The regular meeting of the Council was held on July 14th. Andrew's sister-in-law Linda as she mourns the loss of her mother, Arlone's mom, Norma Courtney, and sister-in-law Teresa Courtney with ongoing health issues.

Pastor Laaker led devotions from 1 Samuel 17:37 and Philippians 4:7. The first tells us to go and let God guide you. The second tells us that God's presence in our lives brings peace to our hearts and minds.

Visions for Ministry: People struggle with change so much that they often don't look outside of their comfort zone and resist change for fear of losing that comfort. How can we work to open our eyes and minds to the changes taking place around us? Can we be aware of the changes taking place and how that change affects relationships, so as to bring hope to people's lives? How does change impact your emotional response? Size of the church does not equate to the impact a church can make. Small congregations do amazing things every day. Pastor's The headline on a recent Huffington Post page read, "American Christianity Has Been Hijacked." Post National Youth Gathering in Detroit.

He wrote: "Visualize 30,000 young people singing worship songs, dancing in the aisles, and praising Jesus. Might sound like something from an Evangelical or Pentecostal church. Yet these youth filling Detroit's Ford Field were not from a charismatic tradition, but from a denomination more known for pipe organs, vestments, and hot dish casseroles filled with tater tots: the Lutherans.

"Wearing bright neon shirts representing every color of the rainbow, these youth came together this past week for the triennial ELCA National Youth Gathering. With them they brought a wave of hopefulness too strong to avoid. As a volunteer at the event, I couldn't seem to go anywhere without encountering this zeal. Every walk through downtown or along Detroit's riverfront greeted me with a multitude of teenagers raising their hands for a high-five or cheering in elation.

"Even beyond the event's participants, local residents expressed a similar jubilee:

"Thank you for coming to Detroit!" passersby would smile and shout on the streets outside the General Motors Renaissance Center.

"We are so happy you're here sharing Jesus!" waiters would smile as we entered Greektown's popular restaurants.

"And from downtown's convention center to suburban hotels, employees, cops and panhandlers would raise their hand in the air, catching the infectious high-five trend, and say, "You are bringing so much joy to this city!"

"As I witnessed this enthusiasm, I was overcome with a pride for the universal church that I, unfortunately, haven't recently felt. In fact, the last time my eyes welled up with this bliss was while working at a church camp. As I examined the differences between normal life and what I experienced at both the camp and this Gathering, I found one key difference:

"Positivity.

"Outside these exceptions, American Christianity seems to have been hijacked by negativity. A quick search of recent news proves this, as a faith meant to be characterized by its "good news" has become known not by what it's for, but by what it's against. Christians in America are now best recognized by their feigned religious persecution, anti-Muslim sentiments, or their unwillingness to bake a cake for a same-sex wedding.

"Such actions bring to mind the words of one of my mentors, a resident of America's Bible Belt, who often says, "I'm for any religion that doesn't hurt people."

"Why has American Christianity become known for the pain it causes?

"To paraphrase a delegate at a recent church convention that hotly debated the allowance of openly LGBT pastors, "Why isn't our church this passionate about poverty?"

"Why aren't we known as the faith that seeks to feed the hungry, shelter the needy, and comfort the sick?

"Why aren't we investing our resources in activities that cause people to say, "You are bringing so much joy!"?

"Let American Christianity stop being known as a religion that hurts, as a faith focused on what we're against, and instead let them know we are Christians by our love. By the same love that radiated from 30,000 youth in Detroit."

I find I can relate to the author's call for more positivity in the people of the church. Without a doubt there are many things that cause me great pain, however, as a people who are called to embody Christ, we could do with a real infusion of positivity. How might we, the people of God, be known as bearers of hopefulness in our corner of God's world?

Summer

Consider the story of two stonemasons. You walk up to the first stonemason and ask, "Do you like your job?" He looks up at you and replies, "I've been building this wall for as long as I can remember. The work is monotonous. I work in the scorching hot sun

all day. The stones are heavy and lifting them day after day can be backbreaking. I'm not even sure if this project will be completed in my lifetime. But it's a job. It pays the bills." You thank him for his time and walk on.

About thirty feet away, you walk up to a second stonemason. You ask him the same question, "Do you like your job?" He looks up and replies, "I love my job. I'm building a cathedral. Sure, I've been working on this wall for as long as I can remember, and yes, the work is sometimes monotonous. I work in the scorching hot sun all day. The stones are heavy and lifting them day after day can be backbreaking. I'm not even sure if this project will be completed in my lifetime. But I'm building a cathedral."

WHAT these two stonemasons are doing is exactly the same; the difference is, one has a sense of purpose. He feels like he belongs. He comes to work to be a part of something bigger than the job he's doing. Simply having a sense of WHY changes his entire view of his job.

Just a single pair of jeans made from conventional cotton, amounts to 2/3 pound of fertilizer and pesticides. Fortunately, a lot of well-known brands are using organic cotton and non-toxic dyes in their denim collections. Check out Levi's, Patagonia, Edun's and Eileen Fisher for some eco-chic options.

Keep it simple. The average woman owns eight pairs of jeans. Now, we love jeans just as much as you do, but do we really need **eight pairs** in our closets? A good rule of thumb when buying jeans is to search for quality over quantity, and classic styles. High-quality basics will last longer, have more versatility and reduce your overall impact.

Launder responsibly. Since washing your jeans too often can do a number on the fabric, most manufacturers recommend that you only wash them when you absolutely must. Keep your jeans looking sharp by turning them inside out, washing them in cold water, and try a chemical-free detergent.

Hang them out to dry. Line drying saves a lot of energy and helps to preserve fabrics by sparing them the heat of the dryer.

This does not give us the opportunity to take a break, vacation from God's Work, or feel we have "done enough". There is always much work to be done. We do not have to take on every challenge or the biggest issues, but we should evaluate our current position and challenge ourselves to take the next step forward.

As the upcoming school year approaches, we have an opportunity to build our community relationship with Liberty Elementary. We will be launching our Growing with Grace Book Reading Program, as we go into the second grade classrooms and read once a month and distribute the books we read to the students. We will engage the students with an activity related to the stories we read them. Our purpose is to encourage recreational reading as a fun and educational activity. We also seek to build relationship through service to the school and the neighborhood.

Work willingly at whatever you do, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people.

We are asking for volunteer readers who are able to dedicate at least an hour to read and engage the students. More information will be made available in the upcoming weeks, but please reach out to me if you have the desire and any availability midday during the work week. Prayerfully, we hope to be a beacon of God's light in this school and possibly more neighborhood schools in the future. Something I was once told: "God blesses us so that we might be a blessing for others. What we are given is not for us alone, but for others so that they may know the God we serve." I firmly believe we have been blessed in this place and the space God has planted us in here in the community. I am truly blessed to be able to work and serve alongside this church. I am thankful for what small bit I have been able to contribute and I am excited about the work yet to come. A fitting piece of closure to this message as we have just finished a segment on love in the New Testament and how it connects to our contemporary lives is that love challenges us to do what we may not naturally wish or desire to do. It is easier to mimic good action, but it is more loving to challenge our inward intentions and align ourselves beyond just our own personal will and desires. Let's continue to walk and grow in grace as God continues to bless and strengthen us.

Memories of 'hard times'

People who lived through the Great Depression of the 1930s and the World War of the 1940s will remember when...

- Candy bars cost a nickel, comic books cost 10 cents, paperback books were 25 cents, and popcorn at movies cost 15 cents.
- There was no McDonalds.
