

On Monday, October 26, I listened in on the presentation by Rev. Dr. Katherine Shaner during the Nebraska Synod Theological Conference (Virtual) as she addressed the topic: Communities Called Out in Christ. She began her presentation with the question, “What does it mean to be church?” This is an interesting question. I noticed right away that she didn’t formulate the question as what does it mean to be “the” church.

She located her thoughts with the first ending of Mark’s gospel. Mark **16:1-8** When the sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices, so that they might go and anoint him. ²And very early on the first day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. ³They had been saying to one another, “Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?” ⁴When they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had already been rolled back. ⁵ As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man, dressed in a white robe, sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. ⁶ But he said to them, “Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him. ⁷ But go, tell his disciples and Peter that he is going ahead of you to Galilee; there you will see him, just as he told you.” ⁸ So they went out and fled from the tomb, for terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid.

She spent some time explaining some of the nuance of the word “ekklesia.” She said she understood its meaning to be “called out into the world.” I resonate with her description. As a young man entering seminary, I recall my professors stating that a pastor is not just called to a place but is called out to the world. I’m sure I didn’t understand that then as much as I do now.


It seems clear that those women and first disciples were clearly called out into the world. They didn’t have any structure or building or constitution. They were simply called out to be messengers of this truly amazing Messiah, Jesus. He, also, didn’t spend his time in structures. Almost all of the stories in the New Testament about Jesus and his ministry are located out in the world.

I wonder if this pandemic time is a time in which we are being called out. Called out to share how God is continuing to work through the Holy Spirit to bring the kingdom closer to each of us as we recognize the way Christ is with us in this time away from the structures that have confined our thinking and doing. Are we able to listen more closely to those who have been outside of our structures as they have encountered the healing sustaining presence of God? Are we able to see and share the ways God accompanies us in this time?

We soon end the church year season with the celebration of Christ the King. May we shed our fear, rejoice in the good news of God’s abiding presence and share the wonderful ways we experience God’s grace, love and mercy.

Fogger: new machine that is shared between Grace and St. Luke’s - chemicals are expensive - but the fogger electrifies any potential harmful virus killing it instantly.

Boiler - cleaned and working properly.

Smoke Alarm - General Fire checked smoke alarms and found 1 not working in the side office.

Service/Social Ministry: none.

Support/Stewardship: Fall Program begins Nov. 1 - will look for readers for 3 weeks.

Worship: Organist Contract - time to renew.



Important notice for preventing COVID-19 outbreaks.


Avoid the "Three Cs"!

- 1. Closed spaces** with poor ventilation.
- 2. Crowded places** with many people nearby.
- 3. Close-contact settings** such as close-range conversations.



One of the key measures against COVID-19 is to prevent occurrence of clusters.

Keep these "Three Cs" from overlapping in daily life.



The risk of occurrence of clusters is particularly high when the "Three Cs" overlap!


