

Some thoughts as we prepare to hear the Scripture readings throughout this month. We have just begun with a reading from John that features Jesus' feeding of the 5000. Take note that Jesus distributes the bread and the fish to all the guests gathered. A compassionate touch for each to receive more than enough to satisfy.

On Sunday August 1, apparently not satisfied by Jesus' feeding of the crowd, some who were there press him for a sign of his power, perhaps it is daily manna they want. Jesus, however, offers himself as the bread come down from heaven to give life to the world. He calls us to come to him and believe in him, and through that relationship to know the one who sent him.

On Sunday, August 8, Jesus says that the bread he gives for the life of the world is his flesh, and whoever easts this bread has life eternal now and will be raised on the last day. We are to live in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us. The whole purpose of life is giving yourself for the other.

On Sunday, August 15, we will observe the special recognition of Mary, Mother of our Lord. Mary's role is not limited to giving birth to Jesus and mothering him in his childhood. In John's gospel, she is among the women standing near the cross. In Acts, she among the disciples awaiting the gift of the Spirit. She continues to see how God was at work through her son.

On Sunday, August 22, we return to John's gospel where the people are taking offense at Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh and drink his blood. Some disciples leave the group. In the midst of this, Peter asks, "To whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life." May we be bold ambassadors for the good news of the gospel.

On Sunday, August 29, Jesus will critique those who elevate human customs above divine law thus ignoring God's law. True uncleanness comes not from external things, but from the intentions of the human heart. May God create in us clean hearts.

This is only a brief summary of some of the things we will encounter in the Gospel readings there is more to shared and learned in the other readings from the Old Testament, the Psalms and the New Testament lessons. These are rich for spiritual formation and foundation.

Speaking of formation and foundation, I will be conducting confirmation classes online again this year. If you have someone in your family that would like to participate, please let me know so that they can be included. Day and time will likely be on Wednesday in the evening.

I would also like to offer early communion classes for children that would like to participate in receiving communion. I am looking at offering the classes for three weeks following the morning worship September 12, 19, 26. Let me know if you have children that would like to participate. Parents are invited to attend with their children.

"Each one of you should give what you have decided in your heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver." -2 Corinthians 9:7

While some of us may have heard the last five words of this verse weaponized as a way of increasing participation, reading it in full offers a better—*and broader*—vision for stewardship. There's something going on here beyond tithe checks or offering plates and envelopes. There's a culture described in these lines—one that's operating out of something other than scarcity or fear.

Although we see some examples to the contrary (*looking at you, Ananias and Sapphira*), so much of the early church was known for—and sustained by—its generosity. Have we maintained that? We still believe that God will meet our needs, but the culture seems to have shifted. Maybe it isn't as easy to trust as it once was. When we do talk about giving, we might even feel reluctant.

The Spirit of Christ invites us to trust God's generosity in all things. Our giving can grow in frequency and amount recognizing that we can't outgive God. Let's give generously and with a cheerful heart.

The regular meeting of the Council was held on July 13th. Council members shared prayer concerns for health conditions of members and friends, and a quick reconnection to power for those individuals still without power.

<u>Devotions</u>: Devotions were led by Pastor Laaker, reading the selected verses in the "*Daily Texts*" from Psalm 3:2-3 and Luke 1:49. The first tells us that the Psalmist has faith even during traumatic times, much like Job. The second tells us that when we are faced with uncertainty, we can still have great faith in God.

<u>Visions for Ministry</u>: The Postscript highlights that this is a life-long process of maturity that we should intentionally give thought before any actions in order to utilize these skills in our own lives.

Pastor passed out "The Scourge of White Privilege" by A'Jamal-Rashad Byndon, please read the article for next month's group discussion.

<u>Committee Reports:</u> Reports were received from the Financial Secretary and the Treasurer. Please continue to give generously.

Christian Education, Service/Social Ministry, Support/Stewardship, and New Business: None.

