The regular meeting of the Council was held on September 11th. Council members shared their prayer concerns for individuals medical needs; remembering all the first responders and victims during the anniversary of the 9-11 tragedies; safety for all who are preparing for Hurricane Florence; recovery for the Omaha Police Officer shot today.

<u>Devotions</u>: Pastor led devotions from Psalm 91:4 and 2 Thessalonians 3:3. The first reminds us that God continues to be our protector even when circumstances do not go the way we would like them to. The second reminds us that God is faithful and guards us from further hurts and danger.

From Pastor

As we enter the month of October, crops are being harvested. Garden produce will soon come to an end. It is a wonderful time to focus in on actions and prayers for those who struggle with hunger.

Rev. Amy Reumann writes, "The shortest sermon I know is only ten words. It was preached by my grandfather to a small, country congregation on the story of the Good Samaritan. He read the account of an outsider who demonstrates true neighbor love by stopping on the road to care for a bleeding and badly injured man. This Samaritan's compassion stands in stark contrast to the religious types who passed by without offering aid. After reading the text, my grandfather mounted the pulpit and said 'We all know what this means. Just go and do it.' Then he sat down, sermon over."

I suspect we all know what it means to provide for others. The question often is will we do it. Throughout the month, we will have opportunity to "do it."

First, we have the opportunity to get some physical exercise and walk in the Omaha CROP Walk. If we choose not to walk, we can surely sponsor someone who is planning to walk. The funds raised will help support local efforts and world-wide efforts. I had the privilege of helping organize the first CROP Walk in Omaha in 1981. Let's just go and do it.

Secondly, in the middle of the month, we will share information and action opportunities available to us through Bread for World. Bread for the World is a collective Christian voice urging our nation's decision makers to end hunger at home and abroad. God's grace in Jesus Christ moves us to reach out to our neighbors – whether they live next door, in another state, or on another continent. The main effort of Bread for World is to get individuals to write letters to their elected Congressional members urging them to invest in key programs funded by the federal budget: Nutritional programs like SNAP, Tax credits for low-income workers, Humanitarian relief programs like the one in South Sudan, and International poverty-focused development assistance.

Thirdly, we have the Loaves and Fishes Fresh Food Pantry here at Grace each Monday morning. Volunteers are needed and welcomed as we prepare and assist those who come to receive the excess bounty of food shared by Trader Joes and Whole Foods.

As Rev. Amy Reumann says: "Ending hunger requires charity and justice – binding the wounds of those who are hurt but also addressing those with the power to lord it over others. The role of those who govern is to make sure the needs of all are met for the sake of the common good. Sometimes those who govern need a firm reminder of this responsibility. And if we do not remind them, then who will?"

We, too, sometimes need a reminder of the responsibility we each have for the sake of the common good. How might each one of us "go and do it?"

The theme for this year's stewardship emphasis is *Transformed by Grace, Faith, and Love.* We will begin this emphasis on Sunday, November 4. As God's people, we have been given the high honor of being God's stewards. As God's

stewards, we are called to manage faithfully all that we've been entrusted with according to God's will and benefit. Because of God's generous gifts of grace, faith, and love, we can accomplish all that God asks us to do. God works in and through us as we become God's hands, feet, and mouth. Each week during this three-week emphasis, we will be focusing on one of the three virtues, *grace*, *faith*, and *love*.

In week one, our focus is on God's undeserved kindness and love which the Bible calls grace. God's grace comes from God through Jesus and his work for us. It is not something we have a right to. Jesus obtained it for us. We get it freely because of the obedience and sacrifice of Jesus. This saving grace also enables and motivates us to be God's stewards. The power of God's grace in our lives compels us to use our time, talents, and money in ways that glorify God.

In week two, we are reminded that it is through faith that we have access into God's grace and a new relationship with God. Through faith, God changes us, and we are born anew of God. Not only does faith justify us and give us peace with God (Romans 5:1), we are told by James and other writers that faith produces works (James 2:18). Faith leads to action. Through faith, we are empowered to fulfill God's purposes. Our deeds as stewards are evidence of our faith.

