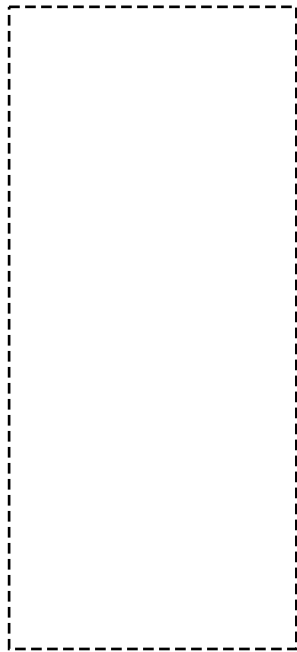

The regular meeting of the Council was held on October 10th. Council members shared their prayer concerns for individuals, their desire that people don't lose hope in the midst of all of the natural disasters occurring around the country and around the world, and for the individuals recently laid off from Hood Manufacturing. May they find employment quickly.

Pastor Laaker led devotions from Daniel 4:34 and Acts 5:29. The first tells us that God is present with each generation and always will be. The second tells us that we should obey God before human authority.

Visions for Ministry: Council Members shared some of their thoughts concerning things they found helpful and engaging from our reading.

Finish what you haven't read of The Agile Church for next month; select something from each chapter that causes you to change the way you think about church and how we might apply it going forward.

Committee Reports: Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please give generously.

Christian Education: Sunday School continues to meet and grow spiritually twice a month.

Augsburg Luther Book Display is up through the month on Sundays.

Evangelism/Outreach: The Liberty Reading Program is off to a good start. We could still use a volunteer. Vicki and Arlone have been tracking the activity with the Little Library and Vicki has reported that books are being used and new books are being replaced and shared by neighbors.

Finance: The Immanuel Vision Foundation application requires additional time therefore a committee should be in place for 2018's grant writing efforts. Portico did indicate that the cost for Pastor's health insurance premium would drop by half starting in November. The Endowment Board met on October 2 and the distribution of funds were ratified from the Disney Endowment.

Property: The kitchen countertop was damaged during a recent celebration and will be repaired accordingly.

Service/Social Ministry: God's Work Our Hands – Gifts bags were delivered and Liberty Elementary Principal Oberst was very happy to accept the gifts for each classroom.

Pastor is applying for an LVC Volunteer to be a part of the outreach work offered through Grace Lutheran.

Support/Stewardship: Fall Stewardship Campaign "Working Together – Celebrating God's Good Gifts" will begin early in November.

Worship: Riverboat Worship conversations revealed a majority in agreement that the experience was such a relaxing and enjoyable trip on the river and great conversations during the pot luck luncheon held at St. Luke's.

The 500th Anniversary Reformation Service will be held on Sunday, October 29th at 2:00 pm at St. John's Cathedral on the Creighton Campus. Early registration is suggested with the anticipation of a large attendance.

Pastor asked the Council to think about the Thanksgiving Eve Service.

New Business: Greg and Janet Hula have agreed to organize the Halloween Party this year. The Party will take place on Friday, October 27th from 6:30 to 8:30 pm. The Annual Event will again be free due to Thrivent Funding.

Announcements: Kountze is sponsoring an Open House in the newly built Kountze Community Commons Center on Wednesday, October 18th from 3:00 to 5:00 pm.

2017 OTOC Delegates Congress will be held on Monday, November 13th at St. Pius Catholic Church.

Pastor will attend the Voyagers Continuing Education event in DC during the week of November 6th.

Last month, I began sharing the Disciplines that are offered in the book, *The Agile Church*. The author states “Leadership in the agile church is about fostering the spaces in which people can learn, practice, and play. Let me continue sharing the next disciplines.

#### Discipline 3: Engage Ambivalence and Conflict

The organizational scholar Chris Argyris explains that people in organizations tend to operate with defensive routines that are overprotective and inhibit learning. An example of this is a church that boldly proclaims “All are Welcome!” on its website, sign and bulletin, yet in its actual practice, shuts out any newcomer. To break out of this pattern involves conversations that get beyond “What should we do?” to the deeper level of “Why are we doing what we’re doing?” It means making our values and operating assumptions explicit.

