The regular meeting of the Council was held on May 12th. Pastor's I was reading an article titled "CHURCHES THAT COME ALIVE" recently. The author maintains that "the Christian churches that are thriving in the United States are the churches that 1) are focusing on ministry and outreach through discipleship, and 2) are not waiting "for a pastor" to prod them into doing something." He further maintained, "If the congregation NEEDS to have a pastor constantly pushing them to become involved in the ministry of the Gospel of Christ... nothing is going to change. The church's organizational system is designed to WAIT for someone to make it happen!"

It appears to me, after 35+ years of ministry, that my engagement in the process of discerning the vision of God's call to ministry in this place and my ability to articulate and encourage peoples' engagement in God's ministry is vitally important. Vision casting is a cooperative activity. It involves listening, reflecting and experimentation. Together we discern the Spirit of God's direction for ministry. This can be a challenge because patterns and processes of the past become sacred and often limit creativity and openness to God doing something new.

I have found that becoming a disciple of Jesus is much more that simply adding my name to the membership list of a church. Becoming a disciple requires me to be actively engaged in conversation with the Bible and people that cross my daily path. I have to be willing to allow God to speak through all kinds of medium: Bible study, book studies, grief support groups, creativity groups who design liturgical art, dance, music, puppets, etc., to name a few. I also believe that it is important to give people permission to act on their sense of God's call to engage ministry.

As I think about the ministry of Grace, now into its one hundred and twenty sixth year, I think it is important to know at least the general history of the congregation. It began as a suburban congregation and has become an urban congregation. Its participants have been primarily persons who have had access to resources and capable of self-determination. The neighborhood was originally pretty homogenous and today has become quite diverse.

It is abundantly clear that a shift in the relationship between church and culture has occurred. That shift as church consultant, Anthony Robinson observed has left many "dis-spirited, bewildered, paddling-as-fast-as-we-can." The day of simply opening the doors and people will come flooding in is over. What we often forget in the midst of this shift is that it is not about us as church. It is about the fact that the culture used to carry the traditions, symbols, and rituals of the Christian faith. Now, the culture has ceased to carry the faith.

So what does this mean? It means that we have to be on the lookout for what God is birthing among us. Each of us has to be engaged in the discernment process. Each of us has to be engaged in living out our baptismal vocation as a child of God. We do not have to wait for someone to tell us what to do, we need to individually act on God's call to us to represent God's love toward all in our homes, in our work and in our community.

Do we still need the church? Yes, because it is in the church that we come alive with encouragement for the daily tasks that God calls us to perform. It is in the church that we gather around the table to receive the ongoing power of the Spirit as we share the Lord's Supper, doing it in remembrance of Christ. It is in the body of fellowship that we are nurtured with the stories of the ways we have seen God's presence active and alive among us.

So, let's be alive in Christ, discerning God's call, looking for and seeing God's presence active around us, being willing to act on God's call to each of us and engaging the fellowship for strength and courage.

Pack plenty of local, in-season fruits and vegetables and meat for you and your guests. Remember, fresh fruit "wraps" itself - no additional packaging needed! Check out the farmer's market for some local favorites!

It was Mama Bear who woke up everyone in the house. It was Mama Bear who made the coffee. It was Mama Bear who unloaded the dishwasher from last night and put everything away. It was Mama Bear who went out in the cool early morning air to fetch the newspaper. It was Mama Bear who set the table. It was Mama Bear who put the cat out, cleaned the litter bos, and filled the cat's water

and food dish, and, now that you've decided to drag your sleepy selves downstairs and grace Mama Bear's kitchen with your grumpy presence, listen good, 'cause I'm only going to say this one more time - I haven't made the porridge yet!"

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Ten Independence Day Trivia About the Bald Eagle:

- * Benjamin Franklin, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson served on the committee that picked the eagle for the national seal (Franklin wanted the turkey).
- * Bald eagles have few natural enemies and live only in North America.
- * Bald eagles get their white head and tail feathers when they are about 4 to 5 years of age.
- * Bald eagles are not, and never were bald. The term comes from when "bald" meant "white-headed".
- * Their maximum speed: 40 mph or over 100 mph while in a dive.
- * They can lift roughly half their body weight.
- * The Bald Eagle is no longer considered endangered, and now only threatened.
- * The only other kind of eagle in North America is the golden eagle.
- * Bald eagles mate for life, but if one dies, the survivor will eventually accept a new mate.
- * It is a felony to shoot an eagle.

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Nicholas took his four-year-old son, Bryan to several baseball games where "The Star-Spangled Banner" was sung before the start of each game.

Later, Nicholas and Bryan attended St. Bartholomew's church on the Sunday before Independence Day. The congregation sang "The Star-Spangled Banner" and after everyone sat down, Bryan suddenly yelled out at the top of his voice, "Play ball."



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
