impact this effort has made in the lives of young people and their families. I am amazed at the efforts of leaders and volunteers who help make this ministry effort a resounding success. Thank You!

We also celebrated the work of our Lutheran Volunteer Corps member, Jessica Menary. Jessica came to us last August fresh out of college. She leaves us as a valued member of our ministry staff. I have thoroughly enjoyed Jessica's work among us. She has demonstrated wonderful gifts of patience and persistence. She has willingly taken on roles that were not in her job description when we began. Her enthusiast smile captured the hearts of many. We will miss her but know that her ministry among us has been a wonderful blessing.

In mid-August, we will welcome Malachi Black as our Lutheran Volunteer Corps member. Malachi is a recent graduate of Xavier University in Cincinnati. He brings a variety of volunteer experiences from summer camp to congregational life, from serving in the military to tutoring children. I look forward to working with Malachi.

On Sunday, July 27, I said, "The world looks at what Jesus has done and is unimpressed. He has healed some people, but not millions of people. He has preached a couple of memorable sermons but even those are small in comparison to others. He has called people to join his movement, but frankly, none of them are very impressive.

"And Jesus tells them not to be discouraged. He tells his disciples not to look at God's work among them through the eyes of the world. What the world considers to be small and inconsequential, God sees through the eyes of love. God is doing a mighty work among us, but God's mighty work does not appear mighty in the world's eyes.

"I think about our church gathered here. There was a day when our church was bursting at the seams. Not anymore. We were not the biggest building in the community but clearly the building stood out as significant. There was a day in North America when a majority of the people were Christians. A large percentage of the people in town attended church. But not anymore.

"I think about you gathered here. By the world's standards, you are not the "movers and shakers" of this town. There are not many powerful and prominent ones among you. I think about the number of young people who have participated in the Kids at Work program. There are many churches who have youth programs that exceed out numbers by two or three times.

"But remember the parable of the mustard seed. From this tiny seed there grows a great plant. Now maybe the movement from a tiny seed to a large plant doesn't seem very impressive to hear. But maybe the parables are a way of getting us to look at things as God looks at things because, as we know, God's ways are not our ways.

And finally, I said, "Let us take heart! Let us respond to the Spirit of Christ alive in each of us. God does not expect us to be great, only to do little things with great love. God will provide the growth and from small things bring great blessings!"

May we continue to do small things with great love.

Dunklau Grant to Benefit Interfaith and Families in Action Participants

Interfaith Health Service (IHS) via Familias En Accion (FIA) is pleased to share the wonderful news that we were recently awarded a grant for \$10,000 from the Rupert Dunklau Foundation. This generous grant will be used to develop our programming in the areas of education, health and cultural exchange.

At IHS/FIA, we are growing to meet the changing needs of the South Omaha community by building trusting relationships within the community. IHS/FIA is well known for our collaborative, asset-based approach to programming, and we continually reach out to others interested in a lived experice of service to others within the context of mutual learning.

IHS will extend its scope and services with the assistance of the Dunklau Foundation by working with neighborhoods in the areas directly surrounding our home office at Grace Lutheran church, where a 25% and 44% poverty rate is documented (the New York Times, Mapping Poverty Website). It has long been shown that communities lacking in resources are the most at-risk. IHS will utilize funding from the Dunklau Foundation to meet the needs of the growing Latino Community and to provide a cultural exchange between our volunteers and participants. Specifically, IHS will access individuals who are relatively socially isolated and have few, if any, financial and practical resources necessary to access educational, physical activity, health and wellness programs. While providing opportunities for positive social interaction, programs will continue to track outcomes in the areas of improved education, wellness and self-esteem. Our unique outreach efforts consistently yield successes far beyond goals. This is due to the support of funders like the Dunklau Foundation and others, the motivated population of children and families we serve, and the high level of trust built up over the years by IHS, something very few other organizations have been able to achieve.

We are deeply grateful not only to Pastor Damon for his work and vision within our organization, but also to our participants and staff who are deeply comitted to our mission and community. We are also thankful for our many supporters, volunteers and all of our congregation members and partners who work with us and keep us close in prayer.
