The regular meeting of the Council was held on June 13th. The Council members shared their prayer concerns for family members, neighbors, co-workers, friends and all the travelers vacationing throughout the summer.

Pastor Laaker led devotions from Job 5:8-9 and John 5:7-8. The first tells us that we need to seek God and receive God's counsel. The second tells us that Jesus is capable of miraculous things often in the least expected ways.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: Who are we most like from the Bible? We all have a different role in this life and it takes all of us together to build our community. Can we be comfortable in our role and be open to see what God can do in our lives?

Read chapter Four of The Agile Church for next month.

<u>Committee Reports</u>: Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

<u>Christian Education</u>: VBS one-day event will be held on Saturday, July 22nd 12-5 pm. Amanda and Malachi are working on a theme with fruit of the spirit from Galatians. Malachi will talk with Janet about making signage and getting it up.

Brenda brought up the idea of bringing back children's Sunday School, possibly once a month. If anyone is interested in helping out with that, talk with Brenda.

Pastor has started early communion classes with a couple of the children.

Evangelism/Outreach: Malachi said that while there was interest in the Kids at Work program, once parents learned they were expected to come to church on Sunday mornings with their children, they were not interested in that piece. So Kids at Work will not be happening this year.

<u>Finance</u>: Together a Greater Good (TAGG) – Pastor attended a meeting about it and said that if we would like to sign up for it, it's a free program in which we would earn 5% on purchases made at certain businesses that have agreed to be part of the program. Malachi has offered to assist anyone who may need help signing up with this or the Baker's program.

The Council ratified the Endowment Board's recommendations for allocation to Grace Lutheran Kids at Work, Arts for All, and Brotherhood Mutual.

Century Link is increasing our costs per line by \$2 each beginning in September.

<u>Property</u>: Pastor Edgar reported a window in the library was broken and they have already had the window replaced. The sprinkler system guy came out to repair the issues with our system. Ehrhart Griffin said the storm drain was inspected and all is good. Air conditioning units were serviced last week and most of our units needed freon. Pastor asked us to think about whether or not we want to plant a new tree in the place of the tree we had to cut down in the front lawn.

Service/Social Ministry: None.

<u>Support/Stewardship</u>: Utilizing KLW Enterprises, this year's fall stewardship program theme is Working Together...Celebrating God's Good Gifts.

Worship: Pastor informed us that Sunday, September 17th is scheduled for our Riverboat Service.

<u>New Business</u>: Brenda, Pastor, Malachi, Alma, and YaYa laid new mulch today. Thank you for your hard work!

<u>Announcements</u>: The next meeting is scheduled for July 11th. Vicki will bring treats in July.

Pastor will be in Western Nebraska the weekend of July 9th for a family reunion. Lynda Laird will be playing the organ for us, and Pastor is still looking for someone to preach.

Catherine A. Caimano wrote a piece a couple years ago, titled, "Rethinking Outreach." I'd like to share the bulk of her thoughts here.

"Whenever I ask congregations to tell me about their ministry, they almost always start by talking about "outreach." Whether the parish is large or small, rural or urban, members tell me how they give out food and clothes, donate money to nonprofits and conduct Vacation Bible School for neighborhood kids. They tell me about their committees --

even the ones that have only one or two members -- and the many events and programs they manage.

"But more and more these days, they also talk about frustration and exhaustion. It's the same people doing the same ministry over and over, they say, the same programs and large events staffed by the same handful of volunteers. They believe deeply that the church should "do outreach," but everyone is busy and overcommitted. The result? Much less gets done by the few who keep giving more.

"Sometimes I wonder whether we should just stop. Stop trying so hard. Stop doing the same things hoping for different results. Stop "doing outreach" -- at least as we now envision it. More precisely, I wonder whether we should take a step back and rethink our understanding of "outreach" and how it fits within the context of church and ministry.

"The problem with "outreach" is that it is "out there," somewhere far away. Jesus and his disciples, however, in their ministry, were close enough to touch. They served their neighbors; they healed people whose names they knew or with whom they spoke.

"For us, "outreach" is too often about packing food or sending resources and money to others. To be sure, such help is needed, but rarely are we asked to actually know and be with those neighbors in need. Though we might spend time with them as part of our "service," we are never truly with them. Not really.

"Outreach" too often presumes that we have no needs "in here." Although most Christians I've met have great compassion for others, they -- we -- are often reluctant to know about, are even secretive about, the needs in our own communities. The priest might know who has lost a job or can't pay the medical bills or whose house is in foreclosure, but not many other people do. Not those who share a pew with them, who pray alongside them, who receive the same bread and wine.

"Because those matters are private. Because we are ashamed. Because we are afraid.

"As we seek to serve the needs of others, of those outside our congregations, maybe we should also try to do better at knowing and sharing the needs of those within. We are called to be near. "Who is my neighbor?" Jesus was asked. A neighbor is "one who is nigh," one who is near.

"We are called to serve our neighbors. We are called to be near enough to others to understand their needs, to bear their pain, to truly offer ourselves. Do we know the needs of our neighbors at home, at church, at work, even in our families? Are we willing to ask? "Being near, however, is scary. Whenever I ask church people what comes to mind when they hear the word "outreach," the first thing everyone says is "soup kitchen." Why? Because the average person in the average pew is far away from the average person in the average soup kitchen.

"That person in the soup kitchen could never be me. Therefore, I never have to confront the needs of the kind of people I know, or even my own needs. I don't have to know how needy we all are.

