Two weeks ago in worship, we heard Jesus use the parable of the sower in talking with the crowds. We observed that the sower was pretty reckless scattering seed in places where it was not likely to grow. We also observed that maybe it was not recklessness but extravagant hope that wherever the seed was sown there would be new life sprouting.

This makes me wonder if in this story Jesus is trying to get us to see that God is so abundantly generous with grace, love and mercy. God lavishes our lives with these gifts and awaits the new life that springs up from these sown seeds.

A week ago in worship, we heard Jesus us the parable of weeds in the wheat. I observed, having just returned from our family reunion in western Nebraska where the wheat harvest was in full swing, that I am not aware of any farmer intentionally sowing weeds in the field of wheat. However, weeds always appear. They simply show up in the crop.

It seems to me that Jesus encourages patience and not reckless efforts to fix the field by rushing to pull up the weeds. I remember walking the newly the sprouted wheat fields with my father as a child. There was no way to know which plants were weeds and which were wheat. It only became clear with developing maturity, which was which. Thus, it would seem that Jesus was trying to get us to see that God is not about letting the weeds take over the wheat. Thus God's grace enables growth and development and God is then able to make the ultimate decision about the type of plant we have become.

This coming week in worship, we will hear Jesus tell brief parables about a mustard seed, a bit of yeast in flour, a treasure in a field, a fine pearl and a net catching all kinds of fish. I wonder what might be the surprises Jesus has in store for us as we hear these parables once again.

A tiny seed becomes a bush large enough to provide for others. A bit of yeast has the capacity to affect the whole loaf. A treasure is found in an unlikely place. A pearl is worth giving up all to secure its possession. A net is cast that gathers eatable food and trash. What might Jesus be trying to get us to see with our eyes and hear with our hearts?

These are rich stories that seek to engage our thinking and meditation. In some, Jesus begins with directing us to listen. Can we listen to the Holy Spirit as she helps us discern what Jesus would desire for us? Open your Bible and read these stories in Matthew 13. See where the Spirit directs your thoughts.

- 1. Go to the Habitat Omaha website at <u>https://www.habitatomaha.org/</u> volunteer.
- 2. Click on the "Sign Up to Volunteer Now" button.
- 3. On this screen you will see builds listed. At the top of the build list, in blue is "Use Reservation Code"
- 4. Enter your reservation code: Faith House = faith
- 5. Once you've entered your reservation code and clicked "Apply" you should see a button with only your coalition's schedule listed. Click on the box listing your build.
- 6. Once you have clicked on your build you will see a *long* list of all the workdays/shifts for your build. Scroll all the way to the bottom and you will see a button that says "Click here to register"
- 7. The next screen will ask you for your email followed by your first name. You can also sign-in with Facebook, Google, or Windows Live.

If you are a new volunteer the system will ask you to fill out a **mandatory** profile and sign our waiver, if you are a returning you will simply be logged in.

8. Once you have completed your profile or logged in you will be shown a list of shifts. Click the boxes next to the shifts you would like to register for, scroll to the bottom, and hit the "Complete Registration" button. 9. The next screen will be a confirmation screen...and you are done! You will receive a confirmation email which will also contain a one-click "cancel my shift" link should you need to cancel your volunteer shift.

**NOTE: When you first register with this new program you will be asked to create a profile but *you will not be asked to create a password*. The system will send you an email with a temporary password. You can sign-up the first time without creating a password, but the second time you try to log in you will need to either have your temporary password or you will have to click "Don't know password" on the login page.






