You may recall a story in the Bible in which Jesus heals ten lepers. At the close of the story, the lone Samaritan returns and gives thanks. Jesus response is "Was there no one to return and give thanks to God except this foreigner?" (Luke 17:18). R.W. Greene shared this story: A legend tells about a servant whose master died, leaving

the servant a bag of blessings, full to the brim. "The bag will always be full," said the master, "so long as you remember the four magic words." As the servant started off on his merry way, he partook of the blessings in the bag until finally the bag was almost empty. He then sought desperately to remember the words, but he could not.

He asked a wise man nearby what the four words were. He was told, "Perhaps the words are 'I wish I had." So, with his nearly empty bag, he ran down the road shouting, "I wish I had! I wish I had! I wish I had as much as all my neighbors have of the blessings of health and wealth and such!" But still the bag held no more blessings.

Further along the way, he asked another person, "Can you please tell me what the magic words are that will restore blessings to the bag?" This person said, "Perhaps the words are, 'Give me some more!" So, again, he went on his way, shouting to the skies, "Give me some more! Give me some more! Oh fill my bag of blessings as full as it was before!" Still the bag remained empty.

Lonely and dejected and unhappy, he sat down by the side of the road to take the last piece of bread from the bag. As he started to eat it, a beggar came along and pleaded for the bread. He gave it, forgetting his own hunger, and watched in wonder as the beggar looked heavenward and said, "I thank Thee, Lord!" Whereupon, the servant jumped for joy, higher than he had ever jumped before, and ran down the road shouting, "I thank Thee, Lord! I thank Thee, Lord!" And the bag of blessings was full once more.

There is much for which we can be thankful. We will soon gather around tables for the celebration of Thanksgiving. Let us give thanks for our families and friends, for elections and electricity, for sunshine and showers, for pumpkins and pickles, for debates and rebates, for turkeys and tea, and for homes and homecomings.



Death Penalty Referendum

In the last month, there have been several headlines that have captured the attention of Nebraskans. One had to do with the cost of keeping the Death Penalty in Nebraska. Another had to do with the language on the ballot. There were other headlines, too.

In 2015, the Nebraska Legislature voted to end the death penalty in Nebraska. The vote to end the death penalty was supported by 16 Republicans, 13 Democrats and 1 Independent. Following this vote, a ballot measure was put underway to restore the death penalty and was successful in putting this on this November's ballot.

I wrote earlier that the ELCA adopted a Social Statement in 1991 specifically on "The Death Penalty." In the Social Statement is says, "We begin by assuming that government plays a God-given, protective role. "God entrusts the state with power to take human life when failure to do so constitutes a clear danger to society" (p. 2). This view is qualified, though: "[T]his does not mean that governments have an unlimited right to take life" or "must punish crime by death" (p. 2). The text quickly questions whether it is even possible to administer the death penalty justly. By the end, the social statement concludes that it is not.

"Three reasons are given to oppose capital punishment: 1) executions represent an unacceptable, non-restorative approach to violent crime; 2) executions can reinforce social injustice; and 3) the death penalty cannot possibly be administered justly."

In an Op-Ed Commentary piece within the Omaha World Herald, on Monday, September 19, Tom Venzor, the Executive Director for the Nebraska Catholic Conference, summed up the Roman Catholic stance on the death penalty. He ended his commentary by saving, "the bishops of Nebraska urge Catholics and all people of good will to vote to retain the repeal of the death penalty this November."

While I honor those whose opinions differ, I will be voting to Retain the Referendum Measure 426. I believe this bipartisan solution to replace the death penalty with mandatory life without parole is the direction my Christian conscience calls me to support.







Items that clients cannot purchase with their food stamps are always appreciated: Dish Soap, Kleenex, Bar Soap, Deodorant, Toothbrush and toothpaste, Shaving Cream, Razors, Mouthwash (without alcohol), Feminine hygiene products, Hair products (combs, brushes, picks), Bathroom tissue, Shampoo, Dry Laundry Soap, Can Openers, Diaper wipers, and Diapers, especially sizes 4, 5, 6 and pull-ups.

How to Waste Less Food



Did you know that Americans spend \$90 billion each year on food that never gets eaten? That 40% of our food ends up in the trash instead of our stomachs? Those are just two of the ratistics from a Natural Resources Defense Council report

sobering statistics from a Natural Resources Defense Council report.

Luckily, it doesn't have to be this way. United Kingdom cut down their food waste by 18% in just five years through better awareness. And you can too, with these tips from the Natural Resources Defense Council.

Shop Wisely. Plan meals, use shopping lists, buy from bulk bins, and avoid impulse buys. Don't succumb to marketing tricks that lead you to buy more food than you need, particularly for perishable items.

Buy Funny Fruit. Many fruits and vegetables are thrown out because their size, shape, or color are not "right". Buying these perfectly good funny fruit, at the farmer's market or elsewhere, utilizes food that might otherwise go to waste.

Learn When Food Goes Bad. "Sell-by" and "use-by" dates are not federally regulated and do not indicate safety, except on certain baby foods. Rather, they are manufacturer suggestions for peak quality. Most foods can be safely consumed well after their use-by dates.

Mine Your Fridge. Websites such as www.lovefoodhatewaste.com can help you get creative with recipes to use up anything that might go bad soon.

Use Your Freezer. Frozen foods remain safe indefinitely. Freeze fresh produce and leftovers if you won't have the chance to eat them before they go bad.

Request Smaller Portions. Restaurants will often provide half-portions upon request at reduced prices.

Eat Leftovers. Ask your restaurant to pack up your extras so you can eat them later. Freeze them if you don't want to eat immediately. Only about half of Americans take leftovers home from restaurants.


Donate. Non-perishable and unspoiled perishable food can be donated to local food banks, soup kitchens, pantries, and shelters. Local and nationa programs frequently offer free pick-up and provide reusable containers to donors.

couldn't blow air through it. It's not unusual to find partial blockages in brass instruments if small items get lodged in the tubing, but when I tested the instrument, the horn was completely blocked. After much probing and prodding, a small tangerine dropped out of the bell.

"Oh," said the musician when I handed him the fruit. See the bewildered look on my face, he explained, "My mom used the horn for a cornucopia in a Thanksgiving centerpiece."