"Be not afraid," Jesus said. We don't have to fear the stranger, that person whose life could not seem more different from my own.

"Receiving is even scarier. Christian service confronts us with the reality that each of us will likely be poor and vulnerable sometime. We are called to be as open to being served as we are to serving.

"Learning to be vulnerable enough to give and receive is ministry. It's not a ministry that can be easily quantified -- like the number of meals served or mission trips completed -- but it is one that is at the heart of what church is for.

"The Christian community is not only a place where we worship God but also a place where members take the time to really talk, listen and reflect on their own lives and on the lives of others. It is a school where we learn to speak truth in love. It's where we learn, by being neighbors, that all are neighbors, willing to share each other's burdens. It's where we learn to erase the boundary between "out there" and "in here."

"Caring for our neighbors, whether in the next pew or far away, doesn't always require organized programs. In fact, in many congregations today, more energy is expended organizing and scheduling "outreach" programs than in actually doing the work of ministry. Sometimes feeding the hungry is as simple as buying or preparing a meal. Sometimes visiting the sick is just that. These are no less ministry for not being organized in the name of the church, or any other organization.

"If you love me, feed my sheep." There are many ways to feed others and to be fed. There are infinite places and ways to serve others and to be served. But there is only one place to learn what the words of Jesus mean.

"Church is not just another organization to do "good work." It is a religious community for forming disciples. If we do better at that task, then maybe we will start to see that people "out there" who are hungry and homeless are also "in here," with us, part of us. And maybe our communities will grow until we really are all neighbors, all of us, whatever our condition. As Christian disciples, we will still be called to give and receive. But there may not be any more "out" to reach."

I have to admit that her words touch my heart. – Thoughts? Pastor Laaker





We recently heard an eloquent sermon about being sent out to preach the Good News. A message directed right at the disciples who followed Jesus throughout his ministry. They had been empowered to continue the work that Jesus started. Their directive

was simple, but their task was anything but easy to carry out. They would face various trials and many would ultimately die for the cause. James 1:2-3 states, "Count it all joy, lest ye fall into diverse temptations, knowing that the testing of your faith produces patience." I wonder how the disciples would have interpreted that verse had they been able to read it.

Today, we as Christians are tested. Maybe not so much as unto death, but in real, challenging ways. Can we see how we are both called and empowered to spread the Good News? Do we recognize the opportunities in a mostly secular society to be witnesses of our faith without necessarily be 'Bible thumpers' or reiterators of Scripture everywhere we go? While our task is perhaps the same, how we carry it out can be quite different than the disciples.

Matthew 9:16 says, "See I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise like serpents and innocent as doves." Serpents are known for being crafty, sly, and often not visible until they are upon their target. Do we flaunt our Christianity unwisely at times? Do we snuff out our own witness before we have a chance to really do so? I wonder if we can do more to spread the Good News by speaking less and acting more. I wonder if sometimes in an attempt to win over that family member, friend, or loved one that we miss out on how God is trying to use us.

Actions speaks louder than words is how the saying goes. While I certainly have a lot to say about this phrase, I won't divert from my main point. Action through faith, speaks loudest even when it doesn't seem to reach the audience. Any action can send a message, but when it's empowered by faith, it's hardly able to be ignored. Clarity is important when delivering a message, not just delivering the message itself. Spreading the Good News should be less about how people see us, and more about how God is active in the world through His love and grace. Let's continue to be active in the efforts to build community and raise awareness through our humble service to the goodness that God envisions in the lives of all.





Keeping Cool And Green

While good ol' ventilation is still the most environmentallyfriendly and cost effective way to cool your home, not everyone is lucky enough to have lots of strategically placed windows to catch the least bit of cross breeze.

Two-thirds of all homes in the United States have air conditioners. Air conditioners use about 5% of all the electricity produced in the United States, at an annual cost of more than \$11 billion to homeowners. So when the weather warms up we should do everything we can to conserve energy as we keep cool. That means treating our airconditioners the same way we treat other energy-demanding appliances: by using them wisely and keeping them running efficiently. Here are some tips to help:

Invest in an energy-efficient air conditioner. If you're buying a new air conditioner, choose one for maximum energy efficiency. New air conditioners come labeled with an Energy Efficiency Rating (EER), a standard that lets you calculate how much electricity the air conditioner will consume. The higher the EER, the less it will cost you to operate the appliance to achieve the same level of cooling.

Avoid overcooling. Don't use or buy more cooling equipment capacity than you actually need. If you decide on central air conditioning, select the most energy-efficient unit that will cool the size space you have. Bigger is not better. A larger unit that you need will cost more to run and may not remove enough humidity from the air, the feature that some consumers like most about air conditioners.


Keep your cooling system well tuned. Have it professionally maintained, and ask how the energy efficiency of the system may be increased.

Install a whole-house ventilating fan. This can be put in your attic or in an upstairs window to cool the house, even if you have central air conditioning. According to Consumer Reports, a big fan working under the right conditions can cool and ventilate an entire house for about the energy cost of running an airconditioner in one room.

Set your thermostat as high as possible. 78 degrees Farenheit is often recommended as a reasonably comfortable and energy-efficient indoor temperature.

Draw the blinds. Reduce the need for the A/C by keeping shades drawn, especially on south-facing windows.

Program the thermostat. Set the thermostat higher during the day when no one is in your house or apartment.
