The regular meeting of the Council was held on March 10th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We pray for Arlone's mother and sisterin-law with their ongoing health concerns, and for Raquel Concha, friend of Arlone & participating member of the ESL class as she has disappeared and there is still no contact. We pray for Bob Moss. We pray for Rick Johnson, husband of Janet's friend, and Georgia Church, Andrew's cousin as they are faced with cancer.

Pastor led devotions from Psalm 40:17 and Romans 5:5. The first reminds us that we are not alone, and help may come in various ways. The second tells us that hope is not shameful.

Visions for Ministry: The Council began discussion of their new book titled "A Door Set Open: Grounding Change in Mission and Hope" which bases its discussion in family systems theory, a practice in which Pastor is actively engaged. The introduction talks about the difficulty for people to change once they've developed a routine. Based upon the functionality of the emotional system, a person must be resilient enough to actively engage change; otherwise, change will be unlikely.

Committee Reports: Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

Christian Education: Early First Communion Classes began on March 8th with 3 attendees: Madison, Tommy, & Katelyn.

Will not need volunteers until the fall; however, may need volunteers in April to help read the questions on standardized tests to students. We will be exploring expanded use with Facebook to engage the younger generations in a deliberate way.

Finance: Pastor submitted the biennial report to the state. We received an update from Andrew Wilson regarding our mediation with Church Mutual. After an unsuccessful attempt at mediation, we will move forward with the lawsuit.

Property: Johnson Hardware had to reorder the crash bar for the front door and we are waiting to hear when it will be installed.

Service/Social Ministry: No new business.

Support/Stewardship: Pastor shared the 2014 ELCA report that was submitted electronically.

Worship: Maundy Thursday service will take place at St. Luke's and Good Friday service will take place at Grace. A potluck dinner may be served at St. Luke's prior to the Maundy Thursday service. The Council discussed and agreed to solely serve communion pilgrim style, no longer using the altar rail for any services.

I was reading an article written by George Bullard entitled "Creative destruction and disorienting missional engagement transform congregations." I found myself thinking deeply about the things he said. Let me share a bit of his article with you and invite you to think with me about what he says.

He writes, "Creative destruction and disorienting missional engagement are essential practices for congregations after the first generation of their journey. Focusing on these two things will positively impact the vitality and vibrancy of congregations.

"When the first generation of the journey of congregations comes to a close — after anywhere from 18 to 27 years since their founding — how do they get traction for their second, third, and following generations? After their first generation congregations either transform their journey, or doom their future by continual denial of the need to transform.

"New traction is needed because the founding dream or vision for the congregations crests and wanes. Accountable management is for the first time a stronger force than visionary leadership. The controlling aspects of management must be diminished so once again visionary leadership can soar with faith.

We are clearly past the first, second and even third generations of our journey. The questions that have been presented to me seem to mirror his question: how do we get traction for the following generations?

He then writes, "The challenge is whatever the situation of congregations at the end of their first generation, they have the potential – as it is within God's vision for them – to soar with faith." However, also writes that this effort will be difficult. He adds the following, "Difficult does not mean impossible or improbable. It simply means difficult."

It seems to me that he has clearly indicated the struggle that we find ourselves in as we seek to revision God's plan for discipleship at this time.

He then suggests seven essential practices. "First, congregations must diminish the controlling aspects of management and programs at the beginning of creative destruction. Management and programs tend to weigh down congregations, become part of their institutionalization, and need to be the focus of creative destruction to provide time, space, resources, and people power to engage in things that produce new vitality and vibrancy.

"Second, congregations must build a new spiritual foundation and a new depth of relationships with God, one another, and the context in which they serve. To unfreeze from where congregations are at rest or stuck requires a spiritual motivation that discovers what God might be up to in congregations.

"Third, congregations must focus on missional engagement that disorients the congregation. Risk-taking is important. Congregations must move outside their comfort zone and do things that are missional in nature that causes them to unlearn and relearn what it means to be the presence of Christ in their context.

"Fourth, reflect on the learnings and implications from the disorienting missional engagement. Dialogue about that which empowers mission within congregations and what inhibits mission. Commit to a clear path of missional engagement supported by appropriate spiritual formation.

"Fifth, engage in transitions and changes for the new journey. Cast away those programs and management factors that no longer fit and need creative destruction. Increase the investment in spiritual formation and missional engagement.

"Sixth, clarify and continually cast vision. Begin an ongoing dialogue as to the vision God has for congregations that emerges out of the action and reflection of new spiritual formation and missional engagement.

"Seventh, realign resources to live into that vision. As the journey begins to become clearer, make sure the measurement of the goodness and rightness of everything that is done is that it directly supports the fulfillment of the vision of God."

I pray God leads us in creative and missional ways for God's vision in this time and place.





Money MattersPersonal Financial Stewardship

Loving Money

God's Word warns us about the love of money: "People who want to get rich fall into temptation and a trap and into many foolish and harmful desires that plunge men into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil. Some people, eager for money, have wandered from the faith and pierced themselves with many griefs" (1Timothy 6:9-10). Jesus said, "You cannot serve both God and money" (Matthew 6:24).

How much we love money is not dependent upon the amount of money that we may have. We can love money and have very little love of it, or we can have lots of it and not love it at all. Loving money is very subtle, and it can manifest itself in different ways. For example for those who have accumulated

some money, it could be seen in an unhealthy obsession with the investment markets. It could be seen in our desire to hoard our money and not give. Power and success for those who focus on money is relative to how much money they have.

Because we live in a very materialistic society, there is a great deal of interest in money. Webster's Dictionary defines materialism as "the tendency to be more concerned with material

things than with spiritual goals or values." Materialism leads us to spend money we don't have in order to buy things we don't need so that we can impress people we don't even like. A materialistic person loves his possessions, is greedy, and lacks contentment.

The following are three negative consequences of both loving money and becoming part of our materialistic society:

Distorts our thinking: Our hearts become darkened. "For although they knew God, they neither glorified him as God nor gave thanks to him, but their thinking become futile and their foolish hearts were darkened" (Romans 1:22-23).

Stimulates our pride: We become self-sufficient rather than relying on God. "You may say to yourself, 'My power and strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me'" (Deuteronomy 8:17).

Preoccupies our thoughts: We have no time or concern for the needy or for God. "Their destiny is destruction, their god is their stomach, and their glory is in their shame. Their mind is on earthly things" (Philippians 3:19).

When we call upon God's strength, he will empower us to serve him rather than our money. As we spend time hearing and reading God's Word, he will strengthen our faith so we can break the power that money and possessions can have over us.


