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
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

The regular meeting of the Council was held on June 14th. The Council shared their prayer concerns for family members, friends, neighbors and victims of recent mass shootings.

<u>Devotions</u>: Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker reading the selected verses in the "*Daily Texts*" from Psalm 37:5 and Romans 5:2. The first tells us to commit our lives to God and trust in him. The second explains that we are worthy of God's grace because of Jesus and we should boast in the hope of sharing God's glory.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: An important piece to understand from the Empowerment Test is that it doesn't measure what is within you but what comes out from you. The author breaks down the traits and talks about how we apply those within the combination of leadership and empowerment. Through this assessment, we learn more about how we approach issues and individuals through our leadership and empowerment strengths and weaknesses. Some of our growth or lack thereof may be adjusted through our attitude.

We will read pages 67-74 and review the previous 2 sections (51-66) to discuss next month.

<u>Committee Reports</u>: Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

<u>Christian Education</u>: Our one-day Vacation Bible School program Raindrops to Rainbows is scheduled for Saturday, June 25th from 12-5pm with a barbecue following for which families are invited. We have received a Thrivent Action Funds request of \$250 to help with the cost.

<u>Evangelism/Outreach</u>: The Kids at Work program has begun and there are 5 kids this year. The first checks have been distributed. Malachi has planned the first movie night for kids on Friday, June 17th at 7:30pm. Popcorn will be provided and the movie will be the Little Rascals.

<u>Finance</u>: The Lutheran Planned Giving Services presentation took place this past Sunday at St. Luke's and was very informative. Endowment Board met and submitted its report. Motion was made, seconded, and passed to ratify the distribution from the Disney Endowment Fund.

**Property**: Tree stump out front has been ground up.

The Endowment Board approved our request to move forward with replacing the carpet in the sanctuary. NFM has been contacted and will likely schedule the job in July.

Pastor provided 2 options for new directional signage to replace the existing weathered signs. Motion was made, seconded, and passed to use memorial funds to purchase 4 new signs.

Pastor will have a phone meeting with a roofer to have the valleys on the tower replaced.

Dan Dolezal has looked at the mortar issues on the alley side of the church and will be out tomorrow to look at deteriorating mortar in the bricks on the southwest corner of the church. Both issues will hopefully be resolved soon.

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Everyone have a save 4th of July





This month has brought us great sadness. On Sunday, June 12, we learned of the massive loss of life in Orlando, Florida. Two days later, a two-year-old boy, on vacation in Orlando, is killed by an alligator. These losses are on top of the daily news of the shootings and daily loss of life in other

accidents. I also received a reminder from Presiding Bishop Eaton that this is the one-year anniversary of the shooting that killed nine persons in Mother Emmanuel Church in Charleston.

My heart breaks as I hear of these losses. We mourn for those whose lives have been cut short. We lament the actions of persons who randomly kill or plan such massive murders. We long for efforts that would bring about peace.

Timothy Merrill, the Executive Editor for Homiletics, wrote these words to clergy this past week: As a country, we cannot agree on what it will take to achieve peace among us and to keep innocent people from dying. Social media is blowing up with people arguing about how to prevent the carnage that has become so commonplace throughout America.

We may be divided on what makes for peace. Some will argue that if more people had been armed, the slaughter could have been halted early on. Others will argue that no private citizen should be allowed to possess an automatic assault rifle. Church members will have differing views on gun control, help for the mentally ill and whether Islam is inherently a radical religion.

Don't even think of wading into those waters. But here's what you can do: You can search for what unites every one of us.

# WE CAN AGREE, CAN WE NOT ...

- \* that violence as a means of venting frustration is wrong.
- \* that verbal violence sets a bad example.
- \* that incivility and lack of respect for people different from ourselves -whether because of political affiliation, sexual orientation, ethnicity, gender, religion, handicap -- often leads to abuse.
- \* that posting and reposting an *ad hominem* attack on a political candidate is hurtful.
- \* that hate is a negative and harmful emotion.
- \* that we can live as people of peace, renouncing verbal and physical violence.

- \* that proactively initiating an act of kindness to someone who's radically different from us will bless both the giver and the receiver.
- \* that Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said, 'You shall love your neighbor and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:43-45a, NRSV).

### CAN WE ALSO AGREE ...

- \* to stop posting or uttering hateful, demeaning things, things that ridicule, that belittle -- even if the object of ridicule is Trump or Hillary?
- \* to monitor our conversations so only gracious, kind words come out of our mouths?
- \* to let God be the judge of other people and stop presuming we know the mind and heart of God?
- \* to work together with people who may hold opinions and positions quite different from our own?
- \* that at times it might be necessary to compromise for the greater good?
- \* that the world, that earthly life, will never perfectly fit into our vision of the "peaceable" kingdom?
- \* that our congregation should seek creative ways to assist victims of hatred or abuse, or participate with and support those who help these victims?

It's heart-wrenching to see people weeping over the loss of their loved ones ...

But look into Jesus' face for a moment. Imagine that face. See him with his head in his hands. See the tears dropping into the dust of the road. The Savior weeps. We weep.

In some way -- great or small -- let us agree to change. Let's be the change we need in this country. Let's stop doing whatever might be hurtful and start doing whatever might be healing.

### Let's do it now.

I agree that there are things to do and things to not do. I would hope that we might be motivated to do as much as we can to address the issues of justice that must be addressed for the well being of all.

