The regular meeting of the Council was held on May 12th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: Robert Moss family during their time of grief in losing Bob, victims of the Nepal earthquakes, Barb Nelson who is hospitalized, Stephanie Bushman, Amanda's friend, who is in the hospital, Arlone's mother and sister-in-law who are battling health issues, and Andrew Edwards as he recovers from his surgery.

Pastor Laaker led devotions from Judges 6:13 and 1 Corinthians 13:12. The first asks a question that we have all been faced with at times and is as present now as it was then. The second tells us that, while our vision is dim now, our eyes will be opened and we will see clearer when we see God face-to-face.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: When the author addresses the emotional system he is not just talking about emotions, but the automatic human behaviors. Basically, people can respond reactively or responsively depending on the circumstances. Is the amygdala (the part of the brain that triggers anxiety) actually fully operative at birth? How does one manage the reactivity to take a more responsive approach so as to avoid disruption to the whole? A person cannot lead if they have the same level of anxiety as the group because then the ability to manage one's anxiety is absent.

Pastor's I ended my Pentecost sermon saying "the Spirit knows all of us and seeks to 'turn us on' to Christ, to give us faith by turning us from sin toward God that we might truly be God's witnesses in the world until Christ comes again." My sense is that God expects

the church to make a transforming difference in the world.

Commentators suggest immediately, a problem rears its ugly head. How can ordinary human beings carry the Holy Spirit of God without becoming audacious egotists or preposterous antagonists against other ordinary people who disagree with them? In all honesty, they can't avoid such human failing entirely. Not even the apostles were perfect, as the records of their debates among themselves show. The redeeming factor has always been the real presence of Christ with the Holy Spirit.

This distinctive experience and message of the church leaves many people grasping for explanations. According to the story in Acts 2:12-15, some found a solution by accusing the apostles of drunkenness. Peter replied that it was too early in the day. Some scholars have suggested that the reference to speaking in different tongues originally meant ecstatic utterances that would have given the appearance of drunkenness. Such explanations do not remove the problem the church has with its uniqueness. It is enough to remember such teachings as, "Love your enemies" and "Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth" to know the church has a mission fraught with difficulty, even for our own acceptance.

Yet, exactly such distinctiveness is the church's reason for being. It showed most clearly in the prophets. Among the latest of them in the Old Testament, Joel had foreseen a day when all God's people would prophesy (Acts 2:16-18). The hope had already been expressed by Moses, according to Numbers 11:29. While prophets demonstrate the special character of a church that lives by the Spirit, they do not relieve the tension in the church's earthly existence. Prophets were regularly in trouble, too.

The answer is not compromise with the world's evil, which the prophet dramatizes in cosmic terms (Acts 2:19-20). The last word is comforting, however. Acts 2:21 speaks of salvation. The reference to visions and dreams in connection with the prophets may remind us how courageous and effective a leader can be when he acts upon the declaration, "I have a dream." A church is the one community called to perpetuate the vision of a renewed and reunited humanity. God is depending upon the church to keep the world aware that the Spirit of the crucified and risen Christ is still at work for the good of the whole world.

We have heard many in the community call for a reuniting of humanity in the face of Officer Orozco's death. This is a truly admirable desire and something that would be good for the Omaha community. The power to accomplish this comes from the Holy Spirit as the Spirit shapes and re-forms our lives into Christ-like lives. Come, Holy Spirit, Come!



Spotlight on Ramona, Sewing Instructor, IHS/Families in Action and Small Business Owner, South Omaha

IHS/Families in Action is busy this summer with expansion in all of our programs! One of our expansion areas is offering additional sewing and micro-business classes based upon the requests and needs assessment data from our participants and community members.

High school students, in particular, noted they would like the opportunity to attend sewing and micro-business classes in the Summer and requested that we add sewing classes during their summer break from school. Thanks to funding from the William and Ruth Scott Family Foundation, we are able to respond to this request, and we remain grateful to the Foundation for supporting our programs.

Our classes are also made possible because of the dedication and talents of our sewing instructor, Ramona. Ramona was introduced to Families in Action seven years ago as a participant. She then began volunteering with programs in a leadership capacity. Following the Wells Fargo-based donation of several dozen high-end wedding dresses from a store that closed in Omaha, our participants expressed an interest in sewing and alterations. Ramona stepped forward, volunteering to teach sewing classes for Families in Action.

From the outset, Ramona amazed our students with her knowledge and abilities. Students have commented on her skills and speak highly of her knowledge and patience in the classroom. She can fix any sewing machine, any error in stitching. Her patience is limitless. She manages to give individual attention to each person in her classes, which can be a bit challenging when she is working with many students and a variety of sewing levels.

Ramona shares that because she studied sewing in elementary and high school and has always dreamed of teachng and working with sewing, her passion translates into the classroom. She also notes that she and her husband have 8 children, so she knows how to multi-task and how to problem solve, something that serves her well in the classroom.

Over years, Families in Action sewing and micro-business classes have grown to include students from all over South Omaha. Ramona has been instrumental in ensuring our success in reaching women who desire to learn, to create, and in some instances, to begin their own businesses as she has.

Ramona's work as an instructor with Families in Action gave her the support to open a small business in South Omaha, with an office complete with sewing machines, irons, fabric and materials where she designs dresses for birthday celebrations, weddings, and works with tailoring and alterations.

We are proud to partner with Ramona and look forward to the addtional sewing classes she will be teaching for IHS/Families in Action in the months ahead!


