The regular meeting of the Council was held on July 14th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns: We ask for prayers for returning students, Suzie Heldt & Lindsey Zach and their family as Suzie has been hospitalized with 3 blood clots in her lungs and pneumonia along with having terminal cancer, Bobbi Jo's mother in law, Mrs. Pankaj, as she just had brain surgery and

cancer, Bobbi Jo's mother in law, Mrs. Pankaj, as she just had brain surgery and discovered multiple other tumors, Arlone's mom, Norma Courtney and sister-inlaw, Teresa Courtney, and uncle Melvin Obst with ongoing health issues, Eva's sister's husband Chet Mace and family. We offer a prayer of thanks for the Lord answering one of Ron's prayers. We pray for peace in Ferguson and throughout the country in response to the recent protests.

Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses in the "Daily *Texts*" from Deuteronomy 4:10 and Acts 11:23. The first tells us that God wanted the people to overhear his conversation with Moses so that they would learn to be faithful followers. The second tells us that Barnabas experienced something good and, rejoicing in God's grace, went on to spread the good news.

#### **Visions for Ministry**

This chapter talks about "mission" and what that means for the church and the people. Often people forget or lose sight of the mission, and simply go through the motions. The author illustrates the importance of not resorting to "survival mode" if numbers are declining; rather, we should use that change as an opportunity to look at who we are and what we want to do in light of it. We are also faced with seeking a transformation within oneself, which in turn translates into transformation of those around that person. People shouldn't expect a transformation in others if they are not experiencing it in themselves. If we ask the question "who are we?" - there are many ways to answer it. It's ok to not know specifically, but to continue asking the question and working to spread God's love to the world. Read chapter 6 for next month.

<u>Christian Education</u>: Janet has volunteered to pull a committee together to discuss some new ideas for opportunities throughout the year.

<u>Evangelism/Outreach</u>: Liberty Reading program will be underway. A handful of people have volunteered to be a part of that program. Next Monday, the Halloween Committee will meet to discuss dates for planning the Halloween Party scheduled for Friday, October 30th.

God's Work Our Hands day is on September 13th. Thrivent has project money available simply by going to your Thrivent account and indicating your plans. Individuals can get up to \$250. Amanda suggested doing something for teachers at Liberty Elementary. We could pass around a wish list or do an appreciation gift for each teacher. Amanda will look into different ideas. We should login to Thrivent and fill out the request so we can start collecting the funds.

<u>Finance</u>: Motion was made to ratify Disney Endowment distributions from June and the motion carried. We still have about \$4,000 left from Jack's estate that will be distributed at the next Endowment Board meeting.

<u>Property</u>: After the judge ordered us to go back to mediation, our attorney spoke with Church Mutual's attorney, and they agreed to pay us \$100,000 to settle the dispute. \$17,126.55 has been spent through July 2015 on attorney fees throughout this whole process. Pastor will sign the agreement tomorrow.

Service/Social Ministry: None. Support/Stewardship: None.

<u>Worship</u>: The KC baseball trip that was planned in conjunction with St. Luke's for Sunday, August 16 has been moved to September 6. We will have a combined service at 8am at St. Luke's, no service at Grace, so Pastor can go on the trip, too. Flowers will have to be cancelled for that Sunday.

Grace will be joining St. Luke's for a special service scheduled for Sunday September 27th on the River City Star at 10 am. A potluck will follow at St. Luke's. (So there will not be another service at either church that morning).

#### Unfinished Business: None.

<u>New Business</u>: Brenda wanted the Council's opinion on a different calendar option. The group preferred the calendar's we have had in past years. Pastor spoke with the Campus Pastor in Omaha and learned of their new approach: encouraging students to stay worshiping with their own congregations but offering more peer group/small group opportunities for students.

Announcements: Amanda will bring treats for September.

Adjournment: The Council meeting closed in prayer and adjourned at 9:01 p.m.