We are through half a year of 2016. What have we learned so far? What struggles have we faced? Have things turned out exactly as we have expected? I could not have imagined the year as it has unfolded. Not for lack of creativity or imagination, but simply because so much is

unknown. There isn't enough planning, strategy, or information that could inform me enough to know. I have learned a few things throughout the year and during my time in the outreach ministry.

For starters, outreach can be difficult. Outreach takes place in many forms, but essentially creates the opportunity to achieve improvement, progress, or build relationship within a community. Acts of outreach do not guarantee any successful outcome, however, and often lead to less than desired results. Outcomes are unpredictable, varied, and rely on many factors outside of individual or organization effort. Planning must be tactical, multi-faceted, and be reasonable given the conditions presented. Limitations often hinder the most desired outcomes, and one must steady himself or herself for any range of end results. Outreach IS difficult.

Outreach requires an all-in attitude. Passion typically fires a person up to want or will to be a part of something greater than himself or herself. The reality is this is not enough. Passions can be snuffed out by personal hardships, lack of resources, the inability to envision past challenges of the objectives that lie ahead, and counterintuitive plans.

People must be willing to sacrifice before and during challenging times in order to persevere. Time, talents, and treasures are often spoken about as the sacrifices we can or should make in ministry of outreach. Yet sometimes, the best sacrifice comes by way of our expectations. We cannot hold too tightly to expectations of greatness or failure. These can cloud perspective and the ability to rightly discern when important decisions need to be made. Being overly afraid of possible outcomes can be just as damaging as exceedingly high expectations which become the reasoning for throwing excessive resources at a project or ministry goal without sound rationale. Outreach requires all of us, not the efforts of a few.

Outreach is everyone's responsibility. Outreach objectively is reaching out. Reaching out to those in need; stretching beyond the boundaries, expectations, norms, and conditions. We typically think of outreach from the faith perspective. Certainly there is a great calling for us as Christians to advocate for the poor, lift up others through love who are struggling in suffering, and be an active voice against injustices. Everyone has a part to play in the role of outreach though. Anyone can be that agent of positive change and social justice. We are not called to love simply as Christians. We are called to love as human beings. Anyone can be an ambassador of outreach; some of us are simply paid to be one.



Nebraska Death Penalty Initiative

The Nebraska Synod in Assembly adopted the following resolution:

RESOLVED, That, prior to the Nebraska Death Penalty Initiative on November 8, 2016, called and lay leaders of the Nebraska Synod, will make the ELCA Social Statement on the Death Penalty readily available in their congregations and encourage prayerful study and opportunities for discussion; and

RESOLVED, That, church members are called upon to give the Social Statement on the Death Penalty serious consideration as they form their own judgments on eliminating the death penalty in Nebraska.

As most of you are aware, the Nebraska Legislature in 2015 adopted LB 268, which repealed the death penalty in Nebraska. The ballot measure this fall will include the petition effort to reinstate the death penalty.

The ELCA social statement on "The Death Penalty" expresses ELCA opposition to the use of the death penalty because of the church's ministry with and to people affected by violent crime, even while recognizing that God entrusts the state with the power to take human life when failure to do so constitutes a clear danger to society.

The statement acknowledges the existence of different points of view within the church and society and the need for continued deliberation, but objects to the use of the death penalty because it is not used fairly and has failed to make society safer. Its practice undermines any possible alternate moral message since "the message conveyed by an execution, reflected in the attention it receives from the public, is one of brutality and violence."

You can read or download the full social statement on "The Death Penalty" in English or en español. The statement was adopted in 1991 by the ELCA Churchwide Assembly.

# Keeping Cool... and Green



While good ol' ventilation is still the most environmentally-friendly and cost effective way to cool your home, not everyone is lucky enough to have lots of strategically placed windows to catch the least bit of cross breeze.

Two-thirds of all homes in the United States have air conditioners. Air conditioners use about 5% of all the electricity produced in the United States, at an annual cost of more than \$11 billion to homeowners. So when the weather warms up we should do everything we can to conserve energy as we keep cool. That means treating our air conditioners the same way we treat other energy-demanding appliances: by using them wisely and keeping them running efficiently. Here are some tips to help:

**Invest in an energy-efficient air conditioner.** If you are buying a new airconditioner, choose one for maximum energy efficiency. New air conditioners come labeled with an Energy Efficiency Rating (EER), a standard that lets you calculate how much electricity the A/C will consume. The higher the EER, the less it will cost you to operate the appliance to achieve the same level of cooling.

**Avoid overcooling.** Don't use or buy more cooling equipment capacity than you actually need. If you decide on central air conditioning, select the most energy-efficient unit that will cool the size space you have. Bigger is not better. A larger unit than you need will cost more to run and may not remove enough humidity from the air, the feature that some consumers like most about air conditioners.

**Keep your cooling system well tuned.** Have it professionally maintained, and ask how the energy efficiency of the system may be increased. Remember to replace the air filter regularly.

**Install a whole-house ventilating fan.** This can be put in your attic or in an upstairs window to cool the house, even if you have central air conditioning. According to Consumer Reports, a big fan working under the right conditions can cool and ventilate an entire house for about the energy cost of running an air conditioner in one room.

**Set your thermostate as high as possible.** 78 degrees Farenheit is often recommended as a reasonably comfortable and energy-efficient indoor temperature.

**Draw the blinds.** Reduce the need for the A/C by keeping shades drawn, especially on south-facing windows.

**Program the thermostat.** Set the termostat higher during the day when no one is in your house or apartment.

Hands that hold a Bible and clap at news of answered prayer or dial a lonely soul and write the consolation note.


Hands that touch the organ keys or hold the music score, that pour the punch and coffee or wash the dishes up.