Robert Kegan and Lisa Lahey remind us that there are often “competing commitments” that block people and organizations from learning and changing. These are underlying values, beliefs and behaviors that oppose the new, sometimes for good reason. For instance, a church might wish to be more flexible and innovative, yet it had deep competing commitments around avoiding loss and discomfort for its members.

How might we engage this difficult effort at transformation? The author suggested simple practices of prayer, biblical engagement, or shared hospitality.

#### Discipline 4: Interpret the Present in Light of the Past

What questions might we ask for which we do not know the answer, or questions that have no easy answer, or questions that the whole community must own and engage? This of course would require some real effort at humble inquiry. The author states that in the biblical story, leaders help people connect their present situation with God’s faithfulness and promises.

What in our history helps us connect with understanding of God’s faithfulness and promises in our current situations?

I’ll continue with disciplines 5 and 6 next month. Give these some thought. Ask some questions and wrestle with humility.

This family with varied immigration status needs your support. Come learn more about how to help families with deep Nebraska roots stay in our community.

## “Working Together — Celebrating God’s Good Gifts”

“For we are God’s servants, working together” (1 Corinthians 3:9).



It takes many hands — working together — to accomplish all that takes place in a church like Grace Lutheran. Some of those “hands” are highly visible as they lead worship services, usher, teach Sunday school classes, or participate in musical presentations. Others are not seen as much as they labor behind the scenes in cleaning the building, serving on committees, or in many other ways.

That is true of all types of organizations, but what sets the church apart — especially a church like Grace Lutheran — is that we are not just working by ourselves and for ourselves. We are working together hand in hand with Almighty God. As Annie Johnson Flint wrote, “Christ has no hands but our hands to do His work today.”

What we are doing, whether it is one of the highly visible functions or one of the behind-the-scenes tasks, we are doing for God’s glory. We are “God’s fellow servants.” We are truly working together with God! And as we do so, we have the opportunity to celebrate God’s good gifts to us.

As God’s children, sometimes our emphasis is on things like food, clothing, shelter, crops, and a land that brings forth God’s bounty in abundance. As we benefit from God’s good gifts like these and many others, our response should be one of thanksgiving and gratitude to God.

But God’s good gifts are also spiritual in nature. For example, God gave the gift of the Son, the Lord Jesus Christ, to be our Savior. Without doubt, this is the greatest gift of all! God gives the gift of faith so that people can trust Christ for salvation. God gives the gift of grace, which is an expression of God’s unconditional love towards us. God gives the gift of wisdom to those who ask. God gives the Holy Spirit to us to help us in our Christian lives and in our praying. God gives spiritual gifts that enable us to serve God and to minister to others. God even provides as special gifts the people who work in God’s kingdom as pastors, teachers, and missionaries.

Perhaps the gifts of God are best summarized in James 1:17.

Every generous act of giving, with every perfect gift, is from above, coming down from the Father of lights, with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change.

Think about it: Every good gift is from God. All God requires of us, God’s children, is that we diligently follow God with the full expectation and confidence that God will reward our faithful obedience.

Obedience has been defined as doing what God says, when God says, with the right heart attitude. A spirit of willing obedience is essential as we seek to use the time, talents and treasure that God has entrusted to us for God’s glory and for the good of other people. So is a willingness to listen to God.

Max Lucado wrote,

Once there was a man who dared God to speak. “Burn the bush like you did for Moses, God, and I will follow. Collapse the walls like you did for Joshua, God, and I will follow. Still the waves like you did on Galilee, God, and I will follow.”

And so the man sat by a bush, near a wall, close to the sea, and waited for God to speak.

And God heard the man, so God answered. He sent a fire, not for a bush, but for a church. He brought down a wall, not of brick, but of sin. He stilled a storm, not of the sea, but of a soul.

And God waited for the man to respond. And He waited . . . and waited.

But because the man was looking at bushes, not hearts, bricks, and not lives, seas, and not souls, he decided that God had done nothing.

