2017 Council Members

<u>Finance</u>: Pastor Mark Grorud from The Immanuel Vision Foundation will be here at the end of the month. Portico did indicate that the cost for Pastor's health insurance will drop by half starting in November.

Last year, St. Luke's Council read *"The Agile Church."* This year Grace Council is reading this book. About midway through the book, the author has a chapter that is titled "Disciplines of a Learning Church." As he introduces the chapter, the author states "Leadership in the agile church is about fostering the spaces in which people can learn, practice, and play. It involves creating the holding environment for

adaptive work in which people can engage in relative safety with the tough questions for which there are no easy answers, questions like, *how do we share our faith with younger generations who don't seem interested? How can we form meaningful community with our neighbors in the name of Jesus? How can we give witness to abundant life in Christ in a broken world? What is God up to in our neighborhood?*" He then offers a series of Disciplines. I'd like to share each of those disciplines in brief for your thoughts.

Discipline 1: Cultivate Spaces for Conversation and Practice

The author states that: "This idea represents a culture shift for many congregations whose formality and solemnity exclude playfulness, laughter, experimentation, and the open acknowledgment of mistakes. Whether intentionally, or not, these churches communicate to participants a message that one must come to church buttoned up, polished, put together, and competent." This in effect precludes the idea that we must grow through a lot of imperfection and even then never achieve perfection except through the blood of Christ.

So, how might we cultivate space for conversation and practice within our Christian faith? How might we create a culture of participation and play in which we are not shamed for having the wrong answer, expressing a doubt or question, or failing?

Discipline 2: Address Fear and Shame

The author states: "We live in a culture in which we are taught to evaluate our self-worth based on our perfection – our ability to perform, achieve, meet others' expectations, and generally keep it all together." Later he would say, "There is no innovation and learning without vulnerability."

How can we share effectively this amazing love of God for us if we pretend that we have to have it all put together? How can we communicate the extravagance of God's love for a broken humanity if we are caught up in our perfection?

The author suggests that "the key to getting beyond the paralysis of shame is to acknowledge it, to practice self-compassion that is rooted in God's compassion for us, and to trust that others will stay in relationship with us even when we are open about our faults and failures." Can we practice God's grace with each other?

What might be your best thinking about these two? I will share Disciplines 3 and 4 in next months Pastoral reflections.

We look forward to sharing Sunday adventures.






