The regular meeting of the Council was held on April 11th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns for individuals with health concerns and for victims and families in Syria affected by chemical bombs.

Pastor Laaker led devotions from Ezekiel 16:60 and Acts 2:39. The first tells us that God will be with you throughout your entire life and honor the promise of salvation. The second tells us that God's promise extends beyond just the individual to include everyone, even those who have lost their way.

Visions for Ministry: This chapter talks about the role of church in society today and how much it has changed from previous generations. Younger generations have tended to drift away from the church, while older generations struggle with adapting to new ways to reach people. Church in the traditional sense was more about structure, rituals, and attendance; whereas, today church is becoming more fluid. Read chapter three of The Agile Church for next month.

Committee Reports: Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

Christian Education: VBS one-day event is planned for Saturday, July 22nd 12-5pm. Amanda and Malachi will work on a theme dealing with fruit of the spirit or creation.

Evangelism/Outreach: Vicki, Arlone, and Malachi attended the OTOC fundraiser, which they said was enjoyable.

May 1st is the candidates accountability forum with the mayoral and city council candidates running for office, 7 pm, at St. Leo Catholic Church. The questions for the candidates will cover: housing, environmental sustainability, pay day lending, and police policy toward immigrants. The more people that attend the event, the greater the impact it will have on the candidates.

Our ESL class is planning a trip to Morrill Hall in Lincoln on May 20th and we have been approved for a van, but we are in need of a driver. Vicki said there is a signup for the Crossroads Connection meal that we are interested in sponsoring. So far, there have been 3 people who have signed up. Putting The Arts Back Into Hearts



Jessie Obrecht, a student at the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago wrote the following: "Our Gospel this week, April 23, is centered on two stories. The first is the story of Jesus visiting the disciples in the locked upper room, and the second is the story of Jesus visiting again, in order that Thomas might see and believe. In both of these stories we begin with an element of doubt or uncertainty.

"Immediately before this passage, Mary has told the disciples that Jesus was raised from the dead, which, as we know, means something great! It means that the promises that God had made were fulfilled and this God that we follow indeed has the power to overcome death for the forgiveness of our sins. The disciples at the time, though, are terrified. They are afraid that maybe something else has happened, they are afraid that the authorities will lash out towards them, and they are afraid of the unknown that now is. On top of all of this, they have seemingly lost their fearless leader, Jesus, and seem to be stuck in the grief, pain, and fear of it all. Similarly, Thomas enters our Gospel text after missing out on one of the greatest Divine visitations of all time. On top of this, he has missed out on seeing his dear teacher, friend, and Messiah that he undoubtedly has been grieving over as well. There is no indication of where Thomas was, or why he was not with the disciples the first time, but only that he cannot accept what they tell him unless he sees it for himself.

"When reading these stories, there isn't much gained in chastising Thomas and the disciples for their doubt, uncertainty, and grief. In fact, Jesus doesn't even chastise them. Rather, Jesus simply shows up. He comes to the disciples, bringing words of peace and continued purpose for those gathered ("As my Father has sent me, so I send you.") Similarly, he comes to Thomas with words of peace, an act of presence, and a word about the future reality of belief – "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Jesus shows up – unexpectedly, mysteriously, and miraculously. Jesus shows up.

"There are times in life when we find ourselves in situations much like the disciples in these stories. Our lives are falling apart. Illness and death surround us, relationships are failing and/or fleeting, employment or schooling is a constant battle with no direction, and we are unsure of everything and everyone around us. These are not moments where we chastise ourselves or folks going through these times. Instead, we remain open to the ways in which Christ shows

up in our world. We maintain our faith in the fact that Christ will show up, and that sometimes we are invited to be a part of that showing up in our communities. At the end of the day, these stories are not nearly as much about the deep doubt and despair that the disciples demonstrated, but rather about the long history of our God continuing to show up in the lives of God's people. There is nothing we have done or can do to deserve this "showing up", but we are called to see, believe, and share with others the great wonder that is this ever-present God who walks alongside of us through the ups and downs of this journey of life."

