together One Community, as it seeks to bring about more humane treatment of immigrants, pregnant women and tenants in rental properties. Maybe what matters is taking the risk of asking that checkout clerk, who seems so busy and burdened, how you can ask God to bless them today.

May God help us be the best we can be, recognize the gifts we have to be a blessing to others and do the things that really matter.



And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work.





#### **One Another for ELCA Hunger**

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:34-35)

In Nebraska, we understand as well as anyone in the U.S. – perhaps the world – the important relationship between the precious earth and resources God has blessed us with and our ability to feed and nourish ourselves. We understand what it means to be part of a community that looks out for one another.

Hunger is present in developing countries and here at home. It happens in both urban and rural settings. In short, hunger affects people everywhere, across the world, across the country and across the street.

#### Consider the following:

- One out of every seven people on the planet suffers from hunger and poverty.
- One out of every six people lack safe drinking water.
- Every 5.4 seconds, a child dies from a preventable disease related to malnutrition.
- In the U.S., about 11 percent of the population deals with hunger on a daily basis.
- The number of households requesting emergency food assistance is on the rise, with almost half coming from families with children.

Here in the nation's bread basket, we believe that we can feed the world. So let's do it.

*One Another for ELCA World Hunger* is a joint justice/giving campaign authorized by the Nebraska Synod Council and aimed at engaging local mission centers in discussion about the poverty and hunger in our midst and how we can respond as the church.

Eighty percent of giving to One Another will go directly to ELCA World Hunger. In addition to direct food aid, ELCA World Hunger works to help develop hunger-relief solutions through programs that address economic sustainability, housing, job training, sanitation. ELCA World Hunger acts consistently with the great Lutheran tradition of looking for solutions that will address people's needs well beyond today and tomorrow.

The remaining 20 percent of giving to One Another will stay in the Nebraska Synod to help support and undergird local hunger-relief efforts that are affiliated with the Synod and its mission centers, such as food pantries and job skills ministries.

#### What Can I Do?

We can't address hunger and poverty if we don't understand the nature and scope of the problem. By engaging each other in conversation, we hope that there will be a healthy sharing of knowledge and experiences that will help create a greater understanding of the root causes of hunger and our calling as Christ's disciples to address these issues in our world and communities.

As part of One Another, each mission center will receive educational materials intended to encourage reflection and discussion about hunger and poverty and our role as the church in addressing the issues involved. These materials are excellent resources for worship, adult discussions, Sunday school classes, open forums, etc.

- Fast for *ONE* day to stand with those who suffer from hunger and poverty.
- Send *ONE* letter or e-mail to a decision maker who can help improve the lives of those who suffer from hunger or poverty.

The Nebraska Synod has a long history of supporting ELCA World Hunger through our financial gifts. This year, we are asking mission centers and individuals to prayerfully consider increasing their giving with the goal of raising \$300,000 this fiscal year.


A successful businessman had one very bad habit. He'd come home very drunk. His family tried everything, including Alcoholics Anonymous. Nothing worked.