Pastor's The Church Council and I have been reading "A Door Set Open" by Peter L. Steinke. Each chapter has provided excellent material for thought and conversation. The most recent chapter was titled "The Making of a Mission Culture." He begins the

chapter by saying that individuals are best served if they have direction for their life. He shortly thereafter says this same thing regarding groups and organizations.

Dr. Steinke goes on to state that he is often called in to work with congregations embroiled in conflict or paralyzed by passivity. One of his first questions is: Does this congregation have a clear sense of its mission?

As we talked at our council meeting, we came to the conclusion that for Grace we have a fairly clear sense of mission. We share God's Word and God's Love in care and service to all. We talked about a variety of ways this mission is validated through the ministries offered.

Church historian Diana Butler Bass in "Christianity for the Rest of Us" indicates that congregations ought to examine their self-understanding as people of God by asking themselves, Who are we? What is God calling us to be?

It seems clear to me that the people of Grace are persons for whom their baptismal vocations are marked with a warmth and love that is noticed by others. I have people say to me, "There is something special about this place. I can just feel it."

I have observed the welcome that is more than a handshake on Sunday morning. I see intentional efforts to sit and visit with persons who are new to this community of faith. I see efforts of invitation and inclusion of persons who might otherwise be over looked.

I marvel at the generosity that is displayed through financial gifts that support the ministry and support the efforts beyond our doors. The gifts for World Hunger, Food Bank Backpack program, CROP Walk sponsorships and the estate gifts that have made it possible to share love beyond our wildest imagination.

God is not calling us to be the biggest ministry in the city of Omaha. God is calling Grace and its people to live out their baptismal calling by sharing God's Word of Love in creative and genuine ways. Let's see how God continues to unfold this ministry in our midst.

#### **Fall Planting Pointers**



Though many people gear up to work on their yards and gardens in the spring, fall is actually an ideal time for yard work. Here are a few ideas for bringing your garding to life in the fall:

**Compost the leaves.** Falling leaves are beautiful to look at but may seem like an inconvenience when planning your garden. Instead of bagging the leaves and leaving them out with the trash, consider collecting them and composting them to create nutrient-rich, organic soil that will be ready for use by the spring.

**Fertilize organically.** When preparing yiour soil for next year, add organic, slow-release fertilizers that will help enhance your soil over time. These fertilizers are made of natural materials, contain vital nutrients to help your plants grow, and prevent plants from getting nitrogen. Most garden stores today carry a wide variety of organic fertilizers; many catalog companies also sell organic products.

**Plant trees.** By the time autumn rolls around, summer heat waves are long past, rainfall is usually more plentiful, and new trees, bushes and flowers have a greater chance of surviving than they would if they were planted during a hotter season. Choose species native to your area as well as those that are drought and pest resistant and can grown in the kind of soil and amount of sunlight available on your property.

**Other ideas.** If you have a vegetable or fruit garden that you want to maintain throughout the winter, consider planting root bulbs and leafcrops that will continue to produce despite the colder weather. This will work in many regions of the country, but some places might still be too cold. Building a greenhouse or a hot bed to cultivate your veggies could keep the fresh food coming throughout the winter!

Nícolas ís a Kíds At Work Alumní and would welcome all from Grace to help celebrate this special day with his family. Below is a portion of the letter Grace recently received from Grace Lutheran Church in New Orleans, LA:

Dear Christian Friends:

August 29, 2005 was a dreadful day in the life of Grace. Katrina had passed through around 6 am that morning and we felt we had avoided catastrophe. How wrong we were! The 17th Street canal is less than one mile from our church and drains a significant portion of the area into Lake Pontchartrain. Around 2 pm, the flood wall on the near side of this canal gave way.

Our beloved church was inundated with eight feet of water, and everything on the ground floor was destroyed. While we had insurance, the total of all damages left us a million dollars short.

Almost immediately, the generosity of our many fellow believers in Christ began pouring in. Your generous gifts were among them. So much came in that our million dollar shortfall was erased. An internal campaign generated another \$100,000 to refurbish our organ. Only God can perform miracles like that.
