As I share my thoughts, this day is being observed as Earth Day 2021. Many of you know that I try to walk outdoors each morning. I enjoy observing the birds and the changing of the seasons. I notice the flowers and the landscape. Lately, I have been noticing what seems to be a growing practice of using the environment as one's personal trash can. The amount of litter, of all types, is significant

along roadways, walkways, yards, etc.

This morning one of the devotionals that I read daily offered by Richard Rohr was titled "Grieving the Trees." He shared a prayer from Rev. Dr. Margaret Bullitt-Jonas. I share it here.

"In times like these, our prayer may need to be expressive and embodied, visceral and vocal. How else can we pray with our immense anger and grief? How else can we pray about ecocide, about the death that humanity is unleashing upon Mother Earth and upon ourselves? How else can we break through our inertia and despair, so that we don't shut down and go numb? ....

"I've taken to praying outdoors. I go outside, feel the good earth beneath my feet and the wind on my face, and I sing to the trees-to oak and beech, hemlock and pines. Making up the words and music as I go along, I sing my grief to the trees that are going down, and my grief for so much more-for what we have lost and are losing, and for what we are likely to lose. I sing my outrage about these beautiful old trees being cut to the roots, their bodies chipped to bits and hauled away to sell. I sing my fury about the predicament we're in as a species. I sing my protest of the political and corporate powersthat-be that drive forward relentlessly with business as usual, razing forests, drilling for more oil and fracked gas, digging for more coal, expanding pipeline construction, and opening up public lands and waters to endless exploitation, as if Earth were their private business and they were conducting a liquidation sale. I sing out my shame to the trees, my repentance and apology for the part I have played in Earth's destruction and for the part my ancestors played when they stole land and chopped down the original forests of the Native peoples who lived here. I sing my praise for the beauty of trees and my resolve not to let a day go by that I don't celebrate the precious living world of which we are so blessedly a part. I'm not finished until I sing my determination to renew action for trees and for all of God's Creation. ...."

Earthday.org reminds us: Climate change and other environmental degradations have broken our natural systems, leading to new and fatal diseases as well as a breakdown of the global economy. But just as climate change and coronavirus painfully remind us of the harm we've caused, Restore Our Earth reminds us of the opportunities that lay ahead.

We must Restore Our Earth not just because we care about the natural world, but because we live on it. Every one of us needs a healthy Earth to support our jobs, livelihoods, health & survival, and happiness. A healthy planet is not an option — it is a necessity.

May we take the necessary steps to not only pray for Mother Earth but do all we can as stewards of God's creation to provide for a healthy community and world.

### Worship Update in the Covid-19 Pandemic

Your Councils want to keep you up-to-date on the status of getting back to insanctuary worship (remember, we have had no shortage of in-person opportunities over the last year in our outdoor sanctuary!). The patience you have all had over this past year has been much appreciated, as it has not been easy to stay the course to try to keep us all safe and healthy. Many of Grace and St. Luke's folks have been vaccinated or have access to the vaccine (a good thing!), but, on the other hand, the number of cases continues to show signs of increase again.

Though we have started making plans and procedures for our re-opening, we will only be ready to open our doors when the "rolling daily average" is at a safer threshold. You can follow those numbers along with us at the <u>Douglas</u> <u>County COVID Dashboard</u>. Recently, Nebraska Synod, Bishop Maas reminded us to follow the directives of our health authorities. A year ago, we felt it was best to wait until this number was below 10 and closer to 5.

During this pandemic, it has become apparent that we have all established different perspectives, different levels of comfortability with the virus, and different personal timelines of integrating back into the community. We have learned that one person's comfort zone is not always the same as our neighbor's, relative's, or friend's comfort zone. While many are ready to shower folks with hugs or socialize, many others are not. Balancing these points of view has been very difficult as we try to make sure we are providing a safe and comfortable environment for everyone to worship--no matter your comfort or vaccination level.

We have so appreciated those who have kept us in their prayers and have continued to support Grace and St. Luke's financially. We are one day closer to the end than we were yesterday, and we pray we will be together in the sanctuary soon! Until then, we will make efforts to gather outdoors, weather permitting.
