The regular meeting of the Council was held on November 10th. Devotions: Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses in the "Daily Texts" from Jonah 2:6 and John 3:8. The first reminds us that God will lead us through the difficult times when we are lost. The second tells us that God gave the world Jesus to save us from our sinful nature.

Visions for Ministry: The author provided an interesting perspective using an analogy of an elephant, and depending on what part of the elephant a person touches, their description and experience would be very different from others. This can easily be applied to everyday life and the life of the congregation. It is important to step back and view situations from a broader vantage point to truly see the whole picture-or as much as can be seen from a human perspective. Are you ready? Do you have what you need? Such vague questions can leave a person wondering what particularly is the focus. This is similar to the vague future that is about to unfold. It's hard to say what will happen and what is on the horizon, yet we must find ways to prepare ourselves and make plans.

Change is coming; in fact, it's already here. It's inescapable and unavoidable. It's easy, presumably natural even, to continue in the same patterns, habits, and thought processes we always have. Perhaps, there is too much of a need for security (or perhaps to much fear) to act boldly and proactively when we have reasonable cause to do so.

Jesus knew the signs and warnings of upcoming danger. He had the perfect view of what was to come. He wanted the disciples to be ready when danger arose. He showed them how to face adversity head on and be confident. Fear paralyzes and keeps us from acting boldly and confidently in God. Just as Jesus knew of the dangers to come yet still acted confidently, we too can follow this model. We cannot allow fear to dictate our inability to be vigilant and ready when bad things happen. We cannot allow fear to hinder us from living in love and acceptance of our responsibility to help those in need.

The power of love cannot be overstated. When we challenge ourselves to face our fears and act out in love for another, we unleash limitless potential to have lasting change in the world. We must be prepared to take this step though. We must guard our minds against inaccuracies we hear. We must understand the nature that fear plays in undermining our ability to live at the highest levels of human dignity. We must take hold of the reality that while the dangers in life are real, the power to overcome dangers lies within us. Light can only overcome darkness when it is placed in it, not from a distance. Are you ready to be placed in the darkness so you can light the way for someone else? What will you do to be that light? This is our Christian charge. Be blessed and be a blessing to others.





It's Cold Outside!

As the seasons change and your family migrates indoors for the winter, a lot of energy can be wasted to keep your home comfortable. Between 40 and 70% of all home energy is wasted, but we could save about half of that by

buying efficient appliances and taking energy-saving measures.

Here are some inexpensive solutions to consider:

Cover your air conditioner: If you cannot remove your window unit, consider covering it both inside and out. Besides protecting your air-conditionin unit, these covers also keep cold air from entering your home through the space around the air-conditioner and can be a great way to lower utility bills.

Caulk It: Small spaces and gaps around windows and pipes and wires entering the home create energy wasting drafts that can cut the efficiency of your heating system. Most caulking products cost under \$10.00; rope caulk, one of the easiest types to apply, sells for about \$4.00 for 40 or 50 feet.

Block drafts: Draft blockers are foam plates that fit behind light switches and electrical outlets to reduce drafts that enter through those spaces. You can get a packet of 10 for about \$3.00 and they are easy to install with just a screwdriver.


Install heat reflectors: These are thin sheets that fit behind radiators, to reflect heat away from the wall and back into the room.

Perform regular maintenance: If you have a forced air furnace, make sure to clean or change the furnace filter about once a month. Most furnaces will need to be professionally cleaned and tuned once a year.

Reflective Window Film: Place these thin, plastic sheets directly on the inside of window panes and glass doors. The film reflects inside heat back into your home, reducing the amount that is conducted outside through windows. The film costs about \$10.00 a window and is easy to put on - it adheres to the window directly, or with the help of water from a spray bottle.

Weatherstripping: Create a tight seal around all your windows to reduce heated air from escaping outside. Weatherstrips fit around window and door frames with a self-adhesive backing.

Eleven pipers piping stand for the Eleven faithful disciples.


Twelve drummers drumming symbolize the twelve statements of belief in the Apostles' Creed.
