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In his daily meditation on January 24, Richard Rohr titled it "Goodness Exposed." I find his thoughts engaging and wish to share them with you.

"The absolute religious genius of Jesus is that he utterly refuses all debt codes, purity codes, religious quarantines, and the searching for sinners. He refuses the very starting point of historic religions. He refuses to divide the world into the pure and the impure, much to the chagrin of almost everybody—then and now.

"Jesus is shockingly **not** upset with sinners. This is a shock so total that most Christians, to this day, refuse to see it. He is only upset with people <u>who do</u> <u>not think</u> they are sinners: these denying, fearful, and illusory individuals are the actual blockage. They are much more likely to hate and feel no compunction. Formerly, religion thought its mission was to expel sin and evil. Through Jesus, we learn that sin lies in the very act of expelling. There is no place to expel it to. We have met the enemy, and the enemy is us. We either carry and transform the evil of human history as our own problem, or we increase its efficiency and power by hating and punishing it "over there." The Jesus pattern was put precisely and concisely by Paul: "for our sake he made the sinless one a victim for sin, so that in him we might become the uprightness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:21). I admit, that is counterintuitive for most people. Only mystics and sinners seem to get it.

"In the story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:30–37), Jesus tells of a man by the side of the road waking up in enemy territory, realizing that he has been loved by the very one who is supposed to hate him and whom he is supposed to fear. Could this be everybody's awakening? Could this be an accurate image of discovering God and truth? Jesus is clearly presenting the foreign Samaritan as an image of God. He ends the shocking parable by saying, "Go and do the same" (Luke 10:37). The human task has become the very imitation of God, which seems almost unthinkable. God, the one that history has been taught to fear, is in fact the utter Goodness that enfolds us and creates a safe and nonthreatening universe for us—a renewed universe that we can now pass on to others. "For Jesus, there are no postures, group memberships, behaviors, prayer rituals, dietary rules, asceticism, or social awareness that, of themselves, transform us or make us enlightened, saved, or superior. There are no contaminating elements or people to expel or exclude. These answers are exposed as inadequate only when goodness is exposed as the divine field of action. Everyone and everything belongs."

I find myself agreeing with him and recognizing how difficult it is to actually act in the way of Jesus.

Stewardship 2030: A Return To Mission by Charlotte Linberry

Anyone in your congregation can probably tell you that they are regularly bombarded with requests from numerous nonprofits to donate to their causes. Why should they give to the church? Congregational stewardship over the next decade will require a renewed focus on the mission of the church. Simply asking members for money to meet the budget or fill the deficit is not an effective stewardship strategy. For starters, it doesn't show good financial management when church leaders keep asking for money each year from the standpoint of "we need to pay the bills." I don't want to invest in an organization that can't even balance its budget! So, what makes your church special? **What is your mission?** How you answer those questions is crucial not only to the success of your next stewardship campaign but may determine your survival as a congregation.

What makes the church different from other nonprofits in the world? One way to determine what sets you apart in your mission is to **tell your story**. There's a reason your congregation began, and a reason why they're still here. What is it that draws people in and keeps them coming back? As you listen to *individual stories*, you will probably also notice a *collective narrative* among the community, something that draws members to the church and to each other. Especially in smaller or older congregations, telling the story is a great way to help people articulate the mission of their church.

So, how might you share the story of our congregation?

In 1990, a simple prayer: **"Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat**" was delivered to a small youth group at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC led by Brad Smith, who was serving as a seminary intern at the time.



This gave birth to an idea. Why not harness the energy and enthusiasm of Super Bowl weekend, a time when people come together for football, food and fun, to unite the nation for a higher good? Individuals and groups could collect dollars in soup pots and canned food for those in need and send every dollar and food donation DIRECTLY to a local charity of THEIR choice.

The first year, they invited 22 area churches to join the team and collected \$5,700 with 100% of donations distributed to local-area charities.

That was 1990. Since then, Souper Bowl of Caring has become a national, grass-roots, youth-inspired movement where ordinary people are doing extraordinary good. Over \$170 MILLION in dollars and food has been generated while benefiting thousands of soup kitchens, food banks, meal programs and other hunger-relief charities in local communities.

Thousands of participants including: churches, schools, youth groups, community partners, grocery partners, local businesses, media partners, NFL teams and passionate individuals have experienced for themselves, the joy and satisfaction of giving, serving and inspiring people across the country to follow their generous example.

The 32nd Annual Souper Bowl of Caring is Sunday, February 13th, we plan to highlight the work and ministry of the Loaves and Fishes Pantry. All are invited to participate and bring a special collection that includes canned goods, paper products (toilet paper), or personal care items to donate to the ministry efforts to serve those in need within our community.