Finally, he looked to God and asked, “Have you lost your power?”

And God looked at him and said, “Have you lost your hearing?”

What is your response to God’s good gifts? As one who is “working together” with God and **listening** to God, will you make a fresh commitment to use the time, talents and treasure you have received from God in an even greater way in 2018?

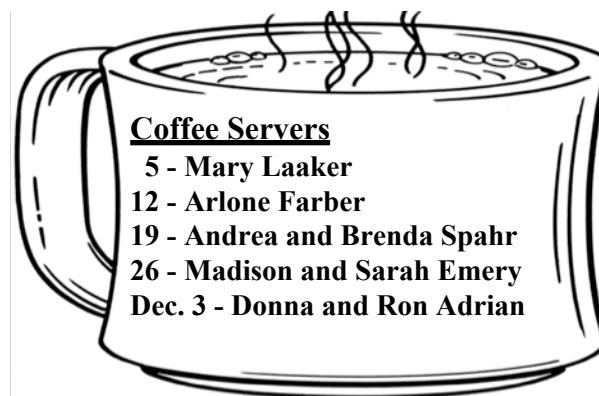

## Green Tips for Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is not only a time for family and friends but also a celebration of the environment and all it provides for us. You can make it truly sustainable by following these tips:

**Get Active:** Get outdoors and work off that second slice of pumpkin pie! National Parks Conservation Association (NPCA) has tips for winter hiking and suggestions for great cold weather trails so you can tell your family to take a hike and not get in trouble.

**Travel Light:** Heading home for the holidays? If you have the time, why not take a train, which produces less carbon than planes or cars?

**Feast on local, seasonal foods:** Fruits and vegetables in season for the late fall don't need to be trucked around the country, and your purchases support your community.

**Use natural decorations:** Forgo craft store supplies for beautiful, biodegradable decorations you can find in nature. Pinecones, gourds, leaves, and acorns are just some of the materials that can add seasonal ambience to your dining room.

**Seek out an authentic heritage turkey...** Because industrialized turkeys are specially bred and raised with hormones to force them to gain weight very quickly, heritage birds are smaller, have less meat, and are closer to wild birds. It may not be that easy to find a true heritage bird and they have to be ordered ahead of time.

**....or go meatless:** Most of your Thanksgiving feast is meatless anyway. Why not try some of the countless vegetarian (meat-free) and vegan alternatives to classic Thanksgiving recipes?

**Compost kitchen scraps:** All those squash peels and carrot tops could be working to enrich your potting soil. Invest in a compost bin and turn your kitchen scraps into something useful instead of throwing them away.

**Don't forget about the leftovers:** Americans waste almost 40% of all edible food, much of it through improper storage.

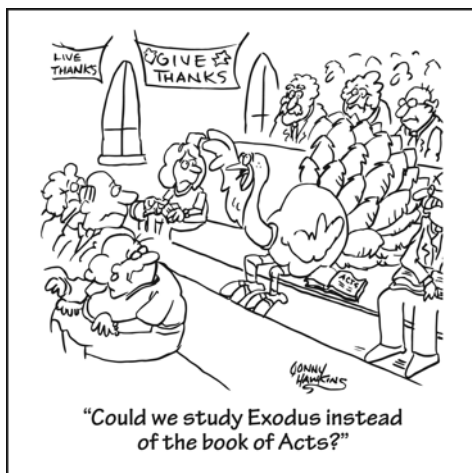

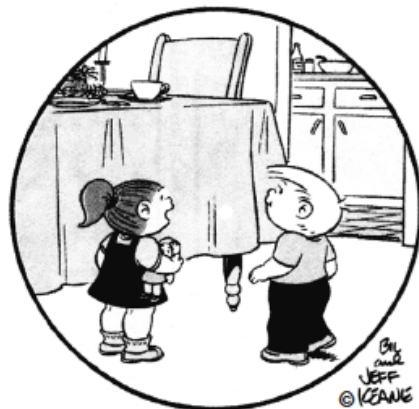