The third week we will focus on the virtue of love. Love ought to follow faith. Love seeks the welfare of others. "Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and his love is perfected in us" (1 John 4:11-12). God's love in Christ will compel us to do things that appear foolish. God's love prompts us to give freely of our time, talents, and treasures to help others and extend God's kingdom.

I hope and pray that God will use the Sunday messages on *Transformed by Grace, Faith, and Love* to draw you closer to God in Christ.

Yale Park Refugee Family Sponsorship

Friends, Ronnie Schacht has invited Grace and St. Luke's to respond to this appeal. She is willing to be the contact. Please read through this request and consider being a part of this effort to restore dignity to a family in our community.

Ronnie writes, "I have worked with several families that have been displaced from their Yale Park apartments. I was a Family Literacy Teacher with OPS and did home visits at 34th & Lake. Their living conditions are indeed deplorable, but they have a deep need and commitment to "stick together." I can only imagine the stress they are going through and I would like to help sponsor 1 family as Restoring Dignity has suggested in the following article."

Restoring Dignity has received many texts, calls, and emails about the needs of this community. After discussing with Heartland Family Services, we have decided that the most efficient and effective way to provide families with what they need is the following:

We are looking for churches, organizations, workplaces, neighborhood groups, etc. to sponsor one of the almost 100 families from Yale Park. Sponsorship looks like the following:

- Church/organizations/workplaces, etc. will be assigned one family and will be given a list of what that family has requested that they need for their new home. Many families will not be able to bring furniture with them due to bed bug and cockroach infestations. **They will essentially be "starting over"** and will need essential items like: *mattresses, blankets, sheets, dressers, towels, toiletries, kitchen table, chairs, couch etc.* All items will need to be in good condition (no items from homes with bedbugs or cockroaches, and all used items need to be in good condition (no signs of wear and tear or stains).
- Each group will be responsible for **obtaining donated items and storing them.**
- Once donated items have been acquired, each group will **transport items** to their sponsored family's home.

In this way, we believe that we will be able to provide essential household items for all of the families from Yale Park in a very short time frame. Providing home furnishing for almost 100 families is an enormous task, but if each of our church/organizations commits to one family, we can accomplish this!







Violence Against Women

Around the world at least one woman in every three has been beaten, coerced into sex, or otherwise abused in her lifetime. Most often the abuser is a member of her own family. Increasingly, gender-based violence is recognized as a major public health concern and a violation of human rights.

What Is Gender-Based Violence? Violence against women and girls includes physical, sexual, psychological, and economic abuse. It is often known as "gender-based" violence because it evolves in part from women's subordinate status in society. Many cultures have beliefs, norms, and social institutions that legitimize and therefore perpetuate violence against women. The same acts that would be punished if directed at an employer, a neighbor, or an acquaintance often go unchallenged when men direct them at women, especially within the family. Two of the most common forms of violence against women are abuse by intimate male partners and coerced sex, whether it takes place in childhood, adolescence, or adulthood. Intimate partner abuse--also known as domestic violence, wife-beating, and battering--is almost always accompanied by psychological abuse and in one-quarter to one-half of cases by forced sex as well. The majority of women who are abused by their partners are abused many times.

America as a nation has for too long failed to grasp either the scope or the seriousness of violence against women. Even with the adoption and reauthorization of The Violence Against Women Act, we are still plagued with sexual harassment in many different forms. Women are not believed when reporting. The culture has failed to hold males accountable and thus the cost of reporting becomes burdensome and dangerous.

This must change. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America has stated: "Gender-based violence is an ancient sin that for thousands years has harmed countless women, children and men. It is a sin that Christians need to recognize, understand and confront, for our religious history also bears its stain." ELCA social message on Gender-Based Violence, pg 1.

According to the ELCA social message on Gender-Based Violence, physical, sexual, or emotional harm directed at a person based on gender, sex, or sexuality is gender-based violence. For example, domestic violence is a form of gender-based violence; it is a pattern of violent behaviors used to control an intimate partner that crosses all economic, social and cultural boundaries. It may be physical, but it may also take on more subtle forms such as emotional, verbal or financial intimidation and control.

The common aims that we all can do are: 1. Recognize, name and root out the violence and its sources wherever it is happening. 2. Ensure care and create safe communities that foster healing. 3. Provide education. 4. Create accountability.

God's Work ~ Our Hands
