In one of my Daily devotions from Richard Rohr, he began it by saying, "My friend and CAC colleague Brian McLaren has spent years imagining "a new kind of Christianity" that invites people into a deepening commitment to love of God, PASTOR neighbor, and self. Such a movement for the common good is surely disruptive or "disordering" to our status quo, just as

Jesus disrupted the status quo in his own day." He caught my attention and I began wondering what he might have to say about Jesus' disruptive actions. I hadn't thought about Jesus' ministry in that specific way.

He then went on to quote Brian McLaren. Here is how he began. "Jesus was introducing what, in today's parlance, might be called a disruptive technology. Where sustaining technologies stimulate incremental improvements, like, say, going from a rotary phone to a touch-tone or keypad phone, or even from a landline to a wireless phone, a disruptive technology displaces established assumptions, as in, say, combining a phone, a camera, a computer, a music library and player, a GPS device, and a mobile Internet portal. The old status quo is disrupted, the game changes, and old technologies become irrelevant." I couldn't help but think about all of the Omaha Public School students now working from iPads. (If you'd like a bit of humor, I was pointed to a You Tube video titled "Monk needs help opening a book.") Here is the link: https:// www.youtube.com/watch?v=-xmTTzCAALc

McLaren goes on to say, "A later New Testament writer repeated and expanded upon the disruption and migration Jesus was calling for (1 Peter 2:5). The way of life centered in the Temple must be disrupted because God wanted to dwell not in buildings of bricks or stones cemented together by mortar, but rather in human beings-living stones, he called them-cemented together by mutual love, honor, and respect. . . .

"This disruptive revolution, this liberation, this great spiritual migration begins with each of us presenting ourselves, with all of our doubts and imperfections, all of our failures, fears, and flaws, to the Spirit, our legs as pillars, our bodies as temples. . . . You. Me. Everyone. No exceptions."

I was with him. This seems like an honest and helpful way of considering our current circumstances. He then surprised me with his last comment. It may surprise you, too. "If you want to see the future of Christianity as a great spiritual migration, don't look at a church building. Go look in the mirror and look at your neighbor. God's message of love is sent into the world in human envelopes. If you want to see a great spiritual migration begin, then let it start right in your body. Let your life be a foothold of liberation."

You and I are human envelopes. We are sent with a message of love from God to our neighbor. It would appear that a focus on being sent to church is not the disruption that Jesus sought. He sought our lives to be focused on love of neighbor, lived with honor and respect for the other. How do you think we are doing?

Several years ago, Christian Smith and Hilary Davidson wrote a book titled, "The Paradox of Giving; Giving We Receive, Grasping We Lose." In a review

written by Kieran Healy, he said, "My bounty is as boundless as the sea," Juliet says to Romeo. "The more I give to thee, the more I have." In The Paradox of Generosity, Christian Smith and Hilary Davidson argue that giving works in just that way. The book, in fact, deals with two distinct paradoxes. The first paradox of generosity is that it's good for those who practice it: The more you give, the better off you are. The second is that despite these benefits, relatively few people are especially generous. The purpose of the book, Smith and Davidson suggest, is not only to document the benefits of living a generous life, but also "to help less generous readers find their way to more generous life practices."

I wonder, do we really believe "the more you give, the better off you are"? The authors of the book suggest that Americans as a whole have plenty of room for improvement when it comes to giving behavior. They did a survey in which they asked if persons tithe. Twenty percent of the respondents said they did. However, when they were pressed to report actual amounts, only 2.7 percent actually gave away ten percent.

The authors in their evidence that they have gathered strongly supports the conclusion that we do well by doing good.

Maybe the early followers of Jesus were onto something. Giving generously does lead to a healthy life spiritually and physically.