<u>Evangelism/Outreach</u>: Delightful conversation with a potential individual for the LVC placement; however so far there has been no response. Recently two individuals have inquired to becoming a part of our faith community; nice surprise!

<u>Finance</u>: We are experiencing a concerning shortfall. After a discussion of possible options, a motion was made to move Memorial Funds to the General Operating Funds to cover the payroll which will need to take place by the 15th. The motion was seconded and all agreed.

Endowment Board met on June 29th and the Council ratified the intent of the Board for distribution of funds.

A donation of \$895.00 from Morning Star Lutheran was made in support of Grace Reads. Pastor sent a Thank You letter in response.

<u>Property</u>: Graffiti was discovered on the window sill under the front office. The Omaha Police Graffiti Abatement Team has been notified.

<u>Worship</u>: The Council concurred with St. Luke's to continue the joint service for the next two months, that the service time would be 9:30 am, that we would post a new sign on the doors that reads "If you are fully vaccinated, please use your own judgment on wearing a mask" and that we would meet at Grace in August and St. Luke's in September.

August 8 - Pastor will be out of town. Pastor Omar Vila from San Andres will conduct the service.

<u>Announcements</u>: Pastor will be taking a vacation from August 3-8, visiting family in California.

Ralph will prepare the closing prayer for the August meeting.

Adjournment: The Council meeting closed in prayer and adjourned at 8:45pm.


It may be summer break, but we are still here for you and those you love. Please take a peek at our upcoming groups and events and as always, reach out with any questions at all.

AMERICAN INDIAN ALASKA NATIVE LUTHERAN ASSOCIATION

Greetings in the name of our Creator, in the name of Jesus, Savior of all. We speak to you all today on behalf of the Indigenous people throughout North Americas. We come with sad hearts at the news of 215+ children of the Kamloops Residential School whose remains were recently found in a mass grave and of the children of the Rosebud Sioux whose bodies were returned to their homeland this past week. They are being remembered by many by the color orange.

The color orange is symbolic and came from the inspiration of a survivor of that era, Phyllis Webstad, who stated that when she was a 6-year-old girl arriving at a residential boarding school, she was stripped of her clothes which included a new orange t-shirt her grandmother had gifted her and was never given back. The orange shirt/color now symbolizes how the church and the schools they administered took away the Indigenous identity of the children in their care.

In honor and memory of the children of the First Nations people and of our Native children who never made it home, and for those still living the nightmare imposed on them as children of Canada and the United States we humbly ask our brothers and sisters of the church to hang an orange banner in the sanctuaries of your churches for 225 days. In remembrance and lament of each child that was thrown into those graves, and those yet to be discovered we honor each of their lives.

Please grieve with us and remember us as the Indigenous people of this land who are going through a very sad and heartbreaking time in our collective psyche. We invite all our Christian brothers and sisters, in solidarity with us, to honor all our First Nations and our Native children that never made it out of residential schools by hanging an orange banner for 225 days.

We now call on the Church to acknowledge and confess its complicity in all the atrocities committed against the Indigenous peoples of North America and throughout the world where western Christianity colonized Indigenous peoples. Please stand in partnership with us for the children.

The true history of the western church in America has been participation in acts of ethnic cleansing, genocide through warfare including biological and chemical, sterilization, depletion of our main food source, the taking of land and resources for personal gains. We ask you, the ELCA Church and Bishops Church leaders and congregations to support our people in remembering the children. Many Tribal nations have had church groups offer apologies on behalf of their ancestors, which is well and good, but that only serves to assuage any feelings of guilt or shame for them and does not bring about true repentance. So in light of these past gestures we call upon the churches serving in the United States to advocate the U.S. Government to fully acknowledge all the atrocities it has committed against the indigenous peoples of this land now known as the United States of America and for the future of Christianity in Indian Country.

Do you know of a family or individual in need of food assistance? Please share the Pantry information with them.