I wonder how we might be active in showing up as reflections of Christ each and every day? Can we model Jesus who doesn't chastise but offers peace and presence?



An important educational component of the day will be an engaging series of talks:



Abeny Kucha will recount her family's experience of surviving seven years of civil war and genocide in South Sudan in a talk that is both heartwrenching and hopeful. Abeny has published a book entitled Tears of a Mother and appeared on TEDxLincoln.

Our speaker from Syria was forced to flee that region's devastating conflict for the safety of her family and children. She will recount her powerful story of tragedy, hope, and survival.

Abdi Hussein fled the civil war in Somalia, then devoted himself to assisting the refugee community through work with Care International, National Council of Churches, and Islamic Relief U.K. He is now a bilingual liaison working with Somali families in Omaha.

Stewardship Moment

Putting First Things First

In his interesting volume, Money, Material Possessions and Eternity, Randy Alcorn writes, "Were I the

Bible's editor, I would cut out much of what it says about money and possessions. Anyone can see it devotes a disproportionate amount of space to a subject of secondary importance. . . . As it stands, these large portions of Scripture have little appeal to sophisticated people (such as us) in an advanced culture (such as ours). In fact, if the Bible were written today and . . . judged by what it says about money and possessions, it would never get into print. . . . After all, we come to the Bible for comfort — not for a lecture on finances How could the Bible's Author and Editor justify devoting twice as many verses to money than to faith and prayer combined? And how could Jesus say more about money than both heaven and hell? Didn't He know what was really important?"

The rhetorical answer to Alcorn's last question is, "Of course, Jesus did." And here's the reason: There is a direct relationship between a person's commitment to following Jesus Christ and his or her attitude and actions concerning money, material possessions and giving. Or as Alcorn put it, "If Christ is not Lord over a person's money and possessions, then He is simply not that person's Lord."

Think about it: God didn't choose Fidelity, Vanguard, T. Rowe Price or some other fine financial firm to manage God's money. God chose ordinary people like you and like me. And to make sure we are "putting first things first," God provided a tremendous amount of personal instruction for us in the Scriptures.

How might we become better stewards of this rich resource that God places in our hands?

At the Council meeting on March 14th, Malachi informed us of the work being done through Crossroads Connection of Omaha. It is a "Christian community of faith in support of prisoners, those released, and their families because God's grace is extended to all. It works to bridge the gap from being in the penal system to helping former inmates

find their way back into society through caring support of Christ's follower's." Malachi has been active with the group and has under gone training as a volunteer.

They offer a Sunday evening church service every week with a meal following the service. Numerous churches throughout Omaha, Bellevue and Fort Calhoun are involved. As a congregation we have been asked if we would like to participate in the program. It can be in different ways: preparing and serving a meal at another church or donating money to help cover the cost of the food that is served.

The Mustard Seed statement from Crossroads:

Based on the Parable of the Mustard Seed, Crossroads' effect on our participants usually starts small but often grows to huge proportions.

According to Mark 4:30-32, the mustard seed is the smallest seed in the world, but once it is planted, it grows larger than any garden plant. This is a reminder to our participants that spiritual growth comes in very small steps, but over time these steps can produce great growth in their lives. They can participate in the kingdom of God through small expressions of love and service when the opportunities present themselves. A smile, a strong handshake, a word of encouragement, a phone call, a comforting hug, a helping hand, a financial contribution, changing a flat tire, attending worship services, praying - - all of these acts are them planting mustard seeds.

After attending three worship services we give mustard seed tokens of encouragement to participants to remind them how God's kingdom works. These tokens have the Crossroads logo on one side, and a mustard seed with the words, "Take this mustard seed and grow." The mustard seed token is a reminder to all that their old life is behind them and they are growing in the faith and in their relationship to God to make a better future.

Change your air filter. Cleaning your air filter regularly can improve your gas mileage significantly.


Use cruise control. Using your cruise control will keepyou driving at a more consistent speed and can generally improve fuel efficiency.




